BRITAIN'S BANDS (7)

HIS MAJESTY'S IRISH GUARDS

HE fine regiment of H.M. Irish Guards was formed in 1900, as a mark of appreciation of the gallantry of Irish soldiers, especially Dublin Fusiliers, in the South African War. The Great War was its first campaign, but its ancestry, through the historic regiments from which it drew its personnel, reminds us that:-

"Not once, or twice in our rough island story,

The path of duty was the way to glory."

The Irish Guards upheld that inherited reputation from Mons in 1914 to Lys in 1918.

At the end of her long reign, Queen Victoria, wishing to honour Ireland, commanded the formation and establishment of the Royal Irish Guards. The then new regiment thus became fourth in the Brigade of Guards, the Grenadiers, the Coldstreams, and the Scots Guards having already a long, honourable and distinguished history in many fields, and as the special guards of the Sovereign.

To these four regiments of Foot Guards was added, during the Great War, the Welsh Guards, and with the inclusion of gallant little Wales, the representation of the United Kingdom and Ireland was complete.

When H.M. Irish Guards Band was formed, Lieut. C. H. Hassell was appointed the first bandmaster out of hundred applicants. He is of the "Knapsack breed," being the son of a fighting soldier, and born March 1,

At 12, he had already enlisted in the Army. On being sent to Kneller Hall in the following year, he studied the clarinet there under Lazarus. Further experience and study led to his appointment as bandmaster of the 4th Battalion, King's Royal Rifles, in 1892. Whilst engaged in that position, he came under the kindly notice of Queen Victoria, and other members of the Royal Family. Prince Christian Victor was an officer in the King's Royal Rifles, and a great admirer of Lieutenant Hassell's

H.M. Irish Guards Band has been twice to Canada (1906-1913) and during the Great War the band served in France on three occasions, also in Italy with the massed bands. The band is 65 strong, being a splendid combination, and some of the finest musicians in the British Army are to be found in its ranks.
