Dyorak paid his first visit to London in 1884, where he was treated with honour and respect, and at one of the parties arranged for him Edward Lloyd sang one of his gipsy songs. The chief guest was simple as a child, his dark piercing eyes rarely lighting up with a smille. He was "bearded like the pard," and he had a crushing hand-shake. As the great tenor was singing, it was observed that the composer was busily wiping furtive tears off his cheek. 
