Bud Flanagan said, "We are not singers and never claimed to be. It's all a mistake, and I don't know where it will land us. Allen and I are comedians—Oh!—we aim to make the people laugh. But when we've done that and start to sing, they take us seriously." It all began with the little chorus, "Underneath the Arches," with which they closed a "broken-down swell" act; the chorus was encored so persistently that Bud had to write some verses round it and publish them.
