The Rose Cavalier is, so far, Richard Strauss's most successful opera. It contains many elements to account for this. The plot is of a witty and open character, the texture of the score is admirably clear and refined, and free from the dark complexity that characterises *Electra* and *Salome*, his so-called "one-act operatic shockers." Into the music is woven a long stream of delightful waltz melodies of a nature previously more readily associated with the name of the different and distinct Johann Strauss clan.
