A sound musical training was the foundation of success for Stuart Robertson. Born in London, of Scottish parentage, at the age of seven he commenced to sing. He was one of the ten boys constituting the children of H.M. Chapels Royal. On Sundays they sang at 10 o'clock at Buckingham Palace, at 11.0 at Marlborough House, and at 12.15 at St. James's Palace. He went to school at Chigwell, Essex, and at 18 recommenced his studies at the Royal College of Music, of which he is an Honorary A.R.C.M. At nineteen he was appointed Assistant Vicar Choral at St. Paul's Cathedral and remained there for over six years.
