Extracts from the Journals of the House of Representatives

THURSDAY, THE 16TH DAY OF MARCH, 1944

Ordered, "That for the remainder of the session all Select Committees of the House have leave to sit on days on which the House is not sitting."—(Right Hon. Mr. FRASER.)

WEDNESDAY, THE 22ND DAY OF MARCH, 1944

Ordered, "That a Select Committee be appointed, consisting of ten members, to consider all Bills containing provisions of a technical legal character which may be referred to it, with power to confer and sit together with any similar Committee appointed by the Legislative Council: the Committee to consist of the Hon. Mr. Speaker, Mr. Algie, Mr. Bodkin, Mr. Combs, Mr. Denham, Mr. Harker, Mr. Munro, Mr. Richards, Mr. T. C. Webb, and the Mover."—(Hon. Mr. MASON.)

THURSDAY, THE 14TH DAY OF SEPTEMBER, 1944

Ordered, "That the petition of the Reverend Canon W. W. Averill and others be referred direct to the Statutes Revision Committee."—(Mr. P. CARR.)

THURSDAY, THE 19TH DAY OF OCTOBER, 1944

Ordered, "That the Law Reform Bill be referred to the Statutes Revision Committee.—(Hon. Mr. MASON.)

Ordered, "That the Frustrated Contracts Bill be referred to the Statutes Revision Committee."—(Hon. Mr. MASON.)

Ordered, "That the Administration Amendment Bill be referred to the Statutes Revision Committee."—(Hon. Mr. MASON.)

FRIDAY, THE 24TH DAY OF NOVEMBER, 1944

Ordered, "That the Statutes Amendment Bill be referred to the Statutes Revision Committee."—(Hon. Mr. MASON.)
