Return to an Order of the House of Representatives, dated 12th September, 1894.

Ordered, "That a return be laid before this House showing—(1) The number of extra or temporary clerks employed in each department of the Government during the financial years 1887-88, 1890-91, 1893-94; (2) the number of such clerks now employed who have been more than two years in the Service; (3) the number of experts appointed during the year ended 31st March, 1894, specifying the departments in which appointed; and (4) the number of cadets appointed during the financial years mentioned in the margin (1887-88, 1890-91, 1893-94), specifying the departments in which appointed."—(Hon. AGRICULTURE: (1) The numbers shown in the above return include all persons who have performed casual work or temporary clerical work for the department in the years named.—John D. Ritchie, Secretary. 3/10/94.

AUDIT: (2) None of these persons were employed casually.—James Edward FitzGerald, Controller and Auditor-General.

COLONIAL SECRETARY: (8) Exclusive of clerical assistance to Registrar of Electors in preparing electoral rolls. The return includes all persons who have performed casual or temporary work during the above-named periods; but none of these persons have been employed continuously for any lengthened period except two.—Hugh Pollen.

Customs: (4) Men are employed at the various ports for a few days or weeks at a time to act temporarily as lockers or tidewaiters. These are paid by the day. (5) Continuously employed.—W. T. Glasgow, Secretary and Inspector. 19/10/94.

Defence (Store): (6) The number shown in this return includes all persons who have performed casual or temporary clerical work for the department in the years named, but the person has not been employed continuously for any lengthened period.—A. EDUCATION: (7) The numbers shown in this return include all persons who have performed casual or temporary clerical work for the department in the years named; but none of these persons have been employed continuously for any lengthened period. (19) One throughout the year—not always the same person—in place of a permanent officer detached for other work; one—not always the same person—for special occasional work, lasting, on the whole, to ten months and sixteen days; and one from 19th February, 1894, acting as Private Secretary. GOVERNMENT INSURANCE: (12) The numbers shown in the above return include all persons who have performed casual or temporary clerical work for the Government Insurance Department in the years named; but none of these persons have been employed continuously for any lengthened periods, except five. Land- and Income-tax: (15) The numbers shown in the above return include all persons who have performed casual or temporary clerical work for the department in the years named; but none of these persons have been employed continuously for any lengthened period, except thirteen (four in 1887-88, and nine in 1893-94).—John McGowan, Commissioner of Taxes. 5/10/94.

Lands and Survey: (10) Thirty-two of the above temporary clerks were employed for twelve months or over, but some of these are not now employed; the return includes all persons who performed temporary work.

LUNACY AND CHARITABLE: (18) Has been employed continuously for more than two years. No persons have been employed for casual clerical work during the above periods.—D. MacGregor. 3/10/94.

MARINE: (19) Examiner of Masters and Mates, Auckland.—W. T. GLASGOW, Secretary.

Mines: (20) The numbers shown in the above return include all persons who have performed casual or temporary clerical work for the department in the years named; but none of these persons have been employed continuously for any lengthened period, except two.—H. J. H. Eliott, Under-Secretary. 19/10/94.

Post and Telegraph: (21) These officers are (with the exception of those specially noted) now on the permanent staff of this department. There are no temporary clerks now employed. Females appointed as cadettes, grade £40 to £120, 9; females appointed as Telephone Exchange cadettes, grade £40 to £80, 28. Three not now in service.
