

#### POWER FOR MAN AND HIS MACHINES

PICTORIAL SURVEYS OF A CEN-TURY, Nos. 13 and 14. POWER, and BREAD. Department of Internal Affairs. Edited by E. H. McCormick.

Numbers 13 and 14 of the surveys are both concerned with power: one with energy for man's machines, the other with energy for man himself. In No. 13, A. Buckingham, himself an electrical engineer, is most interested in power from electricity. He recognises the special uses of steam and oil engines, but naturally concentrates on electricity in a land where it is so readily available. He also discusses the comparative economies of electricity made from steam power, and electricity made from water power. He decides against coal. He describes the development of power and its uses in New Zealand, shows how we came very close to leading the world in the introduction of public electric lighting, and why he believes we are now ahead of all other countries in the reticulation of rural areas. He finds much in the past to interest him, much in the present for comment, and he has enough thrilling anticipation for the future to make him end his survey with Zola's declaration, that "electricity will be for everyone, It should not merely be supplied, but lavished, that men may use it at their will, as the air they breathe." The illustrations tell their own effective story. A reference on Page 20 indicates that one is missing.

There have been many difficulties, most of them met successfully, especially since New Zealand's Wheat Research Institute began from its Christchurch headquarters to lead the world in its own special field. The story of bread has been told often enough. It is high enough praise for this Pictorial that it bears telling again, in this form. The harvest pictures are excellent, and seem to have escaped that too heavy retouching which in POWER and other surveys brings the illustrations a little less near to perfection than otherwise they might have been.

Lucia Moholy is a Czech by birth, has worked at journalism in Germany, taught at a Berlin art school, and transferred her reputation as a photographer to London in 1934. This is a careful history of the development of photography; and more than a history. It tells who was first in each field and the why and wherefore. The social significance of what she calls an art and a technique is as prominent in the book as the historical theme. The book is useful, and interesting.

PENGUIN PARADE. Edited by Penguin Books. With a note on the contributors of the 16 short stories. 248 pp.
