#### Shortwave Notes

The N.I.R.O.M. transmitter, YDA, at Batavia, has now appeared on 4.90mc., and is heard much better than on its former frequency of 3.04mc.

"Radio Noumea," FK8AA, at Noumea, New Caledonia, has shifted its frequency higher to 6.132 mc/s., and now escapes interference from the MTCY transmitter on 6.125 mc/s.

The Perth shortwave station has this past week been operating as VLW2 on 9.65 mc/s., and on the morning of the 21st broadcast a test programme to South Africa from 4 to 6 a.m. with signals at excellent strength.

"Paris Mondial" is now broadcasting its afternoon programme to North America until 5.30 p.m. on a new frequency of 9.52 mc/s., where it is heard much better than on the former frequency of 9.68 mc/s. The same programme can be heard on 11.885 and 11.716 mc/s.

HJFK, Pereira, Columbia, is operating on 9.73 mc/s. daily from midnight to 2 a.m. It uses as its slogan, "La Voz de Amigos."
