THE KERMADECS have some of the largest breeding populations of seabirds in the Pacific. THE "PACIFIC RING OF FIRE" includes the Tonga-Kermadec Island arc, which lies along the Pacific/Indian-Australian plate boundary to the north-east of the North Island. The Kermadec Islands - Raoul, Macaulay, Curtis, and L'Esperance Rock - are part of a classic subduction zone, where the Pacific plate is being forced down into the mantle underneath the more continental Indian-Australian plate.
