The total funds of the societies and branches as at the 31st December, 1935, amounted to £4,812,787, made up as follows: Sick and Funeral Funds (inclusive of amounts transferred to special funds out of surplus), £4,450,140; Medical and Management Funds, goods, &c., £362,647. Dividing the total funds by the number of members at the end of the year it is found the average capital per member is now £46 9s.
