# FINANCIAL STATEMENT

(In Committee of Supply, 1st August, 1917)

BY THE RIGHT HONOURABLE SIR JOSEPH WARD, BART., P.C., K.C.M.G., MINISTER OF FINANCE.

### Mr. Malcolm,—

Since I submitted to honourable members the Budget of 1916–17 the great war has, unfortunately, continued with unabated and, indeed, increased intensity.

It is therefore my duty to review the financial aspect of the past year's operations, covering a period of unprecedented conditions, and to suggest for the consideration of honourable members proposals to meet the increased financial requirements for the year 1917–18.

### REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE.

The revenue and expenditure for the year 1916–17 as compared with the previous financial year are as follow:—

#### REDEMPTIONS AND RENEWALS.

Apart from our obligations to the Imperial Government for war expenses, referred to in another paragraph, the total debt falling due during the year amounted to £1,859,040, and of this amount £466,040 was renewed. £800,300 was redeemed with funds borrowed from the Post Office, £5,500 was provided by the Commissioners of the Public Debts Sinking Funds, while £587,200 was converted under the provisions of section 106 of the Finance Act, 1915.

#### CONVERSIONS.

The conversion scheme authorized by the Finance Act, 1915 (section 106), was continued during the year, with the result that a total sum of £2,133,000 has been converted into debentures with a currency varying to twenty-five years and bearing interest at  $4\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. free of income-tax.

#### TREASURY.

As evidence that the work of this Department has increased both in volume and importance, I may mention that the amount paid into the credit of the Public Account during the financial year immediately preceding the war aggregated £17,000,000, while the total lodgments for last year exceeded £50,000,000.

During the year just ended loan and financial operations of an unprecedented character were undertaken. Over £11,000,000 of the Dominion War Loan of £16,000,000 was raised in New Zealand, at a net cost of ½ per cent. only, which is considerably below the cost of raising loans on the London market.

The average cost of raising the last three loans in London prior to the war was 3½ per cent., and the average cost of raising the two loans in New Zealand during the war was three-eighths of one pound per cent.

Although practically 50 per cent. of the regular Treasury staff has joined the colours, the abnormal increase of work and responsibility thrown upon the Department in administering and controlling such large sums has been efficiently carried out. The staff is at present slightly below its pre-war strength, but it has been found possible by close attention to work and the simplification of methods in the Treasury to carry out the additional duties without increase of staff. I feel it is their due that I should publicly acknowledge their services.

#### IMPORT VALUES.

The values of imports (calculated at invoice value plus 10 per cent., which is the value entered for *ad valorem* duties) as compared with the tonnage landed will give some idea of the increase in the value of merchandise as compared with the period before the outbreak of war. The proportion of value obtained from Great Britain and British ports, United States, and other foreign countries is—

### TRADING WITH THE ENEMY.

On the 26th September, 1916, an Order in Council was issued prohibiting the importation of goods of enemy origin from any destination. Prior to that time there was nothing to prevent the importation of enemy goods held in stock in British possessions prior to the war, and the result was that German and Austrian goods continued to find their way into New Zealand from stocks in Great Britain and Australia. Statements are frequently made that trading with the enemy still continues, and there is little doubt that this impression is due to the fact just stated. Many of the allegations as to enemy trade have been investigated, but in not a single case has it been shown that New Zealand importers have been knowingly receiving goods exported from Germany after the commencement of the war.

Under arrangement made by the Imperial Government certificates of origin and interest are now necessary for goods exported from Switzerland, Holland, Denmark, Norway, and Sweden. These certificates are issued by a British Consular Officer, and are to the effect that it has been proved to his satisfaction that the goods have not been produced or manufactured in enemy territory, and that no person who is an enemy or who is associated with persons of enemy nationality has any interest in the goods.

### STOCKS ON HAND AND ORDERS EXPECTED.

Many merchants have been interviewed to ascertain as nearly as possible the stocks of goods on hand and the orders expected during the present financial year. It is found that in most lines stocks are heavy as compared with this time last year, in many cases quite 50 per cent. greater, but 35 per cent. is a fair average. This is the case with soft-goods, china, fancy goods, tobacco, and cigars. The retail shops are also overstocked, and consequently the wholesale stocks will be slow to clear. Almost every wholesale merchant visited stated that orders to go forward, and already sent forward, would be very much less than during the past year.

Certain classes of goods can be procured from Great Britain only under the certificate of the Honourable Minister of Munitions. These include many chemical salts much used in the industries and manufactures, pig iron, railway material, steel billets, steel angles, channels, joists, and other sectional material and structural work. Saddlery, hardware, tinplates, and other goods are obtained with difficulty.

As against the expected shortage of importations there is the fact that the stocks in the bonded warehouses are heavy. An all-round drop of revenue as compared with 1916–17 must be expected.

#### IMPORTS AND EXPORTS.

The comparative figures showing the values of imports and exports for the financial years 1915–16 and 1916–17 are,—

Had all the shipping-space required been available it is possible that the value of exports for 1916-17 would have equalled that of the previous year.

It is well known that large quantities of cheese, butter, tallow, frozen meat, and other produce have had to be held over through lack of ships.

### LAND-TAX AND INCOME-TAX.

The net receipts for the past year amounted to £4,975,244, made up of land-tax £713,118, income-tax £4,262,126, and compared with the collection for the previous year show an increase of £2,534,769.

### LAND-TAX.

The land-tax receipts compared with those of 1915–16 show a decrease of £335,238, which is accounted for by the abolition of the tax on mortgages. The comparison is as follows:—

### MENTAL HOSPITALS.

The total expenditure for the year on mental hospitals was £212,739, and the receipts for maintenance, sales of produce, &c., amounted to £68,190, leaving a net expenditure of £144,549, an increase of £14,758 over the previous year. This is accounted for by the rise in the price of provisions (meat, flour, oatmeal, sugar, &c.) and bedding and clothing on account of the war, and by the large increase in the number of patients during the year.

The vote shows an unexpended balance of £5,803 at the end of the financial year.

### PUBLIC HEALTH.

The necessity of conserving child-life to meet the ravages caused by the war has received attention. The birth-rate continues to show a regrettable decline, and though this is partially compensated for by our low death-rate the position cannot be regarded as satisfactory. Possibly economic causes are responsible to some extent, but I fear the real causes are to be found elsewhere.

The care of our sick and wounded soldiers on their return from the front has been satisfactorily provided for in the general hospitals, as well as at the Convalescent Homes at Rotorua, Hanmer, Devonport, Lowry Bay, &c. To meet the cases of tubercular disease arising out of war service the Consumptive Sanatorium at Te Waikato, Cambridge, has been enlarged, and the Otaki Sanatorium has been taken over from the Wellington Hospital Board and enlarged. Soldiers suffering from neurasthenia and shell-shock are specially treated at Karitane (Puketeraki), and the Wolfe Home, Avondale. Numbers of discharged soldiers suffering from a recurrence of illness caused by war service have also been treated

in the various institutions. During the year a St. Helens Home was established at Invercargill. At Napier the Hospital Board has been able to establish a maternity hospital through the gift of a property suitable for the purpose by Mr. L. H. McHardy. Other Boards are considering the establishment of maternity wards in connection with the general hospitals under their control.

### POST AND TELEGRAPH DEPARTMENT.

The amount of revenue collected during the year was £1,815,558. It includes the war-tax of  $\frac{1}{2}$ d. on each article of postal matter excepting newspapers, and the 2d. war-tax on telegrams.

Notwithstanding the fact that over £1,415,000 war-loan certificates were sold by the Post Office, the Savings-bank business reached an unprecedented total, the deposits being £15,576,408, and the withdrawals £12,957,420. The balance standing to credit of Post Office Savings-bank depositors reached the very considerable total of £25,603,209, an increase of £3,436,844.

The money-order and postal-note business was normal, the total issues for the

year amounting to £4,269,341, and the payments to £3,945,525.

Of the total revenue, postages produced £913,458, telegrams £413,854, and telephone exchanges £317,275, the difference being made up of miscellaneous items.

The principal increases in business were in connection with the telephone exchange, and the allied work of bureau communications. The annual report of the Department gives full details of the matters here briefly noticed.

### STAMP DEPARTMENT.

The revenue from this Department still shows an upward tendency. During the last seven or eight years it has increased considerably each year; prior to that period the revenue approximated half a million per annum, whereas this year the amount collected was £1,699,035, as against £1,470,307 last year, an increase of £228,728.

The revenue from the totalizator, due to the increased duties under the Finance Act and the additional investments by the public during the year, shows a marked increase—viz., from £179,547 in 1915—16 to £251,436 in 1916—17.

The bank-note tax has, owing to the withdrawal of gold coin from circulation

and the legalizing of bank-notes, increased by approximately 25 per cent.

The fact must not be overlooked that if the shipping-facilities do not soon return to normal conditions a considerable fall in the revenue from stamp duties may be expected.

### LAND REVENUE.

The gross revenue received from Crown and endowment lands during the year amounted to £1,241,366, made up as follows:—

The amounts outstanding at the close of the year were £25,478 postponements of rental and £22,815 ordinary arrears.

### LAND FOR SOLDIERS.

During the year ended 31st March, 1917, twenty-five settlements were purchased with a view to settling thereon soldiers who have been discharged from active service. Eighteen of the settlements have been subdivided and offered for selection, and the majority of the sections have been allotted. In addition, 201,210 acres of Crown and settlement lands have been subdivided and offered to discharged men.

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The total area proclaimed as available for selection by discharged soldiers to date, 31st March, 1917, is 337,961 acres, comprising 712 holdings.

Up to the 31st March, 1917, 384 discharged soldiers and members of the Expeditionary Force have been placed on holdings, the total area allotted being 309,092 acres.

Where necessary, arrangements will be made to temporarily relet large areas of pastoral runs in the South Island suitable for subdivision, the licenses of which expire in March, 1918, in order that the soldiers may compete for them on their return at the conclusion of the war. The question of extending the licenses will be finally decided in September, by which time it will be apparent if such extension is required.

The majority of the soldier-settlers readily adapt themselves to their new occupation—in fact, the success of some of the settlements is already assured. The settlers are doing well, and improving their holdings with the aid of Government advances

Owing to the comparatively small number of discharged men who desire to take up land there has been so far no difficulty in meeting the demand; and, in anticipation of the return of a large number of soldiers in the near future, efforts are being made to have suitable land available to meet the demand as it arises.

### FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE TO SOLDIERS.

Up to the 31st March last advances amounting to £62,421 were authorized to 199 soldier-settlers. Of this sum, £30,168 was advanced to 143 men. The advances were made under the Discharged Soldiers Settlement Act, 1915, for the purpose of enabling buildings to be erected and bushfelling, fencing, and ploughing to be done; in addition, assistance has been given to purchase stock, comprising cattle, sheep, horses, and pigs, also seed oats, wheat, and potatoes. Grass-seed and fencing-wire have been purchased in bulk and distributed to many of these settlers in accordance with their requirements, and the value thereof secured by mortgage.

All advances are secured by first mortgage, and bills of sale given against chattels as collateral security. Great care is exercised to see that sufficient security is provided before the money is advanced.

Under the Act authority is given to raise £100,000 for the purpose of making advances to discharged soldiers; but as £62,421 was committed at the 31st March, and further heavy requests are likely to be made during the year, the borrowing-powers under the Act will have to be substantially increased.

To relieve the financial strain upon men serving with the Expeditionary Forces, or who have been discharged from active service, remissions of rent, amounting to £5,311, have been provided, and to meet cases arising during the current year I estimate that about £10,500 will be required.

#### LAND FOR ORDINARY SETTLERS.

Owing to large areas of suitable lands being set aside for disposal to discharged soldiers the total area offered for general application during the year was restricted to small, rough, or isolated areas, and education and other reserves. In addition, considerable areas of land opened in previous years and remaining unselected are available for public selection.

#### AGRICULTURE.

The agricultural industry, covering pastoral, dairying, and horticultural operations, has continued to maintain its position as an important factor in the prosperity of the Dominion.

Agricultural products have again proved the leading feature of our exports, notwithstanding the fact that a large amount of produce, which would under normal conditions have been exported during the year, still remains in store owing to lack of shipping-facilities.

The majority of the items of agricultural exports, it is true, show decreases when compared with the extraordinarily large figures for the previous year, although

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wheat, beef, hemp, and a few minor items show advances in both quantity and value, while butter, cheese, sheep-skins, and tallow show increases in value notwithstanding the reduction in the amount exported.

The principal reasons for these decreases, which in most cases are not large, are, firstly, the above-mentioned shortage of shipping-space; and, secondly, the diminution in the demand from Australia for oats, potatoes, chaff, peas, and beans, which were required in the preceding year owing to the drought which affected local production.

It is a matter of congratulation that the agricultural exports do not show any appreciable decrease that may be fairly attributed to the strain placed upon

the rural districts by the shortage of labour owing to the war.

The world's demand for our wool, meat, dairy-produce, hides, skins, tallow, hemp, fruit, and other products seems certain to be more than maintained, and, provided ships are available for the transport of our output, increased production may be anticipated.

### STATE FORESTS.

To assist forestry operations power was given in last year's Finance Act to raise £50,000, of which £10,000 was actually borrowed during the year. This sum, together with £4,250 contributed out of the Consolidated Fund and royalties, enabled the Lands Department to meet expenditure amounting to £27,810, being £2,503 less than the expenditure of the previous year.

As all the plantable land at Hanmer was filled it became necessary to find more land in Canterbury suitable for tree-planting. An area of 6,593 acres of the poor part of the Balmoral Estate was therefore purchased. As the land is only sixty-two miles from Christchurch, and is on the railway, it is in a very favourable position for profitable timber-production, and can readily be supplied with young trees from the nursery at Hanmer.

Owing to the continuance of the war, proposals for the expansion of afforestation could not be given effect to this year. However, when the financial pressure is relieved it is proposed to extend this important work.

As a result of the conditions produced by the war the revenue derived

from timber has fallen somewhat.

The scheme of State assistance in connection with tree-planting by farmers has proved very satisfactory, and the demand for trees for farm plantations and shelter-belts is increasing.

### LAND FOR SETTLEMENTS.

The operations of the Department have been confined principally to the purchase of land for discharged soldiers. The area purchased amounts to 50,140 acres, valued at £564,110. The offers received have been based upon the high values now ruling for all produce, therefore it has been a hard matter to secure lands except on such a basis.

### SWAMP-LAND RECLAMATION.

The reclamation of Hauraki and Rangitaiki Plains has been steadily carried on during the past year, with most beneficial results. Owing, however, to the exigencies of the war it has not been possible to obtain all the labour or machinery required, and this has prevented the opening of new areas for selection on the Hauraki Plains.

Under the provisions of the Swamp Drainage Act, 1915, reclamation-work has been started in connection with Poukawa, Kaitaia, and Waihi areas. Suitable labour has been difficult to obtain for the reasons above stated; and the dredges ordered from England have not as yet been delivered, owing to the demands on the contractors by the Imperial Government for war material.

It is intended from time to time to bring other areas under the provisions of this general Act, as the success attending present undertakings fully warrants the development of the swamp lands of the Dominion,

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#### STATE ADVANCES OFFICE.

This important Department of the State is still continuing its operations, although the lending Board has since the war began found it necessary to restrict the amounts which can be lent to any one local authority or individual.

A considerable amount is being lent to local authorities, but no individual

authority is granted a loan in excess of £5,000 in any year.

The maximum allowed a settler for improvements is £1,000, while under the

Workers Branch the full limit allowed by law—£450—is being advanced.

The rate of interest has remained unaltered. The rate chargeable to local authorities is  $4\frac{1}{2}$  per cent., and to settlers and workers 5 per cent., reducible to  $4\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. for prompt payment.

### DEFENCE DEPARTMENT.

The necessary details regarding the expenditure of the Defence Department are set out in the annual report of the General Officer Commanding the New Zealand Military Forces, a reference to which will show that the work of the Defence staff, both military and civil, has increased enormously.

The war expenditure for the year ended 31st March, 1917, amounted to £14,344,523, including pay of troops, cost of transport, supplies, equipment, relief moneys, and all maintenance or other charges in connection with the war, as well as the administrative expenses of the National Efficiency Board, Munitions and Supplies Board, Soldiers' Financial Assistance Board, and Discharged Soldiers Information Department.

The total war expenditure up to the 31st March, 1917, with advances out-

standing, amounted to £23,337,475.

If the present rate of reinforcements is maintained it is estimated that a sum of £24,000,000 will be required for the financial year 1917–18. Details of the expenditure will be laid before the House in due course by the Hon. the Minister of Defence.

It is a matter of congratulation that during the year all necessary reinforcement drafts were despatched from New Zealand with unfailing regularity, and that they reached their destination safely.

General satisfaction is expressed by the authorities in the United Kingdom and Egypt at the efficiency and quality of the reinforcements which have arrived during the year.

The training syllabus in New Zealand is kept up to date, and is systematically arranged so as to afford progressive instruction from the time the recruit arrives in camp until the reinforcements reach the advanced training-depots in England.

The training of the home Forces has been arranged in such a manner as to clash as little as possible with public requirements. To permit of this, power has been granted to local military authorities to grant leave without reference to general headquarters, and, in the case of men employed in essential industries, to grant exemption from their annual training in the Territorial Force.

The supply of clothing, equipment, and supplies has generally proved satisfactory, and all military requisitions have been amply filled under direction of the Hon. the Minister of Munitions and Supplies.

Notwithstanding the great pressure of work occasioned by the war, the organization of the administrative and financial services has been proceeding steadily along the standard lines laid down when compulsory military training was determined

The unprecedented conditions which have obtained created difficulties which could not have been foreseen, but these difficulties have been satisfactorily met and overcome, while the experience gained during the war is already being applied. In this connection the services of officers who have recently returned from the front are being freely utilized. The control over issues, and the existing independent departmental checks, are being gradually extended and improved.

The arrangement whereby the Controller and Auditor-General's statutory examination of vouchers and war accounts proceeds concurrently with the payment of claims is proving satisfactory. Honourable members will, I am sure, be glad to have the assurance that by this means an accumulation of war accounts is prevented, that the requirements of law are met as the work of accounting proceeds, and that all expenditure is duly authorized and supported by satisfactory receipts or vouchers.

#### MUNITIONS AND SUPPLIES.

Owing to an extension of the activities of the Military Supplies Purchase Office, it was early this year found more convenient to transact business connected with coal-supplies, priority permits, and the purchase of military supplies under the title of "Munitions and Supplies Department," and a Department accordingly has been established.

The Government became apprehensive in December last of possible shortages in supplies of coal, and six cargoes were, during that month, secured from the Admiralty. The supply so received has been treated in the nature of a reserve stock, and has, during the recent reduction in the New Zealand mines' output, been of great benefit to the Dominion, and has been utilized for the purpose of maintaining transport both on land and sea as well as for other national purposes. The terms upon which the reserve of coal has been disposed of provide that the users shall return equivalent quantities of Newcastle or New Zealand West Coast coal, so that the reserve shall be maintained.

At the request of the Ministry of Munitions in the United Kingdom the Government established a local authority in the Dominion for the purpose of advising the Ministry in regard to the position of import orders from the United Kingdom. The method of dealing with business of this nature has been productive of satisfactory results to New Zealand importers, who otherwise might not have secured The work done by the High Commissioner in this connection has been greatly appreciated by our commercial community.

The work of purchasing stores and supplies for New Zealand military purposes has been steadily pursued. Towards the close of last year the military authorities were requested to as far as possible estimate their requirements for the calendar year 1917. On being costed the position was found to be: (a) Stores, £727,510;

(b) supplies, £568,918; (c) drugs, £17,460: total, £1,313,888.

To date, orders for goods to the value of £612,090 have been placed, leaving goods to the value of approximately £701,798 to be purchased during the balance of this year.

The policy of concentrating orders and of purchasing ahead, which was followed during last year, has proved a sound and economical one for the Government.

### SAMOAN ADMINISTRATION.

The estimates for the British occupation of Samoa show an excess of revenue

over expenditure.

The health of the garrison continues good, and the number of troops employed is reduced to the lowest minimum consistent with safety. Reinforcements for this garrison are drawn mainly from men just over the age of enlistment in the Expeditionary Force.

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### WAR-RELIEF FUNDS.

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During the past financial year the public has continued to subscribe very handsomely towards the various relief funds, and has also made liberal donations of comforts for our troops and for the civil populations suffering from the effects of the war. The amounts contributed through the Government by the people of the Dominion are,—

In addition to the contributions in money and kind, it is estimated that the total funds raised by the patriotic societies to the 31st March, 1917, amount to £2,095,931.

### MINING.

The value of the minerals exported for the year 1916 was £1,726,659, which is less than the value exported during the previous year by £375,771. This decrease is more apparent than real, as it is due very largely to the stoppage of the export of gold during the latter part of the year 1914. Owing to this stoppage the accumulations for the year 1914 were exported during the year 1915, consequently the exports for 1915 were unduly inflated.

The output of coal for the year 1916 was 2,257,135 tons, an increase of 48,511 tons above that of the previous year. With the exception of the output for the year 1914, the above figures constitute a record for the Dominion. The maintenance of the output, in view of the shortage of labour and the lack of shipping, is a matter for congratulation.

#### INDUSTRIAL CONDITIONS.

As was the case last year, there has been practically no unemployment. Trade has been brisk throughout the Dominion, and there has been a considerable shortage of men in many branches of industry. The question of meeting the requirements of the Dominion in this direction is receiving the attention of the Government.

The shortage of labour and the increase in the cost of living were the causes of a number of industrial disputes during the year under review. In most cases the disputes were settled without much loss of time or output. The year was important in this connection, inasmuch as the currency of the awards and agreements for seamen and waterside workers and also for most of the coal-miners of the Dominion had expired.

#### WORKERS' DWELLINGS.

In addition to the completion of thirty-seven dwellings commenced in the previous year, twenty-eight new dwellings have been built, and eleven were also in course of erection on the 31st March, making the total number of workers' dwellings in the Dominion 629. The year's expenditure under this heading was £35,437.

### STATE SOCIAL INSURANCE SYSTEM.

### NATIONAL PROVIDENT FUND.

The progress of the fund has been maintained, and the general membership at the 31st March last numbered 10,143, with accumulated funds amounting to £135,000.

Maternity benefits during the year 1916 totalled £3,776, claimed by 634 contributors.

The contributors on active service at the end of last year numbered 2,117. One-half the contributions of soldier contributors while on active service is being paid by the Government. This grant amounted to £5,739 in the year 1916–17.

The branch of the fund's operations relating to local authorities' superannuation has received attention. Several local bodies have become contributors on behalf of their staffs under the special tables adopted by the National Provident Fund Board. The steps so far taken in connection with this important reform are such as to encourage the hope that a general scheme of superannuation will before long be in operation for local-authority employees.

A system of maternity and annuity benefits for friendly societies under the amending legislation of last session is now in operation. Owing to the delay incidental to the inauguration of a new system the claims for maternity allowances chargeable to the vote for the last financial year did not reach the estimated expenditure. The allowances will, however, be carried forward and included in the current year's vote. For friendly-society maternity allowances I will ask the House to provide £22,000.

### FRIENDLY SOCIETIES.

A "Reinsurance Fund" has been established, and is being administered by the Minister of Finance, the Minister of Friendly Societies, and the Registrar. This fund pools the whole of the death war risks on account of members on military service, the Government paying one-half the total premiums and the societies the other half, for the purpose of insuring each member as he joins the Expeditionary Forces. The amount of premiums and State subsidy held on account thereof amounted at the 31st March to £16,035 3s. 6d., insuring members for a total sum of £200,424.

### DEPARTMENT OF TOURIST AND HEALTH RESORTS.

The progress shown by this Department in last year's Financial Statement has been continued. The direct revenue returns disclose an increase of £2,088 over last year, having risen from £31,048 to £33,136.

There has been a considerable influx of travellers from America, and the Australian traffic has also been satisfactory considering the existing conditions.

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#### LIGHTHOUSES.

The Okuri Point Lighthouse, near the French Pass, has been completed, and the light was first exhibited on the 24th June, 1916.

Owing to the unsatisfactory way the Pintsch-gas light on Jackson's Head has been acting it was decided to replace it with an Aga acetone-acetylene light. This was completed on the 19th March last, and so far has given every satisfaction.

During the year incandescent lights were installed at Cape Foulwind and

Manukau South Head Lighthouses.

#### HARBOUR-WORKS.

An automatic Aga acetone-acetylene light has been erected on Takataka Rock, at the northern end of the Narrows in the upper part of the Hokianga River. It was first exhibited on the 12th December last.

An acetone light was installed on the large red buoy about two miles east of Dog Point in the Northern Wairoa River, Kaipara Harbour. The light was exhibited from this buoy on the 24th October last.

Owing to the necessity for economy during the war very little has been done in regard to harbour-works beyond keeping the existing works in a state of repair.

During the year the beacons marking the entrance to the Waikato River were re-crected. For some considerable time vessels had not used this entrance, but of late steamers have commenced to again work the port.

### GOVERNMENT STEAMERS.

During the year the "Hinemoa" has continued to carry out the duty of tendering the various lighthouses, in addition to overhauling and painting all coastal buoys and beacons and buoys in harbours under the control of this Department.

The training-ship "Amokura," used for training boys for the sea, has made three trips to the southern islands in search of castaways, and has examined the provision-depots maintained by the Government for the benefit of persons ship-wrecked there.

No difficulty has been experienced in maintaining the full complement of sixty boys, and at present there is a large number of boys waiting for admission when vacancies occur.

### IMMIGRATION.

Owing to the continuance of the war there was a great falling-off in the number of immigrants arriving in the Dominion during the year ended 31st March, 1917. The majority of those brought out under the Government scheme are the wives and families of persons who are already resident in the Dominion, and domestic servants.

The policy of not granting assisted passages to any persons who are eligible for military service has been adhered to. At the conclusion of the war it is proposed to inaugurate a more vigorous immigration policy, and to make provision which will enable a number of widows and orphans of fallen soldiers and sailors to emigrate to New Zealand.

### PUBLIC TRUST OFFICE.

The net profits for the year are, approximately, £59,000. This is the highest in the history of the Office, and affords ample evidence of the efficiency of the administration, the growth of the business, and the ever-increasing confidence of the public.

The first annual bonus to beneficiaries was paid during the year out of excess profits. The amount distributed exceeded £22,000. A similar bonus,

amounting to £27,000, will be distributable this year.

The preparation of the wills of soldiers at Trentham by qualified legal officers is still continued, and thousands of soldiers have appointed the Public Trustee their executor. Moreover, hundreds have also appointed the Public Trustee attorney to supervise and manage their estates during their absence at

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the war. For preparation of wills and powers of attorney no charge is made. Where the Public Trustee administers or acts as attorney the charges are fixed on a specially reduced scale. In this way, as also in the control of enemy property and other matters, the Public Trust Office is rendering very valuable assistance during the war period.

#### INSURANCE OF PUBLIC BUILDINGS.

During the year claims amounting to £4,576 were paid out of the special sinking fund established to meet losses on public buildings destroyed by fire.

The annual contribution of £10,000 made by the Government was paid over to the Public Trustee, by whom a credit balance of £48,988 is now held.

### STATE FIRE INSURANCE.

For the past year the volume of business and the profits derived by the State Fire Insurance Office have exceeded all previous records. The net premium for 1916 amounted to £82,694, as compared with £76,299 for the previous year, showing an increase of £6,395. The net profits, after placing £1,000 to Investment Fluctuation Reserve and £2,577 to Unearned-premium Reserve, amounted to £35,697. The largest profit previously recorded amounted to £25,652, for the year 1915. The loss ratio for 1916 was 28·22 per cent. of premium income, which is an abnormally low ratio. For previous years the loss ratio has ranged from 38·6 per cent. to 70·9 per cent.

The total accumulated funds at the close of 1916 amounted to £155,958, an increase over the previous year of £39,274.

### GOVERNMENT PRINTING AND STATIONERY DEPARTMENT.

The inflated price of paper, stationery, and stores will necessitate a considerable increase in the vote required for the Printing and Stationery Department for the present year. In some cases prices have increased by as much as 200 per cent., and rarely can goods be purchased at less than an advance of 25 per cent. on previous values.

### PUBLIC SERVICE SUPERANNUATION FUND.

During the year ended 31st December, 1916, retiring-allowances aggregating £11,693 per annum were granted to sixty-seven contributors by reason of age or length of service; fourteen contributors who retired as medically unfit were granted allowances amounting to £751 per annum; forty-four widows and fifty-five children were granted the statutory allowances, totalling £1,507 per annum; seventy-three allowances, amounting to £4,829 per annum, were discontinued. The total number of existing allowances at the end of the year was 1,233, representing an aggregate annual payment of £88,392. The total amount invested to the 31st December, 1916, was £834,341, yielding interest at an average of  $5\frac{1}{4}$  per cent.

### EDUCATION.

The year just closed has been marked by important reforms in the financial and administrative methods and general work of the Education Department. Special consideration has been given to primary education, and steps have been taken to make instruction more thorough.

The natural growth of the population compels an extension of educational facilities. This extension and the increase due to statutory provisions account for most of the additional expenditure included in the estimates for the year. The difference between the amount expended last year and the estimated expenditure for the year 1917–18 is £76,787, and of this amount £57,000 is due to increases in statutory grants.

It should be recognized that the Education vote is not utilized for primary, secondary, technical, and university instruction only. Of the total vote a sum of £61,000 was spent for the maintenance of industrial schools, institutions for the deaf, schools for backward children, infant-life protection, education of the blind, medical inspection, physical training, subsidies to libraries, and many miscellaneous services of a subsidiary character.

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### Special Schools.

The extensive work connected with the industrial and special schools branch has been carefully overhauled, and improved methods have been introduced, which will limit waste and secure better results for the money expended.

The number of children dealt with in industrial schools at the end of the year was 3,283, while the expenditure was £40,000. The system of probation inaugurated at Auckland some three years ago has proved successful, and is about to be extended to the other three centres of population.

As a result of a new classification of inmates, together with a more extensive system of boarding out or licensing out inmates, there will be a considerable

saving in both capital and annual expenditure.

The annual saving in maintenance ultimately resulting from the new policy is estimated at £15,000. This economy will be effected not only without detriment to the welfare of the children concerned, but in some respects with a decided

benefit to the present inmates.

As a matter of national well-being it is important that the Government should deal comprehensively with the question of the care of all feeble-minded children in the Dominion. At present the Education Department has about a hundred and fifty cases in its care, and the Mental Hospitals Department about a hundred, but it appears that there are at least six hundred other cases of feeble-minded young people who should be taken charge of by the State. The whole question should be dealt with before the number of cases has an opportunity of multiplying.

### SCHOOL BUILDINGS.

Since the outbreak of war the increased cost of material and labour has seriously affected all building proposals. Only works which were absolutely essential have been authorized; but as a result of this action the Department will, when normal conditions prevail, be faced with heavy demands involving large sums to replace school buildings which are at present unsuitable. Efforts have been made to standardize school buildings with a view to greater economy in future.

In the accounts of Education Boards the recent amalgamation of districts has brought into prominence the position of Boards with respect to the annual allowances made for the maintenance and replacement of schools, and the methods of dealing therewith. The position disclosed is more or less unsatisfactory, and proposals have been made for the establishment of a better system of providing funds for replacements.

### TEACHERS' SUPERANNUATION FUND.

The income during the year ended the 31st December, 1916, was £90,481, made up as follows: Contributions of members, £56,038; interest on outstanding contributions, £255; interest from Public Trustee, £16,466; contributions transferred from other funds, £722; Government subsidy, £17,000. The expenditure for the year was £49,905. The value of the fund on the 31st December, 1916, was £381,158, as against £340,582 on the 31st December, 1915, an increase of £40,576. The number of contributors increased from 4,444 on the 31st December, 1915, to 4,653 at the end of 1916, an increase of 209. The annual allowances payable as at the end of 1916 were £44,666, as against £39,000 at the end of 1915.

Provision has been made for the payment by the Government of the contributions of members of the fund who have enlisted with the Expeditionary Force, until the release of the contributors from military duties. The number of contributors who have joined the Force is approximately 350.

### BOARD OF TRADE.

The Board of Trade, constituted under the Cost of Living Act, 1915, has carried out important duties during the year. Its operations have resulted in a considerable saving of expense to the consumers of commodities which are in common use. Where it appeared necessary and the common interest demanded it, maximum prices have been fixed by regulations under the Regulation of Trade and Commerce Act. It

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will be seen from the report of the Board, which will be presented to Parliament shortly, that, according to reliable official statistics, the scale of food-prices in New Zealand is lower than that obtaining in the other countries mentioned in the report.

Comprehensive information has been obtained by the Board for the Government as a result of its investigations into the prices of butter, wheat, flour, bread, and petrol. The serious rise in meat-prices over pre-war rates in several towns in New Zealand was made the subject of special inquiry. Prices were steadied, and in some towns controlled, by allowing butchers to draw their supplies from stocks of meat which were being held for the Imperial Government. In Auckland, where meat-prices were comparatively higher than in other centres, two meat-depots were opened under State control. The saving to the consumers effected by the operation of these depots, and the meat question generally, will be fully dealt with in the Board's report above referred to.

#### PENSIONS.

The gross payments made under the Pensions Act, 1913, through the Post Office during the year were as follows:—

These figures show increases over the figures of last year of £890 for old-age pensions and £1,659 for widows' pensions, with a decrease on account of military pensions of £2,600, making a net decrease in all of £51.

Payments of miners' pensions under the Miner's Phthisis Act, 1915, totalled

£8,065.

The numbers of widows' and miners' pensions represent increases of 134 and 118 respectively over the figures of the previous year, while the old-age and Maori War pensions have decreased by 107 and 91 respectively.

### WAR PENSIONS.

The claims for war pensions dealt with from the passing of the War Pensions Act in August, 1915, to the 31st March, 1917, total 7,337, made up of 4,677 from discharged soldiers and 2,660 from dependants of deceased and disabled soldiers. These have been dealt with as follows:—

Of the total pensions granted, some 1,300, which were granted for a period only, have been terminated, and the annual liability in regard to the remainder at the close of the year stood at £270,000.

The gross payments made by way of pension in New Zealand during the year amounted to £176,982, to which must be added the amounts paid to dependants of returned soldiers, who subsequently became pensioners, by way of allotment after the date of casualty, and also payments made to pensioners residing in Great Britain and Australia by the High Commissioner and Commonwealth pension authorities respectively, amounting in all to another £15,000 at present, of which amount some £7,500 only had been brought to charge at the close of the year.

#### IMPERIAL GOVERNMENT SUPPLIES.

During the past year the operations of the Department controlling Imperial Government supplies have been considerably extended.

### FROZEN MEAT.

The handling of frozen meat began on the 3rd March, 1915; the total shipments amounted to 1,313,748 quarters beef, 5,279,408 carcases mutton, 6,928,023 carcases lamb; and the payments, £15,800,701.

The prices which had been current from the date of the inception of the scheme were increased as from the 20th October, 1916, as follows: Mutton and lamb,  $\frac{7}{8}$ d. per pound increase; beef,  $\frac{1}{2}$ d. per pound increase.

The number of insulated steamers despatched during the twelve months ended 31st March last was seventy-six, compared with eighty-one for the previous year.

Four steamers provided with insulated space engaged in the New Zealand trade were reported as having been sunk by the enemy during the year.

### SHEEP-SKINS AND HIDES.

The purchase of sheep-skins and hides commenced on the 1st February, 1917. The number of sheep-skins purchased was 213,202, at a cost of £60,883.

Hides and calf-skins are being valued, purchased, and shipped for the Imperial Government. No transactions had taken place up to the 31st March, 1917.

### WOOL.

Early in November, 1916, the Imperial Government advised that it was proposed to requisition all wool comprising the New Zealand 1916–17 clip, and iii—B. 6.

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after consultation with representative growers and other persons connected with the wool industry a price was agreed upon which represented an advance of 55 per cent. on pre-war prices.

The export of wool was prohibited on the 18th November, 1916, and on the 21st December following, a Proclamation was issued requisitioning all wool of the

1916-17 clip.

No organization or machinery existed to give effect to the requisition of the Imperial Government, and the Minister of Agriculture appointed an Advisory Committee to deal with all matters affecting the preliminary details and assist the Department.

The scouring of low-grade wool and the purchase and fellmongering of sheep-

skins on behalf of the Imperial Government have been undertaken.

The results of the operations from the 1st December, 1916, up to the 31st March, 1917, were: Total number of bales valued, 421,388; number of bales shipped, 219,030; number of bales paid for, 399,529; total payments made, £9,315,924.

### CHEESE.

The arrangement entered into with the Imperial Government under which one-third of the production of cheese for the season 1915–16 was made available for Army purposes was completed on the 1st October, 1916. The quantity shipped

was 189,502 crates, and the total payments £917,748.

On the 16th January, 1917, the export of cheese was prohibited, and arrangements were made with the factories for the purchase on behalf of the Imperial Government of all first-grade and second-grade cheese available for export; the price was fixed at  $9\frac{1}{2}$ d. per pound for first-grade and  $9\frac{1}{4}$ d. per pound for second-grade cheese. Satisfactory arrangements for payment of the cheese and for storage were made with the Imperial Government.

During the 1916-17 season the shipments totalled 153,845 crates, and the

payments £1,547,408.

Owing to the shortage of shipping facilities in the early part of the season very heavy accumulations of cheese resulted, and it became necessary to keep much of the supply in stores which were more or less unsuitable for the purpose. To meet this difficulty special representations were made to the Imperial Government through the Right Hon. the Prime Minister, with the result that large shipments were provided for during March and April, 1917.

As a means of checking any possible risk of deterioration, arrangements have been entered into with the overseas shipping companies under which the cheese

is now being carried at a reduced temperature.

### GENERAL.

The purchase of scheelite started on the 20th September, 1915; 350 tons were shipped, for which £67,480 was paid.

The total payments made to producers on behalf of the Imperial Government from the 3rd March, 1915, to the 31st March, 1917, amounted to £27,819,116.

### RESERVE.

I announced in last year's Budget that a special reserve had been established in London for the purpose of meeting possible sudden demands resulting from the war. I felt that the Reserve Fund of £800,000 ordinarily maintained in London was insufficient under the present unusual conditions, and I have invested in London

out of surplus revenues a sum of £3,917,731 for this purpose.

The public has been placing a large amount of its cash at call with the Post Office, and I feel convinced that when peace is declared a very considerable proportion of these deposits will be claimed. We have been borrowing these Post Office deposit-moneys for war purposes and other local needs, and it is probable that the Consolidated Fund may after the war have to repurchase some of the securities it has given to the Post Office to enable the Postal Department to meet its obligations.

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Since the war began we have borrowed approximately £10,000,000 from the Post Office. This is apart from the sum raised by the Post Office on five-year war certificates. After peace is declared it is probable that increased internal developments and business activities, together with the necessity of repairing the world-wide damage caused by the war, will create a great demand for money, and it would be cheaper for the Government to have its own money for use then than to borrow. It must not be forgotten, however, that the Post Office call-moneys are still accumulating and must be invested. At the end of the current year the total borrowed and invested by the Treasury from the Post Office will, in all probability, largely exceed £10,000,000.

I trust honourable members and the country will recognize how important it is to have each year's surplus of revenue during the war invested and held for repayment to the depositors in the Post Office, and should events show it is not necessary for that purpose, then it should be used for paying off war advances from the

Imperial Government.

The above £3,917,731 has been invested in Imperial Government securities, which can, of course, be realized if the necessity to do so should arise. The important fact remains that we have a strong Reserve Fund in London, which gives a financial advantage to the Dominion during the war that cannot be overestimated.

#### WAR EXPENDITURE.

Since the commencement of hostilities the war expenditure of the Dominion had, up to 30th June last, reached the large sum of £28,439,912, and as this expenditure is increasing in proportion to the increased number of men we are despatching to the seat of war, it is probable that by the time the House meets again the expenditure will have reached £50,000,000, and I need not remind honourable members of the sacrifices which the people of the Dominion must be prepared to make in order to meet this huge expenditure. It is of paramount importance that this should be recognized by every one in the country.

I am pleased to be able to inform honourable members that not only has a considerable amount of money for war purposes been raised in New Zealand through the Treasury and Post Office Departments, but funds have been provided

for carrying on other necessary services as well.

It will be remembered that during the early stages of the war the Dominion was dependent upon the Imperial Government for advances to enable it to train and equip its soldiers and maintain them at the seat of war. For a time this was necessary, but as soon as it was possible for New Zealand to provide its own funds for defraying the expenditure necessary for the conduct of its share of the war it was done.

The current expenditure in connection with the war may be estimated at approximately £1,900,000 a month. Fortunately, however, the resources of the country are able to bear the heavy strain which is being placed upon them, and though anxious as to the future I have the utmost confidence that the people of the Dominion can be fully relied upon to provide the necessary means.

In addition to the expenses of training, equipment, transport, &c., of our troops, there are maintenance expenses being continually incurred at the seat of war, which, for the purposes of convenience, are being defrayed by the Imperial Government. Claims are subsequently made by the War Office to cover this expenditure, and the claims so made up and provided for to the 31st December, 1916, amounted to £4,500,000.

During last session of Parliament I asked the House to grant the necessary authority to enable the Government to raise a sum of £16,000,000 for the purpose mentioned, and immediate steps were taken to place the prospectus before the public for the flotation of a loan of £8,000,000. The response to this appeal was most gratifying, as this sum was largely oversubscribed.

I wish to thank the banks and other institutions for their liberal subscriptions, and also the Press which assisted materially in making the loan a success. The public also is to be congratulated upon the liberal manner in which it subscribed.

The smaller subscriptions, made chiefly out of the savings of the people through the Post Office Department, amounted to no less a sum than £1,415,000, and I want to thank the small investors for the great assistance they have given in providing so

large a portion of the loan.

I have mentioned above that during the early stages of the war the Imperial Government provided all the funds required by the Dominion for war purposes. The amount so provided amounted to £14,410,000, but in addition to this amount there was a sum of £3,250,000 advanced for the redemption of certain loans which were maturing about the end of 1914, making a total of £17,660,000 advanced since the commencement of the war.

The Dominion gave to the Imperial Government, as security for these several advances, Treasury bills and memoranda of agreement which were renewable year by year. While in London I arranged with the Imperial Government to extend the currency of the greater portion of these loans until 1945 and 1947. By doing so the necessity for going upon the London market during the war was avoided, and it will be recognized that a great saving to the Dominion has been effected. I am sure that the terms obtainable in the open market would have proved most costly to us, and it must be remembered that the country has saved underwriting, commission, brokerage, and other charges, which are inseparable from the floating of a loan on the London market. It is important to remember that by deferring these heavy liabilities for so many years our financial position after the war will be given greater stability.

#### LOAN FOR PUBLIC WORKS.

The expenditure on public works during the war has been greatly curtailed, and in consequence it has been possible from time to time to borrow sufficient money from the Post Office to enable provision to be made for this expenditure.

During the year 1916-17 amounts totalling £500,000 were thus borrowed from the Post Office, and there was at the 31st March an unexhausted authority for

£745,100 available for further necessities.

Although the public-works expenditure will be kept as low as possible during the current year, it will be necessary during this session to ask the House for an additional authority for £750,000. Of this amount £250,000 will be required for telegraph extension. No public loan will, however, be required for these purposes.

### RESULT OF THE YEAR'S OPERATIONS.

This credit balance is large, and was intended by me to be so. The Dominion's financial war requirements are enormous, but not more than the country can stand. There is a considerable shrinkage in the revenue this year, and it is imperative that the Consolidated Fund should be in such a position that it can make up any loss of revenue, and also, if necessary, contribute a portion of the means required for carrying on the war.

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#### WAR LOAN.

In view of the very large expenditure which is being incurred, it will be necessary at an early date to take steps to raise within the Dominion a fresh loan for war purposes, and the House will be asked to grant authority to enable an amount of £24,000,000 to be borrowed. The whole of this sum will not be borrowed at once. I propose to put a loan for £12,000,000 on the market with as little delay as possible. I hope it will not be necessary to raise a second loan of more than £10,000,000, but authority for a margin of an additional £2,000,000 is desirable. The rate of interest will be  $4\frac{1}{2}$  per cent., and will be free of income tax. I will submit a proposal under which a portion of this loan will be made available for payment of death duties. It will be specially earmarked for that purpose. I will make a full statement in regard to it when moving the second reading of the Loan Bill.

I may here state that I propose to introduce a measure this session which will enable subscribers to the new loan to accept either bonds or inscribed stock at their option, and also to convert existing war bonds into stock, while the usual provision for the issue of war certificates through the Post Office will be continued.

In the event of the voluntary contributions falling short of the amount required, I will ask the House for authority to introduce a system of compulsory contribution, under which persons who have not done their part in helping to provide the necessary finance for carrying on the war, and for providing adequate payment to soldiers and their dependants, will be assessed with additional heavy taxation, which I will fully explain when dealing with taxation. I will ask the House to make the authority applicable to those who neglected to take up their part not only of the last war loan, but of any future war loan.

This compulsory system will not be enforced against those whose incomes are under £700 per annum. Those whose earnings are below that amount must be trusted to contribute voluntarily.

This may be regarded as a somewhat drastic measure, but I regret to say it is necessary, as there are many persons of means, and also companies, who subscribed very little, and in some cases nothing at all, to the last loan. I would earnestly impress upon the country the fact that our part in the war cannot be carried on without the necessary ways and means, and all who possess means and do not realize what is their clear duty must be compelled to make the same sacrifice as those who do recognize their duty.

I propose to ask members of Parliament, patriotic societies, and others throughout the Dominion who have already done such excellent work in connection with the war to assist the Government as far as possible by advocating the war loan. I feel sure that the deep interest which is being taken in the welfare of the Dominion by members and others mentioned will ensure their loyal and hearty support, and I am confident that their assistance will be greatly appreciated by the Government and the country.

Steps will be taken to have all war stock that has been taken up locally made available for sale in London, and so have a recognized market for it. This cannot be done until after the war is over, but I have represented the matter in the proper quarter, and I can say that no difficulties will be placed in the way of having this done when it is possible to do so.

### INVESTMENT IN IMPERIAL WAR LOAN.

I have mentioned that the ordinary revenue reserve invested in London amounted to £3,917,731, but there are moneys belonging to other funds also invested there.

While I was in London the great Imperial War Loan was being floated, and, after consulting the Right Hon. the Prime Minister, it was decided that it would be a fitting thing for this important part of the Empire to subscribe a substantial sum towards the loan. I accordingly arranged for the realization of £5,000,000 of Dominion funds which were then invested in London

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on short-dated securities, and invested the amount in the Imperial loan. This investment also possesses the great advantage of providing an additional £5,000,000 of gilt-edged securities for use from time to time in London for financing the Dominion should such at any time be necessary.

The ordinary revenue reserve referred to above contributed £2,073,000

towards this £5,000,000.

I may mention that there are still some other moneys invested in Imperial Treasury bills or on deposit in London. All these investments can, of course, be realized as occasion requires, but as the whole of the investments, with the exception of the ordinary revenue reserve, represent portions of certain funds which are not at present being used in the Dominion the moneys when realized must necessarily be used for the purposes of the respective funds from which they were drawn. At the 31st May the total amount invested in London was £7,048,000.

#### SOLDIERS' DEPENDANTS.

It has been determined to make provision for granting additional allowances to dependants of soldiers, and the House will be asked to amend the war-pensions legislation this session. The necessary expenditure, the amount of which I am not in a position to state at present, will be provided for in the supplementary estimates.

### OLD-AGE, MILITARY, WIDOWS', AND MINERS' PENSIONS.

Some relief on account of the extra cost of living should be given to old-age and military pensioners, widows, and miners, and to enable this to be done I propose to provide £120,000. This will give to old-age and military pensioners, widows, and miners suffering from pneumoconiosis some substantial assistance during the present unusual conditions. I feel sure that the additional sum for these purposes, in the trying times through which those of small means are passing, will not be grudged by the country as a whole.

### WAR BONUS.

There can be no doubt that those who are in receipt of a fixed income by way of salary feel the pinch due to war conditions without having the opportunity of adding to their incomes, and it is necessary that the State, as the largest employer of labour, should recognize this. A war bonus to make provision similar to that of last year will therefore be authorized, and Parliament will be asked to vote a sum of £400,000 for this purpose.

### EXTRAVAGANT LIVING.

The National Efficiency Board has put forward proposals with the view of placing a restriction during the war on the importation of certain articles which may be considered luxuries, and by this means checking the extravagance of some of the people of New Zealand. The Customs estimate a reduction of revenue of £230,000 if these proposals are carried out.

While I entirely sympathize with the objects which the Efficiency Board seeks to attain. I regret to say that after making full inquiries I find that there are so many difficulties in the way that I am not able to give effect to the Board's recommendation. If this were done I should have to obtain the deficiency of revenue by some other means of taxation. At present it is impossible to give up revenue without restoring an equal amount through some other avenue.

### MOTOR-CARS.

Regarding the suggestions made from time to time that a further duty should be imposed upon motor-cars, I wish to state the position for the information of honourable members.

The amount of duty collected on motor-cars imported last year was £148,345. This is an amount of revenue that cannot at present be dispensed with. It is not my prevince as Minister of Finance to place such a duty on any articles which bring in revenue as to prevent importation or bring about xxiii B.—6.

a decrease of revenue to any material extent, because the very difficult task would then be imposed upon me of obtaining an equal amount of revenue from some other source.

Nearly 90 per cent. of the motor-cars imported since the war commenced were for utility purposes, and can in no sense be classed as pleasure-cars. The average price paid per car imported into New Zealand was £150. Motors for business purposes have come here to stay, as is the case all over the world. The time has passed for accepting a general condemnation of their importation on the grounds that they are for pleasure and are not indispensable. We want the revenue. The duty at present is 20 per cent., with a preference of 10 per cent. to Great Britain and any part of the Empire that reciprocates with us.

### AMUSEMENT-TAX.

I propose to levy a duty on admissions to places of amusement similar to that imposed in Great Britain by the Finance (New Duties) Act, 1916. This duty will commence at 1d. where the price of admission, exclusive of the duty, does not exceed 6d., proceeding in graduations until it reaches a duty of 1s. on admissions of 12s. 6d., with an additional 1s. for every 10s. or fraction of 10s. over 12s. 6d. in the price of admission.

The amount of revenue that I estimate will be obtained from this source is £80,000, and will be devoted to paying the war bonus to old-age and military pensioners, and widows, and to miners suffering from pneumoconiosis.

### EXCESS-PROFITS TAX.

With reference to the excess-profits duty, it will be remembered that last year I asked the House, in response to a generally expressed wish, to levy special taxation on the extra profits that had accrued to taxpayers owing to the war. On investigation it was found here, as it had been found in England, and was afterwards found in Canada, France, and the United States, that the difficulties of ascertaining exactly the actual profits resulting from the war were almost insuperable. The machinery needed for the purpose was too elaborate to enable the revenue to be collected when it was required.

The method adopted here was substantially on the lines of the English excessprofits tax, but as the amount realized did not reach my estimate I propose this year to readjust this form of taxation. I may say that if the profits-tax were to be retained and doubled in rate so as to make it 90 per cent. it would not provide the amount required. I therefore must ask the House to authorize such a change of taxation as will make it certain that larger sums shall be contributed by those who have not paid their just share under the profits-tax. The adjustment I propose will not only provide the amount of revenue I require, but it will ensure that every one shall contribute in proportion to his means. Experience of the excess-profits tax has also shown that it is inequitable. concessions necessary to avoid hardship in some cases resulted in the escape of many other taxpayers who were in a position to pay and, in my opinion, should have paid. The main reason for this is that the conditions here are different from those in the older countries. In this young country there is a larger proportion of concerns in the process of development than is the case in the older countries, and the tax presses unduly on them. The profits made on shipping and munition contracts in Great Britain are enormous. There are thousands of long-established industrial, commercial, and general businesses that can be safely relied on by the Home Government to ensure a large amount of revenue from It is not so here: on the contrary, the purchase by the British a profits-tax. Government of our principal staple products has largely reduced the profits that, under ordinary conditions, would be earned by export business houses, and an equivalent amount cannot be collected spread over such a large number of producers who are selling their produce to the British Government; nor could it be charged to the buyers, the British Government. A careful estimate for this year shows that, owing to the greatly increased price of stocks imported for sale, the margin of profit will be materially reduced, and it would not be safe to rely upon receiving this year a revenue approaching the amount received last year from this source,

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and that amount, as I have said, was below my estimate, and was insufficient for requirements. In place of the excess-profits tax I will ask the House for authority to obtain the additional revenue from a progressive land and income tax. Any system of taxation should be capable of such expansion as will meet all legitimate requirements of the State, and what I propose will, I feel sure, meet this requirement.

### PROGRESSIVE LAND-TAX.

From this source we must collect a larger revenue than we did during the past year. The land-tax collected last year was £713,118, out of a total revenue from land and income tax of £4,975,244—roughly, one-seventh. I propose that instead of the present ordinary and graduated land-taxes to levy one progressive land-tax; the tax to be charged on the unimproved value without deduction of mortgages, but allowing exemption as at present of £500 on the taxable balances up to £1,500, and then diminishing so as to disappear at £2,500. In order to prevent hardship upon taxpayers whose lands are of comparatively low value and which are subject to mortgage, I will ask the House to approve an exemption of £1,000 in all cases where the unimproved value does not exceed £3,000. This exemption will then diminish by £1 for every increase of £2 in the unimproved value above £3,000, and will thus disappear when the unimproved value reaches £5,000. This exemption to taxpayers whose land is mortgaged will represent a concession of revenue to the small landowner amounting to about £100,000.

The method of dealing with what is termed the mortgage-tax presents one of the most difficult questions in our taxation system. It is, however, certain that the system which we have to depend upon for the collection of the requisite land-tax revenue must be made effective, otherwise there will be a large loss of revenue, and this loss would assuredly take place under the law as it at present stands. It is therefore necessary to amend it. The rate I propose will be a progressive one, which can be raised or lowered by percentage additions or deductions to meet the requirements of the time. The lowest schedule rate will be 1d. in the pound on the first £1,000 of taxable balance, increased by  $\frac{1}{32000}$ d. for each £1 of the increase over £1,000 until it reaches 7d., which rate will be reached at £192,000. This gives a fairer gradation than the present system, the rate of which is broken, and is higher on the lower balances and diminishes on the higher balances. To the schedule rates I propose to make an all-round addition of 50 per cent. The minimum rate will then be  $1\frac{1}{2}$ d., and the maximum  $10\frac{1}{2}$ d.

I hope to obtain from land-tax £1,250,000.

### PROGRESSIVE INCOME-TAX.

I propose to retain the principle of the present graduated income-tax, although with a different graduation without any percentage addition. The extra war revenue

required will be raised by special income-tax, which I will explain later.

With regard to the ordinary income-tax, the present graduated rate suffers from the same defect as the graduated rate for land-tax. It is a broken rate, and the increase is severe on the lower incomes. I therefore propose to amend the rate, starting at the present amount of 6d. in the pound up to £400, and then increasing by  $\frac{1}{200}$ d. for each £1 increase over £400 up to 3s., which rate is reached at £6,400.

In the method of assessment I propose to make an amendment by abolishing the present exemption of 5 per cent. on the capital value of the land used in producing the income, with the deduction therefrom of the amount of interest paid on any mortgage of such land, and to substitute an exemption of 5 per cent. on the unimproved value of the land used for producing the income—i.e., 5 per cent. on the amount on which land-tax will be paid. This in actual practice will work out more favourably than the present exemption in the cases of taxpayers whose lands are encumbered. The original object of the 5-per-cent. exemption on the capital value of the land was to place freeholders on an equality with leaseholders and to exempt from income-tax income derived from land. Since the passing of the Finance Act of 1915, however, which brought into operation the assessment for income-tax of income derived from land, the exemption as at present constituted is anomalous, and has the effect of exempting from taxation persons letting lands.

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The exemption will be allowed in full on assessable incomes up to £600 only, and will then decrease by £1 for every £1 of increase in the assessable income over £600, so as to disappear at £900. The amount of revenue which I estimate will be obtained from income-tax under these proposals is £1,600,000.

#### SPECIAL WAR-TAX.

For the purposes of a special war-tax I propose to retain the tax at present assessed under section 5 of the Finance Act of last year on all assessable income in excess of £300, but it will be graduated in the same way as the progressive incometax, and will have an all-round addition of 50 per cent. to the schedule rates. The minimum of the rates charged for income will be 1s. 3d., and the maximum 7s. 6d. This I estimate will yield £3,000,000.

When introducing the taxing Bill I will circulate for the information of honourable members tables showing the effect of the alterations upon taxpayers for land-tax and income-tax.

#### SUMMARY.

To summarize, the amount of tax that I estimate will be received under these proposals is as follows:—

The proposed taxes, taken with our Customs duties, estate and succession duties, and other taxes, will give us a system which combines as nearly as possible ability to pay, equality of sacrifice, and universality of taxation; it avoids all unnecessary complexities, is sufficiently simple to be readily understood by all taxpayers, and is comparatively inexpensive in collection.

### EMPLOYMENT FOR RETURNED SOLDIERS.

We have to look forward to the time when our brave soldiers will return to this Dominion at the conclusion of the war. The country's duty, in addition to providing land, is to see that those requiring work are fully employed until they settle in the ordinary avocations of life, and a special sum not exceeding £2,000,000 spread over a period of two years will be devoted to public or other works for the purpose of providing employment for these soldiers. Part of this amount will be made available through the State Advances Department, for local bodies, who will be asked to assist in this laudable work.

### CUSTOMS.

The Customs revenue for the present financial year is most difficult to estimate. The difficulties of transport, risks of loss, high freights, and restrictions upon the exportation of many classes of goods from Great Britain make it impossible to measure with any degree of accuracy the volume of trade which will reach New Zealand while the war continues. The oversea shipping companies state that it is quite impossible to give an estimate of the number of arrivals during the next twelve months, as shipping orders, owing to the exigencies of the war, are cancelled from day to day. Still, with the experience of last year we may expect that despite all difficulties a fair proportion of the orders placed abroad will come to hand.

The estimate for the year 1916–17 was £3,300,000. This would have been a good average revenue for any year from 1910 onwards, but owing to the great appreciation of values of goods subject to ad valorem duties, and to the successful import trade generally, the revenue realized was £3,849,675, showing an excess over estimate of £549,675. This is the greatest Customs revenue ever collected, and if it is added to the excise beer revenue of £187,953 it brings the total to over £4,000,000 for the first time in the history of the Dominion.

#### BEER DUTY.

The beer duty collected during the year was £187,953, as against £157,892, or £30,061 more than was collected for the previous year; that increase is about £7,000 less than I expected to obtain, which is due to anti-shouting regulations, increasing shortage of adult male population through enlistment, and reduction in the gravity of the beers brewed. The number of gallons of beer brewed during the calendar year 1916 was 11,247,725, as against 11,149,176 gallons the previous year, yielding an average duty per gallon of 4.05d. in 1916 and 3.39d. in 1915. The increase in the rate of duty dated from the 1st December, 1915.

#### ADDITIONAL CUSTOMS AND EXCISE DUTIES.

The House will be asked to agree to an increase in the Customs and excise duties on tea, beer, spirits, champagne, cigars, cigarettes, silks, satins, velvets, plushes, and imitation silks.

The additional revenue which in ordinary times would be realized by the proposed increase is estimated at £317,000, but owing to the dislocation of shipping and the consequent uncertainty attending all importations at the present time it would be unsafe for me to rely upon obtaining more than £275.000 from this source.

Details of the amount of additional duty to be levied on each class of article will accompany the resolutions which will be submitted presently for consideration of members.

### ESTIMATES OF REVENUE FOR 1917-18.

I now proceed to give an estimate of revenue for the year 1917–18 under the main heads of each of the important Departments:—

#### THE YEAR'S OPERATIONS.

For the convenience of honourable members I summarize the most important items relating to the financial operations for the past year:—

Successful flotation of £16,000,000 for war purposes. Of this sum, £11,000,000 subscribed within the Dominion; approximate cost, one-half of one per cent.

Investments in London increased to £7,000,000.

Redemptions and renewals effected amounting to £1,859,040.

Completion of conversion scheme by which £2,133,000 converted into long-dated securities.

Net surplus of the year's revenue, £4,308,777. Public-works expenditure reduced to £1,278,922.

Income-tax receipts increased by £2,870,007.

Post Office Savings-bank deposits increased by £3,436,844.

Twenty-five settlements purchased for discharged soldiers, making a total area of 337,961 acres thrown open and available for settlement.

£62,421 authorized for soldier-settlers by way of financial assistance. 6,530 war pensions granted to 31st March, 1917, representing an annual value of £342,195.

Total payments to producers for supplies purchased on behalf of the Imperial Government, £27,819,116.

Record collection of Customs and excise revenue—over £4,000,000.

Short-dated securities to Imperial Government for war advances converted into long-dated securities.

Gross war expenditure to 30th June, 1917, £28,439,912.

### PROPOSALS.

I also place in concise form the new proposals submitted to honourable members:—

Additional provision for remissions of rent to members of Expeditionary Forces and discharged soldiers on the land.

Increased borrowing-powers under the Discharged Soldiers Settlement Act, 1915.

Provide for borrowing an additional £24,000,000 for war purposes.

Provide for loan of £750,000 for public-works expenditure, including £250,000 for telegraph-extension.

Provide additional taxation on persons failing to subscribe to war loans according to means.

Provide £2,000,000 for employment of discharged soldiers.

Substitution of a progressive land-tax for ordinary and graduated taxes. Abolition of excess-profits tax and increase of income-tax on a progressive scale.

Special war-tax to be levied on incomes at increased schedule rates.

Provision for inscribing loans in New Zealand.

Portion of loan to be available for payment of death duties.

Amusement-tax.

Continuation of war bonus to State employees.

Increased old-age, military, widows', and miners' pensions.

Additional allowances to soldiers' dependants.

Increase in Customs and excise duties.

### CONCLUSION.

Honourable members will recognize by what I have placed before them that the country, entirely due to war conditions, has difficult problems to settle. It is essential that the basis upon which the future working-out of these problems is largely dependent—namely, financial stability—should receive the earnest consideration which its importance demands. Our obligations are great. That we can bear them and make proper provision for me ting them is, I am glad to say, beyond all doubt. Our financial position, as will be recognized from what I have placed before the House, is remarkably strong.

The proposed readjustment of taxation, which will be placed in a separate Bill, is such as is absolutely necessary to enable the Dominion to carry through its share

of the war.

As soon as the war has ceased and the full responsibilities connected with pensions and other liabilities have been ascertained it will become necessary to readjust the country's taxation to meet its requirements in normal times. It would, in my opinion, be impossible and, indeed, unreasonable to expect the taxpayers to continue for a day longer than necessary the high taxation that war financial requirements alone justify. The continuance of this high taxation would in peacetime certainly tell against our industries and employment. Neither the industrial, commercial, agricultural, nor pastoral communities can produce the best results until a large measure of relief is afforded.

I feel that I should be wanting in my duty were I not to acknowledge here the magnificent work that the New Zealand soldiers have done in upholding the best traditions of their race. They have added a golden page to the history of the Dominion, and are entitled to all we can do for them upon their return, and the fullest assistance of the Government will be cheerfully given to enable them to obtain Government employment whenever it is possible and in cases

where it is necessary to do so.

I am sure you will agree with me when I say that, whatever happens and however long the war may last, we will leave nothing undone to see it through to a complete and successful termination.

There will assuredly be world problems to solve in which New Zealand must necessarily take its part. It will, of course, be some time before they come up for settlement, as other portions of the Empire as well as ourselves are directly

concerned, and we cannot in that respect move alone.

There is, however, no reason why we should wait to put our own house in order, and I sincerely hope that when the time arrives for the next meeting of Parliament it will be found possible to greatly reduce the country's taxation, after making full and proper provision for all the obligations that have been incurred in connection with the important part New Zealand has taken in the fight for freedom and the protection of the civilization of the world.
