Foster

"Old Folks at Home" . Foster

The favourite melody, "The Old Folks at Home," was written by Stephen Collins Foster in 1851, the first year of his married life. It was brought out by Firth and Pond of New York. From it they realised over £3,000. Foster got practically nothing for it. He sold to Christy, the famous minstrel pioneer, the right to sing it before publication and also the privilege of putting Christy's name on the copies as author and composer. For this he got three pounds. Shortly afterward Foster reclaimed the song and his name appeared on it thereafter.

He saw in a flash what could be done with this verse, and at once hurried home with the book. The next day, as an excuse to his friend, he showed him some of the songs already completed. Later he finished the cycle, which we know to-day as "The Maid of the Mill."
