Visited 23rd December, 1904.—The fine nurses' home is now occupied. The new ward, containing twenty-four beds is, I think, unnecessarily large, but well finished. The lavatory block attached to this ward is not cross-ventilated, and schemes for remedying this were discussed with the Chairman.
