Return to an Order of the House of Representatives dated 3rd July, 1896.

Ordered, "That there be laid before this House a return of all adults (male and female in separate columns) in the colony of sixty-five years and upwards, indicating in separate columns whether married or single, widower or widow."—(Mr. Joyce.)
