In a prefatory note the composer explains that "the work is based on three themes borrowed from my 'Collection of Russian Folk-Songs,' with which my idea was to characterize three elements of our history: paganism, the Muscovite military state, and the element of the semi-independent, semi-republican communities, later revived in the feudal organisations of the Cossacks."
