"What do they know of 4ZB who only listen-in?" That may be a garbled quotation but it serves to point out that some of the personalities who appear in 4ZB's various activities have much more picturesque backgrounds than the average listener imagines. Take for instance "Spud" Murphy, who appears with Jimmie McFarlane at the 4ZB Patriotic Sings which are held in the St. James Theatre every Tuesday lunch-hour. "Spud" is a well-known character in Dunedin. He stands a mere 6ft. 2ins. and looks a trifle over 22 stone. "Spud" can always depend on uproarious laughter when he steps on the stage to conduct the Sing, for he is a real artist in make-up. In the five Sings that have been held to date, he has appeared as a Spanish Senorita, a flapper, and a Highland Chief. On Old-Timers' Day, "Spud" came out resplendent in the finery of some forgotten belle of the 1840's, complete with poke bonnet and bustle: and on one other occasion his feminine impersonation was indescribable. "Spud" will be remembered by many Southerners as a service car driver for he was famous for his repartee and his ready wit. During this period, he entertained many famous visitors to the Dominion. In fact. Spud's " fame was carried back to the Old Country by some of those who had encountered him in their trips through Central Otago, and at least one instance is on record where a famous personage visiting New Zealand had a trip with "Spud" heavily underlined on his itinerary. There is no doubt that "Spud" contributes a great deal to the popularity of the 4ZB Patriotic Sings, and that popularity can be gauged by the fact sing.

The play was based upon the experience of two early pioneers who, setting out from Taieri Mouth in a whaleboat with a load of grain for the settlement of Otakau, in the Otago Harbour, encountered a severe storm and were blown down to the Bluff, taking three weeks to make the return journey. In the play, one of the characters was made to state that the wind was blowing south-west, when to be consistent with the action it should have been blowing north-east. The fact that so many people detected the error is evidence of the intense interest with which these plays are followed.

2ZB's Third Birthday

On Sunday, April 28, 2ZB celebrated its third birthday, and several interesting anniversary sessions were presented.
