I have the honour to furnish herewith, for the information of Parliament, the report of the Department relating to war, old-age, widows', Maori War, miners', epidemic, blind, and sundry pensions, and family allowances for the year ended 31st March, 1934.

The following comparative statement relates to the annual value and gross payments of all pensions administered by the Department for the past two years:—

FAMILY ALLOWANCES.

The claims lodged during the year totalled 3,196, which, with the 448 outstanding from the previous year, made a total of 3,644 to be dealt with. Of these, 3,022 were accepted and 360 rejected. Of the rejected claims 149 represent cases where the income of the family was in excess of the limit allowed. 450 new claims from Maoris were finally dealt with during the year, 351 being granted and 99 rejected.

The total children of the 12,145 allowances in force as at 31st March, 1934, and those in excess of two in a family numbered 53,367 and 29,077, the average per family being 4.39 and 2.39 respectively.

The total amount paid during the year was £146,766, while the total annual value of all allowances in force at the close of the year was £151,765.

COST OF ADMINISTRATION.

The cost of administration for the year amounted to £58,336, the principal items of expenditure being £28,235 for salaries of officers of the Department, who numbered 164 as at 31st March, 1934; £17,183 and £3,086 paid to the Postal Department respectively for payment of pensions and postage and telegrams; £3,006 for salaries and other expenses of the War Pensions Appeal Board; and £2,018 for salaries of the War Pensions Board.

The percentage of cost of administration to the total payments made of £3,388,552 (including £238,655 paid on behalf of other Governments) was 1.72.

The total number of appeals dealt with to the 31st March, 1934, was 5,527, the percentage upheld

being 48 per cent.

Of the 656 cases dealt with during the past year, 372 were heard at Auckland, 54.6 per cent. being upheld; 70 at Wellington, 27.1 per cent. being upheld; 133 at Christchurch, 39.8 per cent. being upheld; and 81 at Dunedin, 63 per cent. being upheld.

Medical treatment of war pensioners during 1933-34 cost £69,131.

Railway concessions to war pensioners on maximum permanent disablement pension and those with locomotive disabilities on permanent pension in excess of 50 per cent. cost £1,562 during the year.

The loading paid on life-insurance policies of war pensioners due to war-service disability amounted to \$167 for the year

Temporary war pensions to soldiers increased by 147 and permanent pensions to soldiers increased by 138 during the year.

The 419 deaths among war pensioners are made up as follows: Soldiers, 161; widows of soldiers, 12; other dependants, 246.

Discharged Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment Act, 1930.

The rehabilitation of disabled ex-soldiers has been carried out with increasing difficulty during the past year owing to the continued economic depression and the very limited finance available for

the purpose.

The committees set up in terms of the provisions of the Act and the employment officers have made every endeavour to place disabled ex-soldiers in employment, and, although a fair measure of success has been achieved, it is becoming more evident that the ordinary channels of employment are practically closed to the disabled man by reason mainly of his inability through his disabilities to carry out work of a sustained nature. However, in some cases permanent employment has been secured, but mostly the work obtained has been of a casual nature.

For the more seriously disabled men the system whereby ex-soldiers manufacture articles in their own homes and sell them through special shops in the cities continues to be the most successful solution of this problem, not only as a means of bringing in some small remuneration to the workers, but also in giving to each participant some definite encouragement that profitable use may still be made

of what ability and craftsmanship he still possesses.
