Vivaldi was born about 1675-78, probably in Venice, and died early in the 1740's, again probably in Venice. It was thought at one time that he resided in Germany, but actually his connection with that country was no more than being in service with a German prince domiciled in Italy. Vivaldi wrote a vast number of Concertos, of which this one in A minor is a good example.
