I have the honor to inform your Lordship that during the past month one hundred and sixtyone Maori prisoners, arrested under the Acts of 1879 and 1880, referred to in my Despatch No. 11, of
the 26th February, have been released. Of these, forty-seven had been arrested for "ploughing" and
one hundred and fourteen for "fencing."

The number, therefore, of these prisoners still remaining in custody is one hundred and fifty-six.
