HOKITIKA HIGH SCHOOL.

1. Report of the Board.

The first meeting of the Board during the year was held on the 31st March, when Mr. Bevan was elected chairman and Mr. Moss secretary.

The Board has held twelve meetings, and the attendance of members has been satisfactory. After persistent efforts the Board, with the co-operation of the Westland Education Board and Hokitika School Committee, has succeeded in establishing a district high school under the provisions of section 55 of "The Education Act, 1877;" and the necessary legislative authority to disburse the Board's funds towards the expense of maintaining the institution was obtained by the passing of an amendment Act to the statute which brought the Board into existence in 1883. It is gratifying to learn that the school is now fully established and the prospects of permanent success almost assured. The number of scholars attending the advanced classes is twenty-one, which is greatly in excess of the Board's anticipations. During the year the Board's building known as Government House was put in a tenantable state of repair at a cost of £283 11s. In addition to preserving this valuable property, the outlay will enable such a rent to be produced from the building that the income of the Board will be increased by about £20 per annum.

The district high school having been now established, it will be a matter for the consideration of the new Board to determine what amount per annum shall be contributed towards the expense of management from the revenues of the Board of Governors.
