Especially since the United States Army introduced group intelligence testing in the first World War, a great deal of interest has been shown in the statistical measurement of the human mind. On Tuesday, September 10, G. W. Parkyn, M.A., lecturer in education at the University of Otago, will discuss the techniques involved in this work. The last talk in the series, on Tuesday, September 17, will be by J. Williams, M.Com., research lecturer in industrial organisation at the University of Otago.
