Leicester, she dared not risk marriage. Two of the greatest puzzles of Elizabeth's life—her attitude to Essex and the Queen of Scots—are bravely grappled with: but, though the Essex story is credibly explained, Elizabeth's mind with regard to her cousin is not so satisfactorily presented—chiefly. I think because, as we never see her face to face, Mary remains a vague, shadowy figure. In general, however, Mr. Delves-Broughton writes with such integrity that the result is an exceptionally interesting picture of a remarkable personality.
