LOOKING FOR A CAREER IN CONSERVATION?

Contact the School of Forestry at the University of Canterbury about a degree in conservation forestry.

A forest, with its bird, insect and other animal and plant life forms a complex and ever changing system.

The conservation management of our native forests requires an understanding of the way forests respond to natural and induced change, and needs people who can combine a good knowledge of natural science with sound management skills.

As a graduate in conservation forestry, you will not only have a broad background in the science of New Zealand's flora and fauna, but also the management skills necessary to conserve the native forests that cover a quarter of New Zealand.

If you want a career conserving native forests in New Zealand or overseas, you should be thinking seriously about doing a Bachelor of Forestry science degree at the University of Canterbury.
