Active Pay: The same as for active personnel, except that, generally, allowances are not payable.

The Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve perform a minimum period of training affoat of seven days per annum, and are required also to perform thirty-six night drills and six half-day drills per year.

Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve ratings are eligible to qualify for the payment of training grants from 15s. to £3 10s. according to rating held and whether qualified as efficient for the year.

Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve (New Zealand) officers receive a uniform-upkeep allowance of £3 per annum, and Royal Naval Reserve (New Zealand) officers receive a training fee varying from £20 to £30 according to the rank held.

In addition to the above rates of pay, the following payments are made:—

(a) Deferred Pay: Amounts placed to the credit of officers and men of the New Zealand Naval Forces and payable on completion of service—

(i) Officers: From £54 15s. to £109 10s. per annum.

(ii) Men: from £9 2s. 6d. to £51 14s. 2d. per annum.

(b) Pensions Contributions: Paid to the Admiralty in respect of officers and men on loan from the Royal Navy—

(i) Officers: From £100 to £205 per annum.

(ii) Men: From £24 to £28 per annum.

(Deferred pay is not payable to loan personnel or to Reserve personnel under training.)

#### REMARKS.

- (a) Contract-growing of seeds was increased and there was a corresponding increase in revenue from the crops.
- (b) Costs of laboratory work in connection with fertilizers were absorbed by the Chemical Laboratory.

  In future that type of expenditure will come to charge under this item as the result of a re-organization of laboratory activities.

(c) The work was in its initial stages during 1938-39 and heavier expenditure is now necessary to ensure adequate mappings and recordings of findings.

- (d) Certain grass-land experiments reaching finality and during 1939–40 cropping experiments involving increased labour costs will be developed.
- (e) Foundation work connected with production of films relative to agricultural activities was carried out during 1938–39, and a picture talkie system to give prominence to Departmental activities was inaugurated. Some anticipated expenditure connected with film production did not arise during 1938–39 but a sound working basis was established. Interim results warrant the development of the project and funds for that purpose are being provided under this item.

#### REMARKS.

- (a) Increased provision necessary through additions to staff and to meet salary increments.
- (b) Overexpenditure due principally to extensive research at Auckland owing to an outbreak of typhoid.
  (c) The item was underexpended last year as patient population did not increase to the extent anticipated. The opening of new villas during the current year will necessitate increased expenditure.
- (d) The underexpenditure is due principally to an adverse season and the fact that replacements on account of facial eczema were not as great as anticipated. Additional provision is made for the current year to enable stock to be increased where necessary.
- (e) Increased costs at growing institutions necessitate extra provision being made this year.
- (f) Increased costs and the operation of new laundries at Kingseat and Templeton necessitate extra provision being made this year.

- (g) All vehicles on order were not delivered during the year.
- (h) Increased cost and extra issues of uniforms.
- (i) The shortage of female nursing staff has been acute, necessitating the working of overtime. An improvement is expected this year.
- (j) Transfers have been deferred as new buildings have not been completed as soon as anticipated.
- (k) Additional population and the advisability of carrying larger stocks necessitate additional provision being made this year.
- (l) The extension of occupational therapy accounts for the overexpenditure last year. A further proposed extension this year has been provided for.

#### REMARKS.

- (a) Provision was made last year for the erection of a new office at Rotorua. The building of the new quarters has not yet commenced, but provision has been made to meet the cost should it be proceeded with.
- (b) New item providing for preliminary work on new managed area in Westland Region. Previously shown under Subdivision VI, Pukekura Nursery.
- (c) Timber reserves in the North Auckland area are being fast depleted, and this forest will be called upon in the near future for supplies. Extraction routes are non-existent, and the Forest Service is roading the block in readiness for exploitation at a later date.
- (d) Continuation of policy inaugurated during 1938-39 of Service extracting and selling logs.
- (e) The area treated annually is gradually being increased.
- (f) Provision was made in 1938–39 under this item for roading at Omahuta and Puketi, but the expenditure was charged direct to the forest. The underexpenditure (collectively) is accounted for by the deferment of the purchase of a roading-logging tractor to the current year.
- (g) The logging of this forest by the Service has been deferred meantime.

- (h) Provision of a new item, to which will be charged all compensation payments. The total expenditure incurred for the year will be charged to the projects employing labour in the ratio of wages paid. Compensation losses are being "pooled" to prevent heavy financial strain falling on any particular item.
- (i) Provision made for several major surveys of timber stands for which qualified staff could not be detailed.
- (j) Increased provision to meet charges for additional floor space and for rentals outstanding at 31st March, 1939.
- (k) Stocks of forms considerably increased.
- (l) A new item to finance refunds to millers in those isolated cases where boundary of license has been altered or portion of timber considered to be inaccessible.
