
When Arturo Godoy, the big Chilean, and Joe Louis met last year, Godoy surprised his most sanguine supporters by going the full distance with the world's heavyweight champion, and it is recalled that even Louis was concerned about his form when he found he could not stop his opponent in a few rounds.

It was stated after the contest that Louis's "near call" was mainly due to the fact that Godoy clung so affectionately to him throughout the match, and so foiled Louis from getting out his best punches.

In their return bout, however, Louis was able to avoid Godoy's clinging tactics, and was able to land with such frequency and accuracy that the Chilean was despatched by the eighth round. The Godoy bubble was burst. Another
