# Dr. Purchas's Report on the Auckland District.

Sir,— Auckland, 13th April, 1893. In reporting upon the Industrial Schools in this provincial district for the year ending the 31st March, 1893, I have to say that the health of the children, as a rule, has been remarkably

At Kohimarama, in May, a case of fever occurred, and ended in recovery. During the last two quarters of 1892 I was not called to any case of sickness there, and, as that school is now closed, I need not refer to it any more.

There was no sickness during the whole year at the girls' school in St. George's Bay. Amongst

the boarded-out children there were very few cases of sickness, and no death occurred.

I observe that it is reported that Dr. MacGregor recommends that all destitute children should be taken under the care of the department, and I think it would be well if the recommendation were adopted, as it would insure that the advantages of the boarding-out in respectable homes would be conferred upon all.
