HE general topic of discussion for the 3YA Winter Course series, the first lecture of which begins on April 30, is the growing complexity of economic and social life and the ways in which scientific discoveries have contributed to this. The talks will take the form of discussions between two or more economists, geographers, and workers in the field of both natural and physical sciences, all lecturers from Canterbury University College. There will be discussions on how means of communication and transport brought the world toward economic unity, on the complexity of living in the present world, on the dissipation of such capital resources as coal and oil, and on the displacement of primary produce by sub-

A NEW and stirring patriotic marching song will be introduced to listeners by Claude O'Hagan, the well-known bass baritone, when he sings from 3YA on April 28. Composed by a Christchurch resident, O. Stricker, with words by George Atkinson, this song, "March Along," has created some interest in musical circles in Christchurch because of the manner in which it interprets the spirit of the times.

THOUGH she is only 19, Iris Norgrove, who is to broadcast from 1YX on April 25, has not merely gained a reputation among Auckland's younger singers, but is also a good pianist and a competent performer on the Wurlitzer organ. However, because she could not find enough spare time for all these studies simultaneously, she is at present concentrating on vocal work, including lieder, classical, and modern art songs. For her broadcast this Friday (which will be her first appearance at the microphone) she has chosen works by Mozart, Martini, Rosa, and Lotti.

ZILLAH CASTLE and Ronald Castle (members of the Society of Recorder Players, England), whose work in the revival of early music and instruments is well known, will present another unusual programme of music by the old masters, played on the instruments for which they wrote, from 2YA on April 28. In addition to the descant and treble recorders (English flutes), which have been heard before, they will broadcast on the tenor recorder for what is claimed to be the first time in New Zealand.


