#### REMARKS.

- (a) £5,000 was the estimated net amount chargeable to the vote after providing for the disposal of the exhibit. Authority was subsequently given for a temporary overexpenditure to a gross amount of £11,040 for the erection of the exhibit and for running expenses for the exhibition period. A proportion only of the total cost came to charge during the financial year 1939-40, and provision is taken for the amount required to meet expenses to the closing-date of the exhibition.
