IMMIGRATION:

OCCUPATIONS OF ASSISTED PASSENGERS, 1910-11.

Return to an Order of the House of Representatives dated the 31st August, 1911.

Ordered, "That there be laid before this House a return, in continuation of D.-9, 1911, on immigration, giving the occupations of all persons who have been brought into the Dominion during the last year by means of assisted passages."—(Mr. McLAREN.)

IMMIGRATION: SUMMARY GIVING THE OCCUPATIONS OF ALL PERSONS WHO HAVE BEEN BROUGHT INTO THE DOMINION DURING THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH, 1911, BY MEANS OF ASSISTED PASSAGES.

Domestic duties (wives nominated by husbands in the Dominion)	317

Fisherman	1

The balance of the persons who arrived, numbering 927 souls, had no occupations. They comprised wives coming out with their husbands, and others, not being adults, or being dependent on parents.
