For in that case the proportion which would be payable into each Provincial Treasury would be wholly dependent, not on the amount issued out of the General Chest in each Province, but on the amount of revenue collected in each Province respectively.

Reverting again to the period included between the 1st January and the 30th Vide "Services in of September, 1853, the total receipts of the several accountants amounted to £179,642 16s. 3d., and the total disbursements to £155,486 0s. 4d.—inclusive of a sum of 17,000, which had been paid in deposit into the Commissariat Chest at Auckland on account of the New Zealand Company's "Fourths." The balances in hand on the 30th of September, 1853, including the above deposit of £17,000, amounted to £39,440 17s. 10d.; but this, like the balance in hand on the 1st of January preceding, included large sums of money held in deposit on account of Vide General Cash the New Zealand Company's "Fourths," Intestate Estates, &c., amounting alto-Balance. No. 2. gether to the sum of £20.820 19s. 11d. The sum, therefore, in the General Treasury actually available for distribution on the 30th of September, 1853, was only £18.619 17s, 11d. This surplus, when added to the advances issued to the Provincial Treasuries on account of the anticipated surplus Revenues, make the Vide Surplus Revenue total surplus £24,392 7s. 11d. which might be distributed among the several Provinces without reference to the sources from which it arose-or it might more properly be separated into two portions,—the one being the surplus arising from the disposal of the Waste Lands of the Crown, and the other that which remains
