STILL in the mysterious, eventful East, we here encounter George Sanders, as the inevitable newspaperman who "knows too much." He saves Arabia for the United Nations in approximately 60 minutes by foiling the machinations of the equally inevitable Nazi spy ring, and thus prevents the simple desert tribesmen from being led into the wrong camp. With Virginia Bruce as an inevitable heroine, I can only say that I found the film just about as exciting this time as on any of the other 50 occasions when Hollywood has made it.

THOUGH this is an age of mechanical marvels, children still love the good old "Cowboys and Indians" melodrama that many adults can well remember. There was proof of this recently when the ZB stations made an offer of a membership card and a "secret code" to all children who wrote in asking for details of the "Lone Ranger Club." One enthusiast, taking his prospective membership in the true spirit of all secret societies, wrote in code.
