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The Nations at Year's End

IN the last days of the year a glance at the international scene is reassuring. This is partly a subjective reaction, perhaps even an illusion: for the holiday mood, advancing swiftly, makes it easier to be hopeful. Yet the situation can be seen more clearly when the tumult of the year begins to subside. And there is evidence that in most parts of the world the outlook has improved. It is, of course, better in some places than in others. Observers with some knowledge of what has happened in Indo-China since the partition are pessimistic; but an uneasy truce which favours the Communists (who were gaining ground before the cease-fire) is better than open warfare.

Indo-China is part of an area in which much more is involved than Communism. Racial divisions and national aims in South-East Asia are elements in a situation which will remain difficult and confused for many years. Western Powers most interested in the area, including New Zealand, entered into treaty arrangements at the Manila conference which will strengthen their collective defences; and the aim here, as elsewhere, was to check the exploitation of unrest by the Communists. It is recognised, however, that the unrest will continue—with or without intervention from Moscow and Peking—until the Asian peoples have more security and higher standards of living. The task of the next few years will be, not merely to tighten defences in the Pacific, but to push forward with economic and technical assistance.

In Europe the big landmark was the London agreement on Western defence. The European Defence Community, rejected by France, was replaced by a scheme notable

for two changes: the retention of national identity by the armies training together, and Britain's entry as a full partner. From a military point of view, the United Kingdom now becomes a Continental Power. This historic change in British policy was not given unanimous approval, but it solved a fundamental problem in French-German relations. And the break with traditional policy should not be hard to accept in a strategic situation which makes any sort of isolation unrealistic. Britain's frontiers, like America's, have long ceased to be coastlines.

Events in South-East Asia and Europe have been regional adjustments within the world framework of Western strategy. Apart from the cease-fire in Indo-China, they have not been positive contributions. Their value goes no further than the value of any defensive policy; and today, when the deterrent to war is more likely to be the hydrogen bomb than the disposition of armed forces, it is hard not to feel that all treaty arrangements have a faint air of unreality. The real testing grounds are still the assembly halls and committee rooms of United Nations. Only there can representatives of East and West work together for compromise. The Russians, in spite of some political moves which emphasise the old divisions, have continued to be more conciliatory than under the Stalin regime. Although too much significance should not be given to Russia's support of the "Atoms-for-peace" plan in the Political Committee, the unanimous vote was a heartening gesture. Approval of an idea is not necessarily a promise of co-operation, but the way to agreement is still open. At the end of 1954 it can at least be said that the set of the current is in the right direction.

Sir,—In his letter to *The Listener* of December 10, M. F. R. Shadbolt rather ungraciously takes you to task for your intelligent anticipation in publishing an article on this subject, occasioned by the new film version of *Romeo and Juliet*, by Philip Hope-Wallace, who is a dramatic—and musical—critic of some repute. He criticises Mr. Hope-Wallace's views on Castellani's film, when, as he admits, Mr. Hope-Wallace has seen the film, and neither I, nor Mr. Shadbolt, nor yourself nor your film critics, have had this opportunity. Mr. Shadbolt prefers, he informs us, to rely on the judgment of Dilys Powell and other noted English film critics. I am afraid that in this case he is calling on Miss Powell in vain. Her views of the film appear in the *Sunday Times* of September 26 last.

Her review is too lengthy to quote in full, but after admitting the "visual richness" of the film, she criticises the handling of the text:

The text, as I say, has been shortened, greatly shortened. . . scene after scene telescoped into a few lines. And yet room has been found, not merely for explanatory action, but for new scenes and words which explain nothing. . . I must not pretend that I am always put off by the liberties taken in the cinema with Shakespeare's text, or even that I should always notice them; in Olivier's *Hamlet* and *Henry V.* for instance, cuts and transpositions did not offend me. But then in both those films, one was held by the playing and the speaking of the verse. With the new *Romeo and Juliet* the eye is held, but not the ear; the performance is thus scarcely ever moving.

And Miss Powell's final sentence is: No doubt Castellani has once again worked a wonder. But Shakespeare has his own wonders, and personally I prefer not to have them obscured by a director's caprices.

Amongst other noted English film critics, I am sure Mr. Shadbolt will include the name of Miss C. A. Lejeune, film critic of *The Observer*. Writing in that paper, also of September 26 last, Miss Lejeune says:

For a film director to choose to emphasise the visual progress of a Shakespeare subject is not in itself reprehensible. Unfortunately, Castellani's lovely pictures are progressive only in the sense that they follow one another. There is little dramatic development in their sequence. They do not gather force as they go along. They rarely build to any climax. . . Castellani's film has little sense of impact. It lacks rhythm, either visual or aural. One slow, monotonous pace monopolises it, flatly setting down word after word, picture after picture.

Let us be content with these opinions until we can judge for ourselves.

NOVELISTS IN COURT

Sir,—May I suggest that one of many difficulties in dealing legally with indecency or obscenity in the written word is confusion between what is corrupting and what is disgusting? The law properly punishes those who undress or perform certain bodily functions in public, but such offences seldom deprave or corrupt. They disgust. They are no more immoral than a bad smell. I go on to suggest that this often happens in writings; when we read we are revolted but not contaminated. In a story by a famous contemporary novelist, a man seduces mother and daughter. This might corrupt some people, but it would disgust others. In another book published a few years ago, describing various kinds of holiday, there is a chapter on holidays with women companions. Though this justification of extra-marital love is written in general terms, without grossness, it strikes me as being against public interest; but how would it fare in a court of law?

To amend the law of obscene libel so as to bring it into line with the law governing ordinary obscenity might add to the confusion, for there would still

be the question, what is disgusting? The subject matter varies from the gross to the subtle. As a survivor from the pre-1914 world, I welcome the disappearance of certain social taboos (such as embarrassment about lavatory needs), but I also feel it is reasonable to expect, if not legally to require, literature to "keep within the bounds of common decency," to quote Mr. A. H. Reed's letter. Admittedly the difficulty we are discussing is expressed in his word "obliged," and there may be differences of opinion about "common decency." Still, reticence should not be abandoned altogether. If sex has a mystery and a sanctity, and is not merely a dirty thing, it merits a certain degree of reverence and concealment, otherwise we may be reminded of James Russell Lowell's remark that some books should bear the old inn sign: "Entertainment for man and beast."

It seems to me that more corrupting than the treatment of sex in contemporary novels are some aspects of extreme fashions for women, and the display of semi-nudes everywhere, in newspapers, journals and on the screen, so often presented with a smear of salacity.

CLASSICS UNHEARD

Sir,—From 4YC on December 3 I heard for the first time in my life, including fifteen years of daily radio listening, Chopin's First Sonata (C Minor, Op. 4). The one in B Minor I have heard probably hundreds of times, and that in B Flat Minor fairly often also. Is this long neglect of number one because the work has only recently been recorded for the first time?

In the same way a certain Liebestraume of Liszt is often called by announcers "Liszt's Liebestraume" quite as though there was only one such, whereas my Pianists' Dictionary (Pauer) has always maintained that there are three Liebestraume by Liszt. Are the other two still unrecorded? A half-century with open ears has passed without either audition or reference to these unheard two, whereas the one in A Flat has been played and transcribed and broadcast beyond endurance.

I could continue indefinitely with such instances, but would merely plead for an airing of the many byway classics that must be in the NZBS library of recorded music but are seldom or never made available. Heard melodies are sweet, but those unheard are sweeter.

WHO KILLED PHAR LAP?

Sir,—Your article, "Who Killed Phar Lap?" caught my eye, and I read it with keen interest. But your contributor, in all his inquiries, never got the correct answer. Here it is. It started in Australia, when Phar Lap was hard ridden

to beat Mystic Peak, in the V.A.T.C. Futurity Stakes, 10 furlongs (21/2/31). He and Mystic Peak ran head and head over the last furlong and, desperately ridden, Phar Lap won by a neck; Phar Lap 10.3, Mystic Peak 10.2. Two days later, in our morning paper, people got a shock to see that Phar Lap was a wreck and might never race again. Later on Pike told a reporter that he knew he had strained Phar Lap, as he used the whip heavily. Anyway, the horse got over it well and was racing again in about three weeks. Later on he went to America and started in the Agua Caliente Handicap.

Now for the race. Up went the barrier and away they went, under the whip and going as fast and as far as their stamina would let them. Of course, they soon left Phar Lap a good way behind, but as soon as he struck his stride he was also going at top. (He always raced flat out; couldn't be held back or he would choke and soon be blown.) He quietly began to make up on the rear horses. At four furlongs he was still in the rear, but was soon in among them. At a mile he was getting close to the front, at nine furlongs he was in the lead, and seemed to have the race in hand. Half a furlong from home he was two lengths to the good; but on glancing back, his jockey saw two horses coming at him. Not knowing how much they might have in hand, and knowing all the world would be looking forward to the result, he up with the whip and gave Phar Lap a hard cut. The horse, although flat out, would give a strain and try to do a bit more, but couldn't. It was only a flash in the pan on the part of the American horses, and Phar Lap won by a length in 2min. 2sec. When the jockey used his whip, Phar Lap strained his stomach again—only this second time it was worse. And that is what caused Phar Lap's death.

DAME SYBIL THORNDIKE

Sir,—I would by no means dispute that prior to her casting in *Saint Joan* Dame Sybil Thorndike was, like many another artist who has never reached her present status, well known to a restricted coterie of admirers, among them players as well as audiences. In this respect she was one among hundreds, and unknown to, and unacknowledged by, the theatre-minded public in general.

From the occasion of her casting in *Saint Joan* she became one of a few, a few of widely-acclaimed renown, and a household word. I do not think that Mr. Clark will maintain that Dame Sybil was a household word, or celebrated, before *Saint Joan*. I found fault with the statement that she had enjoyed her present status for over 50 years.

Artists of half Dame Sybil's present status, or even a fraction thereof, did not work the Old Vic in pre-Lilian Bayliss days; this I can state from intimate personal knowledge. The highest salaries paid in those days were of a microscopic dimension and the company frequently resorted to working "shares," on which occasions it was not uncommon for the rank and file players to receive less than £1 in a week.

I well remember my father, who for years had been an admirer of Dame Sybil, and who had worked with her on many occasions, saying delightedly that it looked as if Miss Thorndike had made a "hit" when reading the reviews of *Saint Joan* to my mother at breakfast. She had made a "hit" all right.

Incidentally, does Mr. Clark remember the "ante" for the Old Vic pre 1914—Gods 4d, early doors 6d, pit 1/-, best stalls 2/6?

THE LANGUAGE PROBLEM

Sir,—I listened with great interest to the recent "Memo from the United Nations," in which the narrator described the complex translation system. One could not but admire the ingenuity by which a running translation into his own choice among official languages can be given to each delegate, or a complete translation of a whole address. All this is thanks to modern technical ingenuity and the existence of a few remarkable linguists who are prepared to give their services. But I listened in vain for any indication that the narrator was aware of another and infinitely easier and more effective solution to the language problem.

In August of this year an international conference took place at Haarlem in the Netherlands, attended by nearly 3000 people from 28 countries, who spoke perhaps five times the number of languages which UN uses officially. No expensive equipment was needed. Though a few linguists were present, their help was not called on by their fellow delegates, who were linguistically quite ordinary people. All proceedings were in the one official language, and were immediately understood by all present. I refer, of course, to the 39th International Esperanto Congress. Had any unprejudiced United Nations delegate been present, he would without doubt have gone away convinced that the true solution of the language problem lay here and not with his own elaborate arrangements.

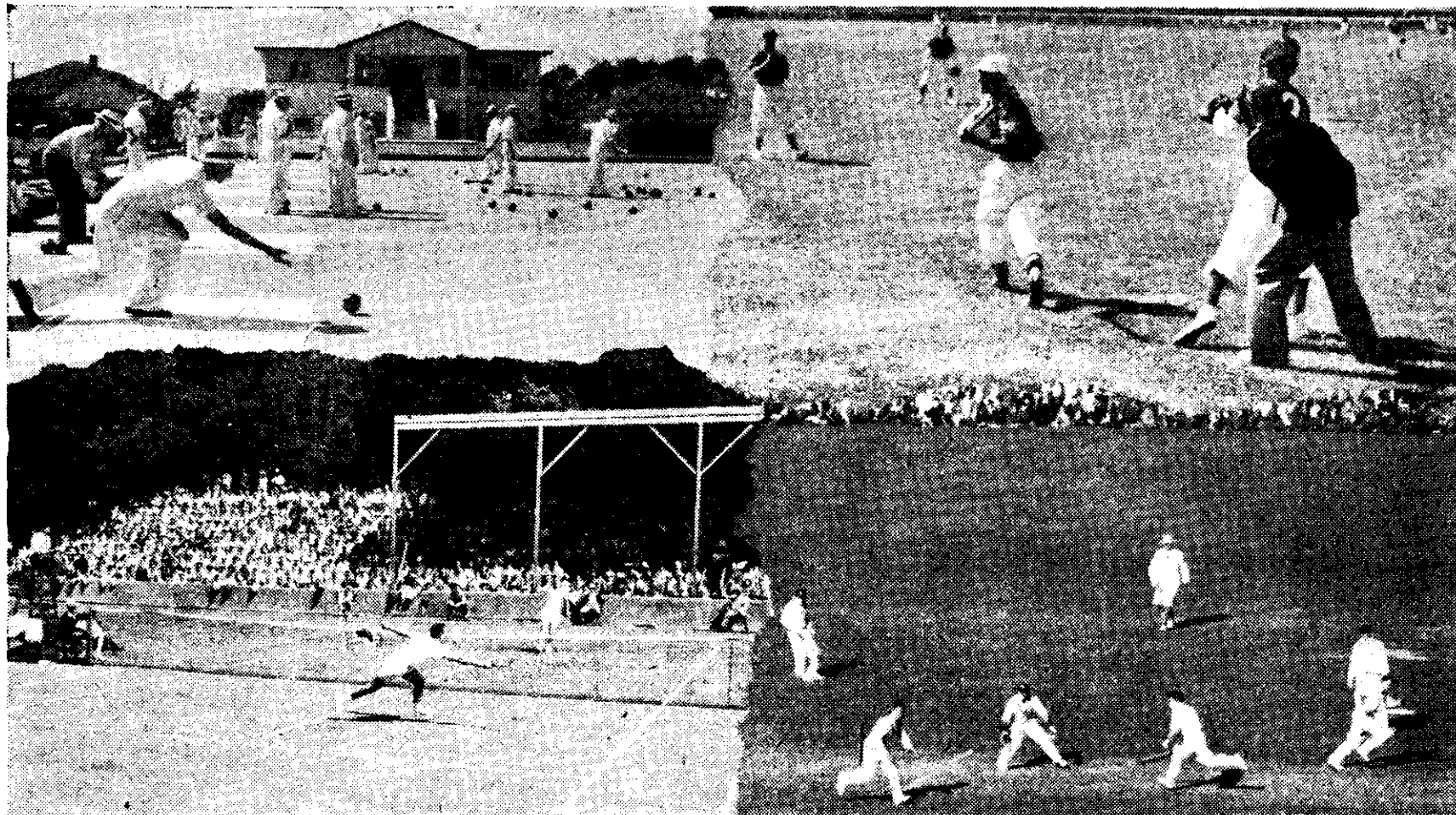

RADIO'S HOLIDAY SPORTING ROUND-UP

THEY go to their seaside beaches and into the hills, those New Zealanders you see on our cover this week. They go camping at Queenstown or yachting in the Bay of Islands, or they bike through to Nelson to pick fruit. But whatever they do with their holidays, at some stage you will find them crouching over their portables and shushing the youngsters or irritably jolting their car radios to hear how the M.C.C. are getting on in Melbourne. Or, if they haven't a radio of their own, they will sing out to the man in the tent next door. "Say, did you hear what won the fifth at Auckland?"

The NZBS is doing its best to give them the sports coverage they want. Over the period from December 27 to January 9 all sporting results will be broadcast in the National Sports Summary, from linked YA and YZ stations, at 7 p.m. each day. Progress scores, summaries and commentaries from the various sports will also be broadcast throughout the day.

On Monday and Tuesday, December 27 and 28, and on Saturday and Monday, January 1 and 3, 2YA will conduct a *Sports Round-up*, in which selections from broadcast commentaries on the various sporting activities throughout the Dominion will be given, starting at 1.30 p.m. each day.

TEST CRICKET

CRICKET enthusiasts will be hard put to it to make up their minds—should they listen to the local Plunket Shield series or to the England-Australia Test? Here is the timetable to help them decide. For the three days beginning Monday, December 27, the M.C.C. play the New South Wales Country team.

Progress scores will be broadcast in the 7 p.m. link, with the stumps scoreboard after the 9 p.m. news.

On Friday, December 31, the third Test begins at Melbourne—Australia won the last Test there by only 28 runs—and 20-minute commentaries from this match will be given daily at 3.15 p.m., 5.45 p.m. and 7.45 p.m., with frequent progress reports and, where possible on holidays, extra commentaries.

The previous day's Test scoreboard will be broadcast each morning at 7.18 following the weather forecast from the YA and YZ stations.

PLUNKET SHIELD CRICKET

COMMENTARIES of about 20 minutes' duration will be given periodically through the day on the Plunket Shield cricket. The stumps scoreboard, along with any outstanding features of play, will be broadcast in the 7 p.m. link. Monday and Tuesday, December 27 and 28, will be the final two days of the Wellington v. Auckland match (commentaries from 2YA) and of the Canterbury v. Otago match (3YA). From December 30 to January 1, Auckland will play Otago (1YA) and Canterbury will play Central Districts (3YA). From January 3 to January 5 Otago will play Central Districts (4YA) and Wellington will play Canterbury (2YA). Finally in this period, on January 7, 8 and 10, Wellington will play Central Districts at Nelson (2XN and 2YA) and Auckland will play Canterbury (1YA). The Commercial stations will give the scoreboard at the luncheon and tea adjournments and at stumps on each day of play.

BOWLS

WIVES and clubmates of the 1750 bowlers, who will be in Wellington for the New Zealand Championships

from December 29 to about January 15, can hear a ten-minute summary of the play daily at 9.30 p.m. from all the YA and YZ stations. In addition, 2YA will broadcast the opening ceremony and selected commentaries in the finals of the singles, pairs and rinks.

DAVIS CUP TENNIS

AT Sydney's White City tennis courts, either the United States or Sweden (at the time of going to press the inter-zone finals had not been played) will compete against Australia for the Davis Cup. For the three days of play, beginning on Monday, December 27, the Main National stations will rebroadcast as much as possible of Radio Australia's Davis Cup commentaries.

From January 8 to 15 2YA will broadcast eye-witness accounts and selected commentaries on the New Zealand Tennis Championships at Central Park, Wellington. Five-minute summaries will also be heard in the 7.0 p.m. link. Results of the North Island Championships at Palmerston North from January 1 to 6 will be given in the 7.0 p.m. link with selected commentaries from 2ZA on the semi-finals and finals.

CROQUET

RESULTS from the quarter-finals onward of both the North Island Croquet Championships (at Hamilton) and the South Island Championships (at Christchurch), which begin on January 5, will be broadcast in the 7 p.m. link.

SOFTBALL

THE results of the New Zealand Men's Club Championships at Hastings from December 27-30 will be broadcast periodically throughout the day from

2YZ. 2YZ will then broadcast commentaries on the North Island v. South Island match on January 1, and the Men's National Inter-provincial Tournament on January 3-6. The results of these matches will also be broadcast nightly on the 7.0 p.m. link.

Ex Eh Aira Bay, Me-hico

ROSARITO BEACH is about 15 miles south of Tijuana, Mexico. Most of the way the road runs inland. Leaving town you turn south at the bull fight arena, which from the outside looks like the framework of a gasometer the day after somebody stole the tank. The road crosses a low pass, winds over rolling down land, straightens itself, and reaches the sea almost at Rosarito. There it is; radio transmitter towers, beach cottages, a few motels and roadhouses, and the white stucco mass of the Rosarito Beach Hotel.

Mexican border resorts have split personalities, half innocence and half dark violence. Spend a summer Sunday on the beach with the picnicking Mexican families. It's all melons, lobsters, cans of beer and children's laughter. Then you read in Monday's paper that some inharmonious character, down for the day from the City of the Angels, has chopped up his girl friend and left the pieces in a Rosarito parking lot. Fortunately the sins of others, and particularly gringos' sins, don't affect the Mexican's belief in his own essential goodness. He will help the cops clean up the parking lot, shrug, and take his place again behind his cash register.

If you know the score, Rosarito Beach is a good place to take your cash register. When I paid a social call there one Saturday afternoon last October I was not so equipped, but I learned about money just the same.

The party I was with were immovable round a portable radio, playing canasta and listening to a college football game. I sidled off towards the radio transmitter towers a quarter of a mile south. Once you have worked for a while at this sightless, blattering trade your sensibilities become dulled and you don't know enough to stay away from strange studios. Actually, strange is hardly the word to use. Besides New Zealand, I've trespassed about studios in Fiji, Fanning Island, Hawaii, four Canadian Provinces, Portland, Oregon, San Francisco, San Diego, California, and Baja, California, Mexico, and they might all have been in the same building.

The first person you meet in a radio station is the doorman. He is never

there. You push through the glass doors to the receptionist's desk. Her telephone headpiece is hung over the back of her chair, lights blink on the switchboard, and a buzzer purrs short syllables. She is not there, either. You wait.

As I waited I read that this was Station XERB. Through a double glass window was what I took to be the main studio. There was no one at the announcer's desk. By the chair was a three-tiered tape recorder. On the middle tier tape wound steadily from one spool to another. Further off, through another sound-proof window, I saw the head of an eagle-nosed brunette. We stared at each other remotely across the top of a control panel. Presently, enlivening this mechanised and embalmed piece of property, a small boy shoved open the glass doors and went whistling through the foyer, past the receptionist's desk, and down a corridor marked NO ENTRY. He carried a greasy paper bag and a coke bottle. In a few seconds he reappeared through the door behind the eagle-nosed brunette and gave her the food. She pushed her chair away from the panel and their heads started to bob in conversation.

The doorman appeared, carrying a mop. He was pleased to see me, and we talked about the trade in a debased border mixture of Spanish and English. Things were not too bad, he thought. They'd cut down the staff by two-thirds since he first came, but he was still there to open the door when a truck brought a load of tape recordings. The announcer was probably in the wash-room, but I could wait for him in the studio.

Announcers are divided men. They have to watch the clock, the tape, the turntables, the control panel, the station log and the front office of the advertising agency. As they talk their fingers must flutter between many skilled little operations. They must generate enthusiasm on a succession of snacks from greasy paper bags and project sincerity through an atmosphere devoid of oxygen. When they leave the microphone their voices diminish, losing that dominant bass resonance. Those not in the

Radio coverage of the race itself presents a problem. A ridge on the aerodrome makes it impossible to see all the track from ground level. One commentator will be stationed in the control tower, and two others at vantage points round the track to pick out close-up detail—without themselves being picked off by skidding racing cars, which will reach up to 140 m.p.h. on the straights. 1YA will broadcast commentaries on the race throughout the day. The southern YAs will link for five minutes at 1.0 p.m. to broadcast the start, and again for four minutes every half-hour until the end—about 3.45 p.m. A summary will be broadcast over the main National link at 7.0 p.m.

THE GRAND PRIX

APART from Argentina, New Zealand is the only country in the Southern Hemisphere which stages an internationally-recognised car race. The New Zealand International Grand Prix—100 laps of a two-mile circuit at Auckland's Ardmore aerodrome—will be run on Saturday, January 8.

Listeners to Steve Fleming's Friday night *Sports Page* from 1YA will already have heard something about the race and the months of intricate preparation which go into it. They will also have the chance to hear interviews with some of the drivers—including Britain's Peter Whitehead (to drive a Ferrari), Siam's Prince Birabongse (a Maserati), and Tony Gaze (a Ferrari)—in the *Sports Pages* before the race.

trade suffer a sense of loss the first time they hear an announcer at home, hawking his throat like any other human being and whining irritably for his morning coffee.

As the announcer came into the studio the wall clock read 15 seconds before 4.30 p.m. He greeted me with one eye, keeping the other fixed on the clock, sat down at his desk, faded out the tape music with his right hand, with his left flipped a disc on one of his turntables, and set the playing head in the first groove of a narrow-tracked section near the centre. He pushed over his microphone switch:

"This is XERB, Mexico. Ex Eh Aira Bay, Me-hico."

He spun the turntable and faded in a march theme for a few seconds, then announced race results and gave a spiel for a firm of Los Angeles turf consultants who guaranteed to set you up very favourably for a day at the races. At 4.34 p.m. he faded in the tape programme again, switched off his microphone, and was ready for gossip. He was a sallow man, the whites of his eyes tinged yellow, and pouches of darkened skin had developed under them. His appearance indicated that, like most radio men, he was short of oxygen, green vegetables and sunshine. He spoke softly, only a slight roughness in his r's and s's suggesting that English was his second language.

"Always glad to have people stop by," he said. "You worked in radio? Well, you know how it goes. . . We're on the air from 6.0 a.m. till midnight. Two hours of Spanish in the mornings, the rest in English, but even our Spanish commercials are from across the line. Every fifteen minutes we have a commercial from this turf firm, and we give race results as they come in from all tracks. We've got an Associated Press wire in here, so we keep up."

I asked him about advertising rates and coverage.

"Forty thousand watts," he said. "We're beamed North and South, but we don't worry about the South end. In the North they can hear us in Alaska. We get top rates; in dollars, naturally."

"Naturally," I said. "It is steady? Long term stuff?"

"Yeah," he said. "Our big checks stay steady. We're in the information business, you see. We can supply information that doesn't go on the air across the line. So the firms know people tune

us in for that, and when they figure they can sell to that type of people, they stay with us."

"You've got a big studio here," I said. "Any live shows now?"

He snorted in sallow amusement. "I've seen pictures taken in here before the war," he said. "Rumba bands and mariachis and stuff, but not now, brother. Just me and the doll (he waved at the eagle-nosed brunette behind the control panel), and a mile of tape. We get it from a firm in Chicago. They must have quite a factory there. We play a few records in the mornings, but mostly it's just tape."

"Do you miss the people?" I asked, wondering how deep he'd dive in after that one.

"Oh, sure," he said. "I know I'm strictly on the assembly line now. If I were one of those little guys with a fiddle you see in the cafes I wouldn't be so happy. Muzak and the tape has really moved in on them."

"It must look all right on the books," I said. "Very little overhead."

He looked at me over his cigarette without saying anything.

"Top American ad rates," I went on. "Mexican costs and maintenance. How are taxes?"

His expression was almost smug. "Not too difficult to work out that someone's winning," he said softly. "But you didn't see a Cadillac outside, brother. The boss ain't here." He ground out his cigarette. "It's a sweet deal, all right. All you need is capital and contacts. Then you'll bring it in. You can sure shout loud with forty thousand watts."

I shivered slightly. The clock showed 30 seconds before the three-quarter. The cold sea mist blows in most autumn evenings about this time.

The announcer turned towards his desk. Compared with his mechanised frontal aspect, the back of his neck looked curiously defenceless.

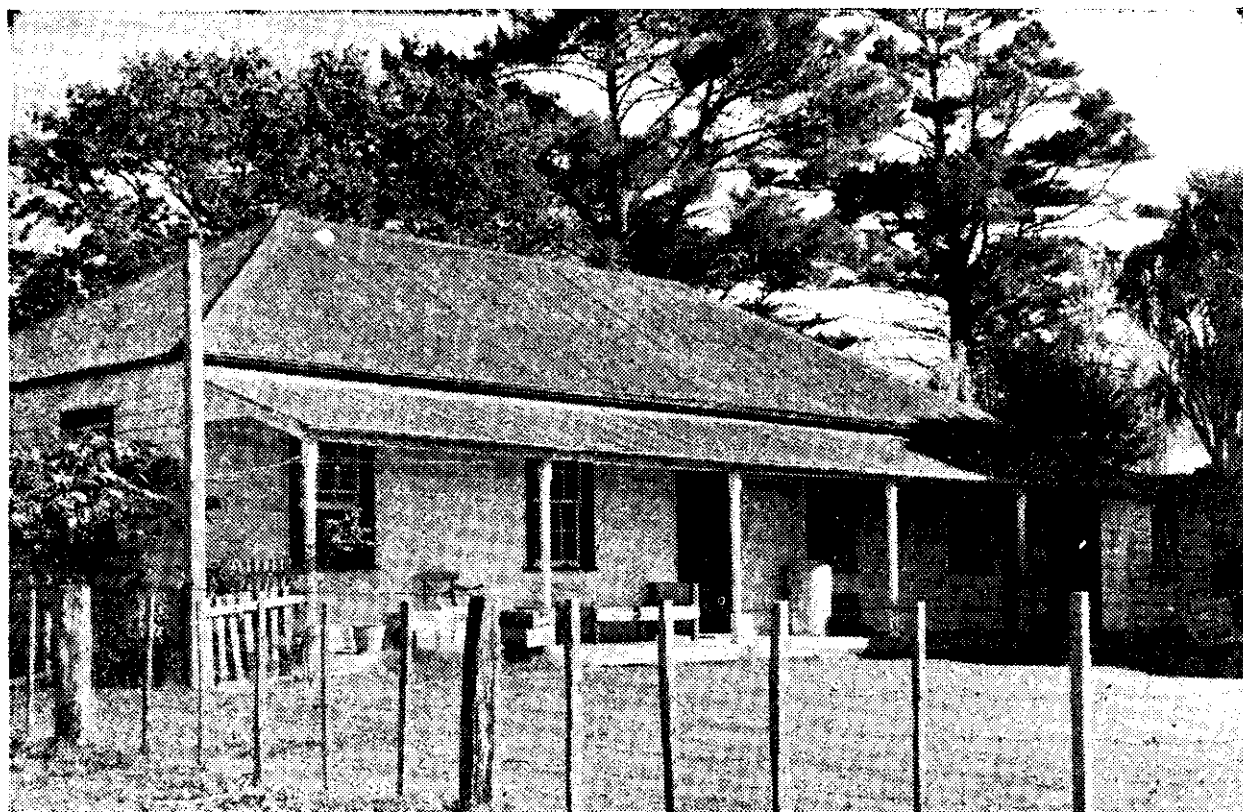
"Stop by anytime," he said, fading the tape music. "Always glad to see you."

derided, were now to be thrust upon him. For in 1865 he was first made a J.P. and then, under the Native Lands Court Act of that year, a Judge of the new Court, for which piece of preferment he proved eminently worthy. . . . He was a favourite with the natives, had their confidence, and speedily concluded matters, sometimes, it was said, not merely by the strong arm of the law, but by the aid of his own as well."

So it was here, in this little courthouse, that Maning administered the law, and under these trees, perhaps, he used his strong arm to enforce it. . . .

The scene presented itself almost automatically to the imagination: Maoris squatting in groups all over this green paddock which surrounds the courthouse; Maning within, listening patiently to Maori eloquence which he knew so well. Did he, we wondered, feel the situation to be incongruous?—that this world was really topsy turvy, in which he, whose youth in Tasmania had bred in him a hatred of the law and all its ways, now administered it to others? Many people have remarked how silent he always kept about those early years. Was there some mystery which he could not divulge?

Neil Ferguson and his son in Rawene had spoken to us of these things. They had been undertaking research into the question why Maning, at the age of 22, suddenly uprooted himself from Tasmania and came to the Hokianga. The only answer that Maning gave was love of freedom and adventure. Were there other reasons besides? The Fergusons were hot on a trail. They had discovered this much at least; that just before Maning left Hobart, seven Irish patriots, some of them men of good standing, who had been transported, escaped from Hobart prison. In some mysterious way they were smuggled out of the country and found their way safely to America. Had Maning anything to do with their escape? He was known to have saved from the gallows the henchman he brought with him to New Zealand, Will Waters, though (writes Dr. Hocken) "how this had been effected no one quite knew." And there was that strange fact

GIANT ON THE BENCH

WHEREVER you go on the Hokianga, the spirit of Frederick Edward Maning seems to haunt you. It is impossible to escape him. Even if he had never written his reminiscences, the classic *Old New Zealand*, there would still be stories handed on from one generation to another about this herculean Irishman with the pale blue eyes and long hair falling in ringlets. For Maning was everywhere and in everything. His name seems to belong to the Hokianga almost as much as Kupe's.

If he were alive today, he would be pleased to see that his old house at Onoke is still more or less as it was in his time; children, although not his own descendants, playing on the broad verandah, helping on the farm, or—which would surprise him more—going off by launch to school at Rawene.

And he would look with approval at the solid kauri walls of the homestead, made, by his orders, thick enough to be bullet-proof. "They can't build like that now," he would say, "they haven't the kauri, and they haven't Jackie Marmon to put it together." Jackie, another legendary figure of the Hokianga, had certain tricks of building; they can be recognised today.

And in one of the darkly panelled front rooms, Maning would see his own judicial chair, made also of kauri, unstained. In this he had sat as judge in the little courthouse that still stands in the paddock a hundred yards or so from the house in the shadow of a great aspen poplar which he himself had planted long ago.

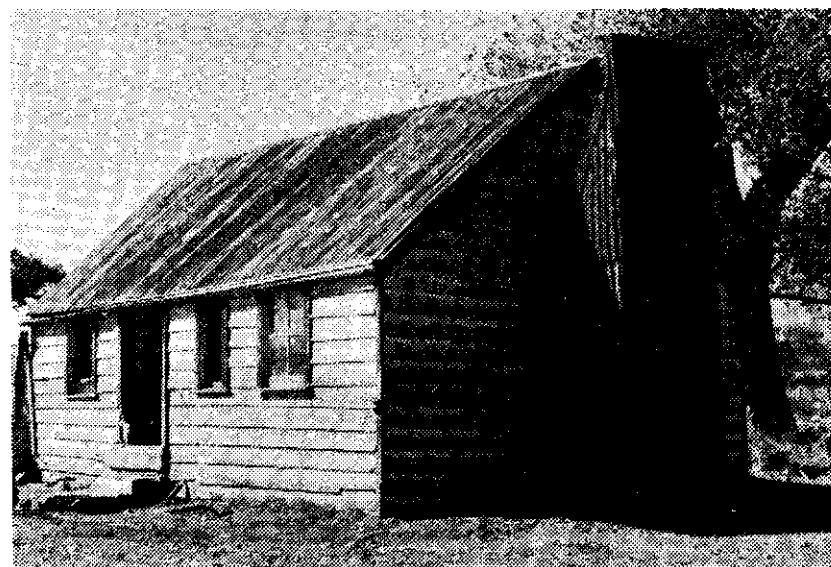
It is a wonderfully peaceful place, this old Maning home. Behind it rise the steep hills; in front, lawns of brilliant green and paddocks watered by a tidal creek run down to the shore of the broad Hokianga estuary. The old trees are huge and high, giving shade to the sheep, and the orchard near the house has fruit trees of every kind. Peach trees, as all along the Hokianga, grow everywhere: tree-tomatoes riot, an incongruous word to use of such a place as this—where even the pony on which our children rode was gentle and quiet.

The little courthouse, said to be the first Maori land-court in New Zealand, looks so small that you can scarcely imagine any dignified legal proceedings taking place in it. It stands in a paddock near the house. It looks like a barn, and that in fact is what it has become. Inside, hay is stacked high to the ceiling. But you may still see the original fireplace in front of which His Honour Judge Maning sat, administering those same British laws which, in his youth on this very river, he had done his best to keep out of New Zealand.

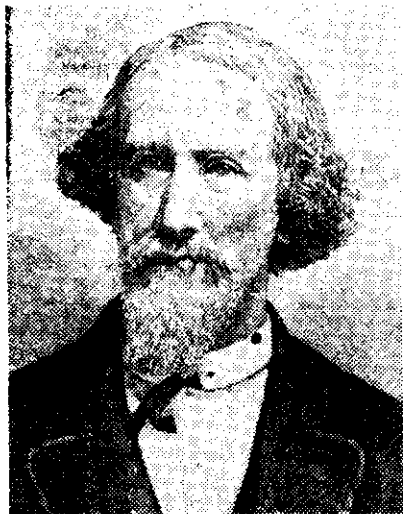
He was not altogether happy, they say, about this Judgeship. Married to a Maori

wife, and having lived so long among the Maoris, he knew them almost too well. He knew their customs, their tapus and their complicated systems of ownership. The idea of applying Western laws to the Maoris had troubled him more and more. "I don't think the law will have much 'mana' here in my time," he had written. "I feel as if I were two persons at the same time. Sometimes I find myself on the Maori side, and then, just afterwards, wondering if 'we' can lick the Maoris and set the law upon its legs, which is the only way to do it. . . . I belong to both parties, and I don't care a straw which wins. . . ."

Three years after writing those words he was administering the law himself. "That greatness and respectability," wrote Dr. Hocken, "which so long he had

best people don't increase very fast the demand for elevated sections rises while we sleep. This is not wishful thinking inspired by the knowledge that I live on a hillside myself, came here for the view, and could offer little else of value if I wanted to move out again. It is the evidence of my eyes and my ears, and gains strength daily.

But it had not occurred to me, until the idea was suggested by an article I read recently in *The New Statesman*, that the world for an increasing number of people is becoming more and more difficult to see. We don't expect to see much of it if we spend the daylight hours in cities and go home to sleep. But even when we make long journeys, cross continents, or go right round the world, we no longer see what every traveller saw 30 or 40 or 50 years ago. I recently travelled 1250 miles by train in Australia without seeing more than 300 miles of country. The rest slipped by in darkness. I flew 1250 miles home without seeing anything but stars above me and clouds below me. If we fly by day, and it is a day without clouds, we fly too high and too fast to see anything below us distinctly. When I rode a horse I thought that the best of all methods of seeing the countryside. I was high enough up to see over the fences, had not to exert myself to keep on moving, and lost none of the view around me by watching the ground under my feet. I still think there is nothing so good as that if we ride, as I always could, with comfort. But the *New Statesman* writer suggests that helicopters in a year or two will be the traveller's joy—first because they will move reasonably close to the ground, second because they will not travel fast enough to blur the objects they pass, and third because the traveller will be high enough above the earth to have a clear view. I have not yet been in a helicopter, and can think of snags: the straight look down, perhaps, which is so disturbing in the nose of a plane. But the picture in general is tempting.

[HALF an hour ago, when I was sitting with my back against a rock enjoying the sun, I heard fluttering and chirping in a pine tree a little distance below me, and when I looked for an explanation I saw a hawk moving slowly along a limb examining the nests of the sparrows. It is a very old tree with a very big limb, ten or twelve inches in diameter and almost horizontal, so that the hawk was moving in a straight line as if it had been on the ground. But it was not moving easily. It kept overbalancing, and recovering with its wings, and I had not a clear enough view to see whether its claws were free or already holding plunder. But it kept going for eight or ten feet, and on the way examined four nests—a sight I have never in my life seen before. It must happen fairly frequently that a hawk stands beside a nest and robs it; but if it is a common occurrence I can't understand why I have never seen it until today. Hawks like to keep flying and do their dirty work with their feet. Even when they find a rabbit in a trap they do some cruel work with their talons before they settle and start eating (without killing). But this hawk used its wings only when it lost its balance.

of which Dr. Hocken says that Maning made no secret, "that the bushrangers of that period would never interfere with him. . . ."

And so you may sit and look upon this green and peaceful corner of the world, picturing days when life on these same acres was raw and rough; when it was comforting to have that bullet-proof house behind you in case your visitors happened to prove foes; when Maori canoes were drawn up on this shore, their occupants crowding round to watch great trials of strength in which they, as much as Maning, delighted. These meetings should have been known, like the Highland Games, as the Hokianga Games. Old ex-constable Beasley, who died only recently aged 95, remembered them well. His eyes had flashed with reminiscent excitement as he told us of "those great days" when Maning reigned at Onoke. "Maning was a great chap," he said, "great at wrestling, great at rowing, boxing, running, jumping, and—you won't know this game of course, single-sticks. I used to take him on at single-sticks. Beat him sometimes. But of course the grand climax to the games was always the tug-o'-war between Maoris and Pakehas. The Maoris loved the tug-o'-war."

One could wish that the body of the jovial Irish giant Maning might have been brought here, to lie under this green sward; near to the old homestead his comrade Marmon built for him; near to the Maori pa which he had helped to fortify; near to the great river which had welcomed him in youth and manhood, and had seen him depart white-haired, white-bearded, but with keen blue eyes as steady as ever.

toes. Although there are men who claim that they read a book a day, and some who perhaps do, Sir William's claim is that he "absorbs, digests, and remembers" what he reads. I think it was one of the *New Yorker's* reviewers who said once that he read two books a day, and sometimes three, but he did not claim that he digested or remembered what he read, and if he had made that claim I would not have accepted it. If a man reads three books a week without injury he is abnormal. If he is normal and does it, someone else is making his thoughts and controlling them. I am as suspicious of the ceaseless reader as I am of the man who does not read at all, and boasts of it. There was widespread laughter a few years ago when one of our Prime Ministers went to the Franz Josef to think. It would have been wiser to pretend that he had a book or two in his bag, but not wise to get them out. O. A. Gillespie paid a fine tribute in *The Press* the other day to the almost forgotten Harold Williams. I was glad to see it, and hope it was widely read. But I found it more depressing than stimulating. Men are not made to set such a pace as that, to learn 58 languages, and excite their brain sixteen hours a day with the sorrows, dangers, or injustices of the world. They die young when they do that, and fight ineffectually, as Williams did. It is better to turn back to the sheep with David Ben Gurion.

Up to a point Sir William Haley agrees with all this. He was not arguing for more reading when he made the admission with which I began, but rather for less—suggesting that men who say they can read more than three books a week are careless readers or bad counters. I think three is too many by two.

[T always gives me pleasure to see buyers bidding against one another for a house with a view, or giving its value and half as much again for a section on the side of a hill. In this flat city of Christchurch people will give almost as much to look down on their neighbours as they will to live beside the best people; and since the

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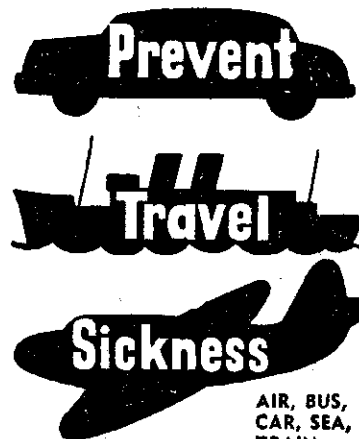

Colonial Foundations

THE EARLY AUSTRALIAN ARCHITECTS AND THEIR WORK, by Morton Herman; Angus and Robertson, Australian price £4.4/-.

(Reviewed by C.M.M.)

THE essence of building is the provision of shelter from whatever materials are available. When such materials are composed in a form which offers some aesthetic or intellectual satisfaction, the product is architecture. To trace the development from mere building to architecture in Australia has been the object of this book. The author, himself a practising architect, set about collecting evidence of the country's architectural development from the time Arthur Phillip landed the first convicts in Botany Bay.

Since the story of architecture is the story of the human endeavours of the people who produce it, the progression of failures, disappointments, and the ultimate successes is there to be read in timber, brick and stone. The author's interpretation of these evidences is sympathetic, graphic and realistic.

The reluctant founders of the new colony were ill equipped for the job they had to do. Tools were few, skill limited, and the building materials of the new world unknown in their behaviour. Building practices well tried and established in the old country were applied and many found to fail. The unaccustomed dry spells, the rains which to the new arrivals seemed torrential, and the violent winds of "the bry" all took their toll. The new climate could not be tamed, so new methods of building had to be found.

For some years the colonists lived in a variety of improvised shelters, while Governor Phillip sent endless requests home for tools and implements. Slowly, as the tools were finally provided, and a few skilled tradesmen arrived, Australia's architectural history began.

Of those who practised architecture in the early days of the colony much of human interest is to be found. Remembering that architecture throughout the world at the time was at a generally low ebb, and eclecticism was the rule rather than the exception, it is surprising that even a few men with ability to design ever reached Australia. Those who did were not masters. As the author points out, much of the early work was

indifferent, some of it bad, but all of it contained historical interest. The buildings to which most attention is paid are those which gained their appeal from being unpretentious, of inherently good proportions and which expressed the natural materials of which they were built—those buildings which fulfilled a definite need in the formation of the young society.

The illustrations to the text, black and white and water-colour, are executed in a masterly hand. They are not prepared for pure artistic value but are the work of a craftsman compiling a factual, historical record. They gain their objective.

The "mutilation" (the word is the author's) of buildings of historical value is deplored. Reverence of beauty is not often found where necessity rules, but it is also necessary that records of past works should be collected before it is too late. In New Zealand, examples of our short architectural heritage are fast disappearing. Many of our notable old timber structures have already been demolished without adequate record. This must be a source of regret in the future.

A companion volume tracing Australian work from the early colonial period to the present day is to follow.

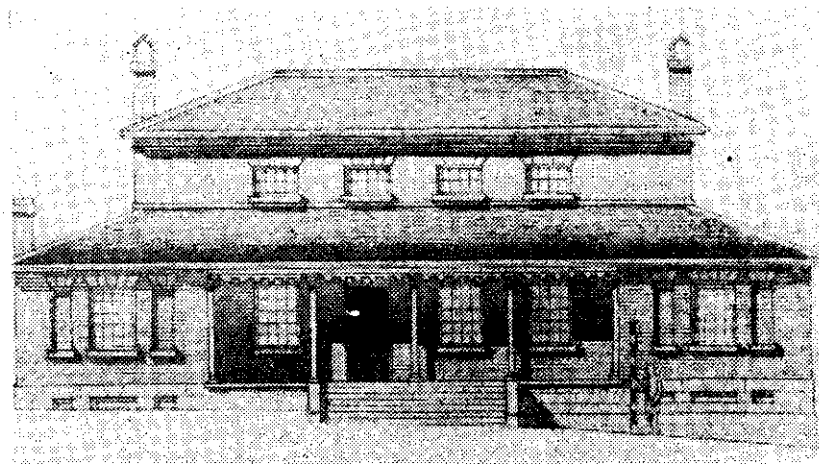
HIMALAYAN REVIEW

THE MOUNTAIN WORLD, 1954, edited by Marcel Kurz; George Allen and Unwin, English price 25/-.

PRINTED in Switzerland, and with editions published in America, France, Switzerland, Germany and Italy, this book can claim to be the most international of its kind. The success of the 1953 volume prompted the Swiss Foundation for Alpine Research to concentrate on the Himalayas for their next issue. The result is a list of subjects and writers that for interest and brilliance may never again be equalled in mountaineering literature.

Mount Everest is covered by the Swiss, Gabriel Chevalley and Raymond Lambert, followed by Sir John Hunt and Wilfrid Noyce. The version by Noyce is clear and simple. The American attempt on K2 by Charles S. Houston is magnificently described and the complications of serious illness at a high altitude camp, an accident, an avalanche, death, and subsequent descent are shown with

"In A Sturdy English Tradition"

CANTERBURY COLLEGE is not as rich in tradition as it would like to suppose. That will come, because it has been so rich in personalities. Professor Frederick Sinclair, whose death occurred on December 6, was one of them. He succeeded two notable men, Professors Macmillan Brown and Arnold Wall, in the chair of English.

Professor Sinclair arrived from Melbourne (though Auckland-born) with the reputation of an iconoclast. It was in the troubled days of the depression, and he quickly made it clear to us bewildered neophytes that literature was not something that could be academically filed and docketed. It was the very stuff of life. In literature, and in life he took sides passionately, often to the dismay of his more tussocky colleagues. He spoke his mind, and stirred Canterbury as no one had done since Professor Shelley.

You were for or against Sinclair. The "fors" found him generous in wit and wisdom, full of sturdy rightness (even righteousness), and somehow as strangely English as Bunyan. The "againsts" would say he was a cantankerous ranter, no great scholar, a pacifist and not quite a gentleman. But he was the lustiest pacifist I ever met, and he must have been a gentleman from the quickness of his temper.

He had a passionate admiration for those opposites, Shaw and Chesterton. He had a contempt for Anglo-Saxon and the barbaric northern tongues; he loved Homer and Virgil and Dante, and he sang Handel at the least opportunity. He had reverence for Milton and detestation for Pope. In one lecture when several students were chattering he said, "Ladies and gentlemen, to interrupt when I am talking is understandable, to interrupt when I am reading from Milton is inexcusable. That will be all for today." And he stormed out. His lecture on Pope once began, "I know only one good thing about Pope—he was kind to his mother." And went on to thwack Pope so hard that I for one was im-

pelled to find out more about Pope (in his favour, if possible) than was necessary for the curriculum. He was accused, of course, of giving a "biased" instead of an "impartial" view of literature.

In New Zealand letters he will take his place among our few great essayists. To that difficult form he brought a style of nice distinction, a wit that could be pungent or slyly paradoxical. You can see Chesterton there, and Swift, and the plain beauty of the Authorised Version. He enlivened the pages of the flamboyantly bitter *Tomorrow* and the solid columns of the *Press*. He published two collections, *Lend Me Your Ears* and *A Time to Laugh*, which are his anathemata to good writing.

The years mellowed him. He came to admire many old enemies, and, remarkably, they came to admire him. But nothing could temper his hatred of humbug. As a preacher and a man of fire he was in a sturdy English tradition. He professed life as well as literature.

all the implications. This is one of the truly great stories of Himalayan struggle.

The French ascent of the Nun, in the Nun-Kun massif, was another stirring triumph. The German conquest of Nanga Parbat is given a somewhat expurgated account, compared to that of the book recently reviewed in these pages. This is the only disquieting tendency of *The Mountain World*. The other famous attempts are Manaslu by the Japanese, and Dhaulagiri by the Swiss, whose accounts give the first ones available in English to the general reader.

The African peaks of Ruwenzori, Baffin Island, and Arctic ranges, with a stiffener of scientific work on glaciers and botany, make a readable 50 pages. Finally Kurz gives a masterly summary of Himalayan work for the seasons 1951-1952. New Zealanders will glow to read his description of Riddiford's 1951 party as "real explorers, not simply climbers on holiday."

The illustrations supporting the papers are numerous and varied, well produced, and with full captions. The book is of great value whether as reference or as arm-chair entertainment. It should

quicken the pulses of mountain-lovers throughout the world, and thus fulfil its purpose and its title.

ONE THAT GOT AWAY

FLIGHT FROM DAKAR, by Eiliv Hange and Vera Haiman: George Allen and Unwin Ltd., English price 15s.

DAKAR was briefly and intermittently in the news between 1939 and 1945. For the unfortunate Allied and neutral merchantmen interned in that Port, however, very little at all seemed to happen. It is astonishing that there should have been so many ships held in this small West African port. The French Vichyites having repelled a Free French attack supported by British warships, determined to obey the direction of their German masters and keep this merchant fleet immobilised. This in the case of the "Lidvard" was frustrated by the contrivance of the engineers, and finally the crew took their ship out of Dakar harbour under the nose of the Richelieu's powerful guns. How this was done makes a good story which is simply and modestly told.

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Peaceful Atoms

SOME years after Hiroshima was blasted out of existence there were rumours to the effect that crops grown in or near the area had tremendously increased. This led me to hope that *The Peaceful Uses of Atomic Energy* would in time show us other spectacular ways in which atomic fission could be used. But in the 3YA discussion between American and New Zealand experts my hopes were not really fulfilled. Radio-active isotope's chief function, so far as the soil was concerned, seemed to be as a research tool, although through its use we have also been able to produce rust-free oats. In medicine the most spectacular invention made possible through atomic studies is the 20-pound portable equivalent of an X-ray machine, while the most important discovery has been an as yet insufficiently tested ability to arrest cancer. Other things like the production of electricity or the preserving of food for three years, though interesting, were

not to my mind so exciting as the crop increases which I was hoping to hear about.

Goats and Whales

THE summer is a time of little things in radio entertainment and instruction. Of these this week there have been two delightful examples. The 3YC "Chlorophyll" talk by Dr. Magnus Pyke was a ray of purest light serene in the naughty world of advertising where brass is bartered as gold. Ending a session which delved into the curious secrets of our physical being (one of which was that you can make a child's breath smell of garlic by rubbing that vegetable against the soles of its feet) the speaker quoted a rhyme from a British newspaper:

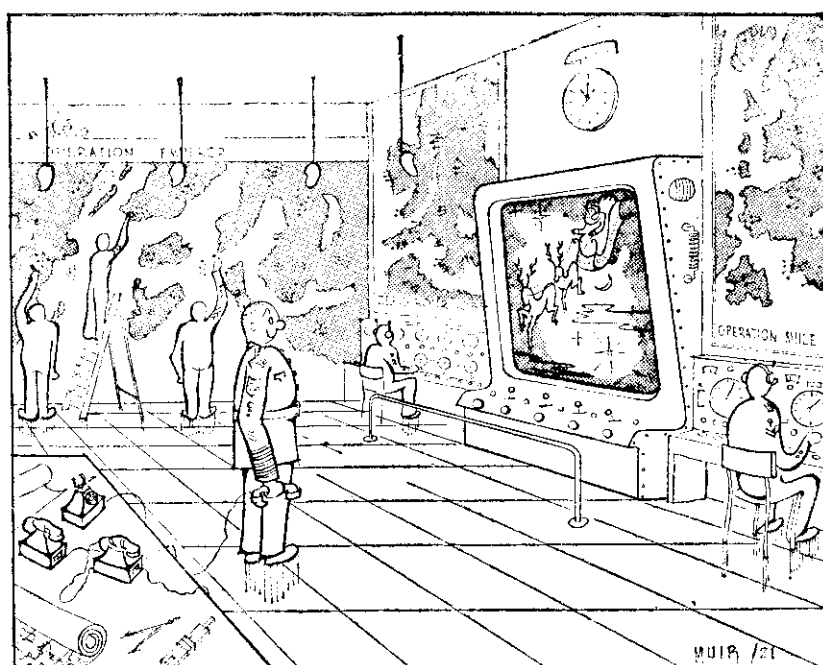
The goat that reeks on yonder hill
has browsed all day on chlorophyll.

John Hall's small talk on the "Okarita Whale" traced the humorous vicissitudes through which the stranded corpse of a whale finally found its way into the Christchurch Museum owing to the energy and foresight of the late Edgar Stead. The owners of the whale, who had hoped for up to £1000 for their find, ended with £20. There must be many such stories which could be profitably resurrected.

An American Theme

THE theme of American Momism has been thrashed so hard of recent years by novelists and playwrights that

some of the freshness has departed from Sidney Howard's *The Silver Cord*, which was one of the first in the field. Despite this, the admirably economical construction of the play and its pur-

poseful dialogue still keeps it very much alive. Listening to the NZBS version (1YA), I found myself thinking how much more effective as anti-Momism was this non-propagandist



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treatment than Philip Wylie's hysterical polemics against the devouring American mother. A pretty good cast made the most of the dramatic moments, and I thought John Huson as the spineless son, and Pat Evison as the determined wife of the other son were particularly effective. But Zenocrate Graham's portrayal of the consuming Mrs. Phelps seemed to me to lack depth and subtlety. Sidney Howard's character is more finely conceived than this. One effect of the rather obvious playing of this part was to make the sons, who are supposed to be completely deceived by her maternal avowals, appear gullible in a way the playwright hardly intended.

Sweetness and Light

R. F. DELDERFIELD'S *Glad Tidings* (NZBS), one of those cosy, homely, middle-middle-class plays in which the British specialise, made pleasant light-weight radio drama in 12B's *Sunday Showcase*. The fable could hardly have been more trite—a widowed Colonel with four grown-up children brings home his intended second wife, and his family react in the main unfavourably, until the kindly managing hand of their prospective step-mother brings everyone together in

THE ORCHESTRA'S YEAR

a positive orgy of sweetness and light. However, after a very slow start, an admirable cast brought out the essential warm-heartedness and goodwill of the piece. This was produced in the Auckland studios, which gave us the chance of hearing voices from outside the rather too limited Wellington circle. Athol Coats successfully disguised himself as the Colonel, and Barry Linehan gave a neat imitation of Flying-Officer Kite in the role of the cloudy-witted Corporal Brain. But the honours of the piece go to Honor Sim, a welcome addition to broadcast drama, for her mature, relaxed and thoroughly competent performance as Kay Stewart, the good-fairy step-mother. I hope we are to hear more from the *Glad Tidings* team.

★ The Week's Music . . . by OWEN JENSEN ★

AT Llangollen in Wales they have a festival, nothing like Edinburgh, nothing like Salzburg, but a music meeting whose significance may in the long run be even greater—the International Festival of Folksong. You may have heard the recording of songs from the 1953 Festival which has been going the rounds. If you haven't, keep a look out for it. You'll enjoy it. Belgrade, Innsbruck, Italy, 50 voices from a French University (with a New Zealander among them, incidentally), Spain, Switzerland, England and U.S.A.—some of the best choral singing you are likely to hear any time, fresh, vivid and friendly. In fact, the commentator summed up the spirit of the occasion by remembering that the valley of the Dee which shelters Llangollen was called by Wordsworth, "the vale of friendship."

Nevertheless, after all the singing and the hands-across-the-sea business, I couldn't help thinking of the harassed Festival Secretary, harassed as he must surely have been, straightening out the tangles, wrangles and wangles of more than 1200 competitors from 22 countries. Well, you know what musicians are.

Three of the most attractive broadcasts this week were of contemporary music, but you mightn't know it was contemporary without being told, for there was nothing of astringency, sourness or even dissonance, in the popular sense, about it. Two of the works were

frankly and warmly romantic. The third composer seemed to be looking back to the dispassionate asceticism of the 16th Century or earlier.

The 16th Century echoes came from settings of Psalms 70 and 86 by the Swiss composer Henri Sutermeister (born 1910). They were beautifully sung by Gerald Christeller with organ accompaniment of John Randal (2YC). In the same programme we heard the first performance of Douglas Lilburn's newest work, Six Duos for Two Violins. The Duos immediately recall Bartok for the reason that the Hungarian composer wrote 44 for the same combination. But there any resemblance ends. Douglas Lilburn's Duos are of a different texture altogether; but they are no mere exercise in two-part counterpoint. They are exciting, making the most of the resources of the two instruments without any fancy effects and, in no way derivative, nevertheless romantic in temperament. They were convincingly played by Ruth Pearl and Jean McCartney (2YC).

Rapsodia Portuguesa for piano and orchestra, by the Spanish composer Escriche Ernesto Halffter (born 1905) was the other romantically inclined piece. Rhythmically very much alive, it gave the National Orchestra, conducted by Dr. Charles Nalden, plenty to do (YC link). But it asked much more of the soloist. David Galbraith's exposition of the solo part was a brilliant bit of work.

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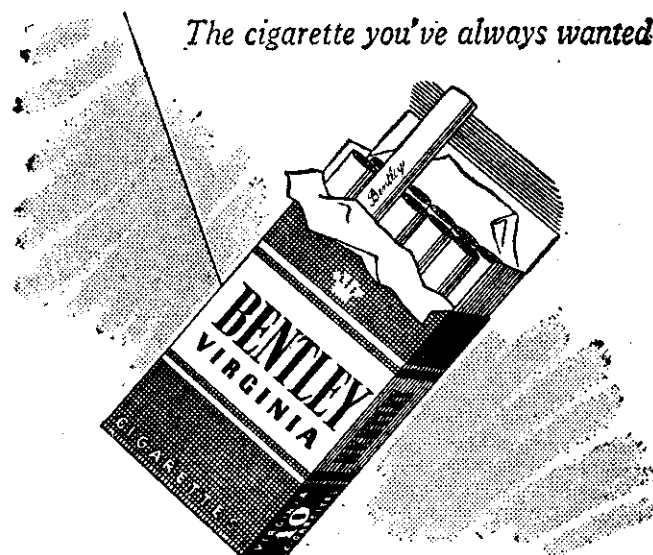
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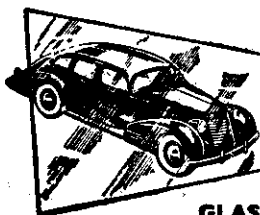

DIFFERENT WORLDS

THE YELLOW BALLOON

(Associated British-Marble Arch)

IN very different ways both this week's films are good entertainment, and both also have besides a something else which isn't so easy to generalise about. *The Yellow Balloon* is a thriller, and a pretty good one. I'm told that it resembles *The Window*, which I didn't see. A small boy, Frankie Palmer, loses sixpence which he has begged from his father to buy a balloon. In his disappointment he snatches a balloon from a neighbour's child and leads him a dance into the heights of a blitzed building. The other boy falls, and for the rest of the film Frankie lives close to panic under the influence of a young criminal who persuades him that the police might blame him for the other boy's death. That's the simple outline of the thriller, and even if it does pinch a bit from other films—there's a quite effective sequence of pure *Third Man*—it makes a tense and exciting piece of cinema.

The something extra which for me set *The Yellow Balloon* apart was its close and sympathetic study not only of the boy but of a whole working class setting. The trouble started over sixpence, which in the sort of home Frankie came from is not something that can be thrown away. This home (with its teapot where the holiday money goes), the neighbours and the neighbourhood, the policeman on his beat, the costermonger, the cheap eating house and fun parlour, the Sunday school, the pub, the dancing teacher who befriends Frankie—all are presented in a way that brings vividly to life the district where Frankie lives. The makers of this film were concerned, I imagine, to set a not too ingeniously plotted story against this background, and in doing so were prepared to sacrifice something of the slickness of the thriller pure and simple—and personally, I wouldn't have it otherwise.

Young Andrew Ray (who was in *The Mudlark*) isn't called on to show a very wide range of emotions as Frankie, but his sustained series of variations on a

note of fear are wonderfully well done. As his father and mother, Kathleen Ryan and Kenneth More could not be better; there are some beautifully natural touches in their home life scenes, and I must say it was refreshing to see Mr. More again in a part nearer the one he played in *Chance of a Lifetime*. The part of the criminal has been written with a complete lack of sympathy (possibly a criticism in a film of this sort), and it's played with most convincing plausibility by William Sylvester. Some of his acting in close-up is quite memorable. As might be expected, the minor parts also have been filled with care.

The Yellow Balloon was directed by J. Lee-Thompson, who also worked with Anne Burnaby on the script from her story; and the photography is by Gilbert Taylor.

WOMAN'S WORLD

(20th Century-Fox)

THE new CinemaScope production takes a very different world for its setting. Doing New York at the expense of the fabulously successful Gifford Motors are three of its branch managers, whom Mr. Gifford himself is looking over in a search for a new general manager. He's also looking over the wives. One husband and one wife are go-getters—the rest are pretty decent people. Who's going to get the big job? You'll have to wait to find out, and if you're anything like me you'll stay entertained till the end.

Clifton Webb is as smooth a big shot as ever signed an annual report, and his managers and their wives—Van Heflin and Arlene Dahl, Fred MacMurray and Lauren Bacall, Cornel Wilde and June Allyson—turn out to be quite interesting and, for the most part, human folk. As the title suggests, women have a big say in what men make

of themselves, and the film has a word for something better than marriage to the top job. Making the best of both worlds, it also thoroughly exploits the rich and bibulous life encountered at the top and on the way up (I ended up just about under the table), leaving the impression that though the G.M.'s job mightn't be worth the price for all of us it must be jolly d to go on wallowing on the fringe. CinemaScope comes into its own in a few brief shots, and among many scenes which would be entertaining on any width of screen is a very funny one in a women's bargain store. There are some good lines, too. Jean Negulesco directed.

A GLOUCESTER EXILE

AMONG the entries for the 1953 Cheltenham Festival in Gloucestershire, England, was a poem by Sidney E. Knight. It was a free-verse, autobiographical poem which did not meet the terms of the competition, and it had to be disregarded when the awards were made. Nevertheless, the judges were so impressed by Sidney Knight's poem, *Gloucestershire Exile*, that they invited the well-known character actor John Laurie to read it to the audience at the Festival. When Laurie had finished the reading, Richard Church, who was presiding, said: "Tonight you have learned something that the critics cannot teach you, and that is how poetry is made."



The poem was later printed in *The Adelphi*, where it was discovered by the NZBS Productions Department and recorded for broadcasting by Roy Leywood.

Sidney Knight had emigrated to South Africa as a young man, and his poem tells how he was once a Gloucestershire village railway porter. Now he is an old man living in Johannesburg, and he looks out of the window of "this monstrous, Slab-sided steel and concrete cliff-dwelling" to see "dusty minedumps, rusty corrugated iron roofs, And one lone peeling bluegum just to remind me that such things as trees exist."

But the poem begins its evocation of Gloucestershire loveliness on a happier note:

I was once a porter on the line at Brinscombe up the Stroud Valley.

It was just after the first war and jobs were hard to get in 1919.

But the Exchange clerk said, "They are signing on."

Extra men at Gloucester to meet the 8-hour day and you may be lucky."

Sidney Knight was lucky, and in the poem he goes on to explain how much the lost days of his youth mean to him now he is in exile.

And I remember those lovely summer evenings of 1921.

Sitting on the lawn of the Bear at Amberley. Drinking deep out of tall blue-black tankards.

Then walking home in the twilight past Tom Long's post at the crossroads, and under

The cool, giant Minchinhampton oaks, singing our service songs.

And then to bed to be wakened in the morning by

The Massed Bands of the Brigade of Blackbirds

In the apple orchard on the bank across the lane.

Where the blossom lay, a foamy, lacy tablecloth on the green grass.

Just like the green rollers of the Cape, ruffled by the south-easter.

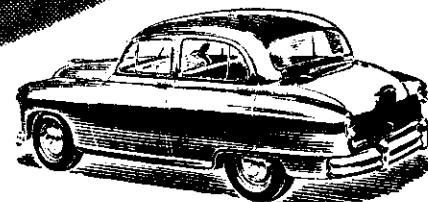
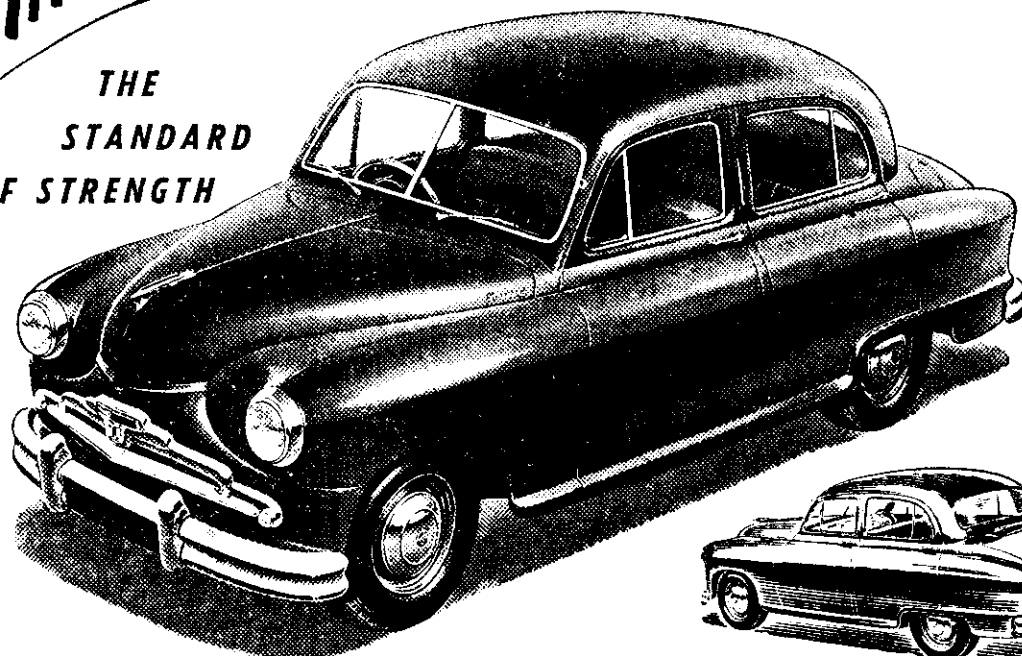

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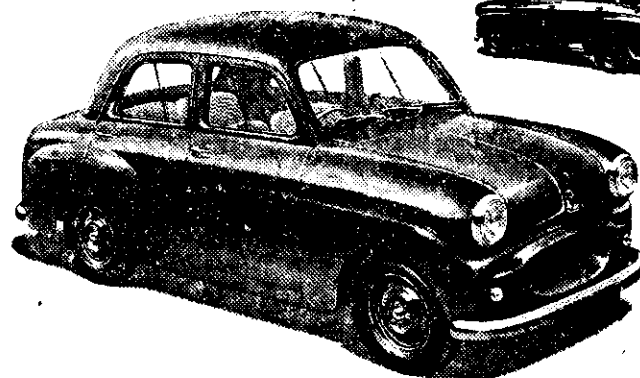


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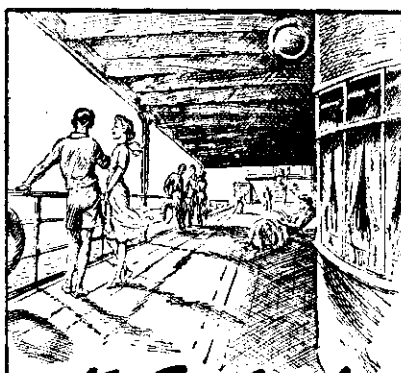
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sody? How can we describe the hours spent at the piano and manuscript book—practising, studying, analysing, arranging, composing? All this can only be hinted at, but the extent to which music dominates Llewelyn Jones's life can be seen from his hobby—making pianos. He has made more than a dozen of them, quality instruments which are a tribute to the craftsmanship of this all-round musician.

★

"THE secret of Crosbie Morrison's success is that he can happily combine his knowledge of wild life, which is wide and accurate, with a sympathetic awareness of listeners' points of view. He has thus been able to communicate in his radio talks a personality that is friendly and quick to strike the level of his enquiries." This is what Dr. R.

A. Falla, Director of the NO MORE Dominion Museum, said "WILD LIFE" when asked by *The Listener* to comment on the winding up of Mr. Morrison's programme *Wild Life* after 574 episodes over the Commercial Network in New Zealand.

That his radio programmes reflected a genuine interest in other people's problems was illustrated when Dr. Falla was camping with Mr. Morrison and a party of ornithologists in the Mallee country—that is, a semi-desert type of country—50 miles from Mildura, Victoria.

"After a very early morning expedition with his cameras, Mr. Morrison was having an after-lunch siesta when the camp was almost surrounded by children converging on it from the neighbouring countryside," Dr. Falla said. "News had got about that Crosbie Morrison was there, and the children were bringing their questions and specimens for identification. We made some effort to head them off, but Mr. Morrison was up and out as soon as he heard them. He spent the rest of the afternoon talking to them with apparent zest.

"The broadcasts to which we have listened in New Zealand represent no more than a fraction of Crosbie Morrison's work," Dr. Falla said. "He has been a teacher and a successful journalist and later has served on boards controlling nature reserves and scientific institutions.

WHEN the Gothic was here during the Royal Tour one of the favourite pieces of music played by the Royal Marine Band was Llewelyn Jones's *Maori Rhapsody*. A recording of the work by the Gothic band was made by the NZBS and broadcast from YA and YZ stations, and further broadcasts of it will be heard in the new year. When Llewelyn Jones was in Wellington recently on one of his periodic visits from Auckland he came in to see us and we learnt something of what it takes to be a successful musician.

Llewelyn Jones had his first music lessons in his homeland, Wales, where he studied the piano and was trained as a choir boy at the Newport Cathedral, Monmouthshire. As a lad he was brought by his parents to New Zealand, where he continued his musical education.

That was the beginning of the story. The present chapter, which could be called "Success," contains letters of congratulation on the performance of Llewelyn Jones's music from famous musicians, or letters of acceptance of his works by equally famous bands and orchestras. The pianist Paul Schramm wrote: "I am very interested in your *Cubana*. Could you try and arrange it for one piano?" Mansel Thomas, acting head of Welsh Music for the BBC, wrote: "We have received several messages of appreciation of the broadcast of your piano pieces."

Llewelyn Jones spent 15 months in Great Britain in 1950-51 when he and his wife were invited to a function at St. James's Palace to meet the Queen, now the Queen Mother. He was also the guest of Sir Adrian Boult (from whom he received a recommendation) and Sir Malcolm Sargent, and he conducted a two-hour rehearsal of his *Maori Rhapsody* with the Royal Welsh Guards Band.

The chapters in between are not so easy to write. How can we describe the persistence necessary to get work accepted by the BBC over a foot-high pile of rejected manuscripts by other composers—and good manuscripts at that? How can we describe the patience necessary to capture the melody of the canoe song, passed down from generation to generation of the Arawa tribe, and sung to Mr. Jones by an old Maori woman so that he could use it in *Maori Rhapsody*?

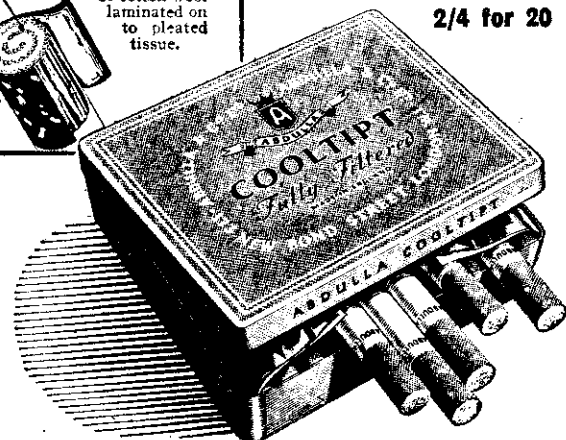
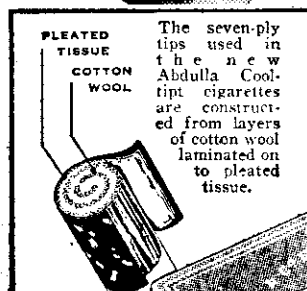

Wild Life will finish from Stations 1ZB, 2ZB and 3ZB on Thursday, December 30.

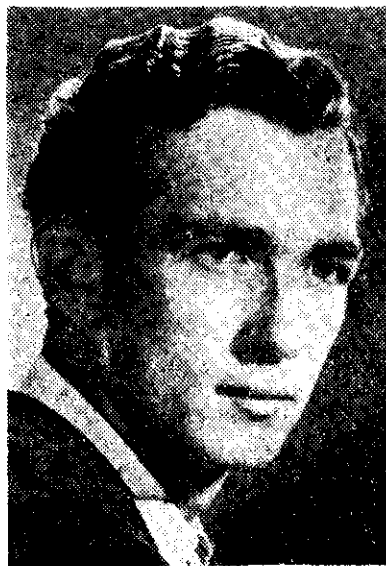

DAVID WELCH will be remembered as the young tenor romantic lead in the *South Pacific* company which toured New Zealand this year. He presents a programme of light music under the title *David Welch Sings*, starting from the YA stations at 7.30 p.m. on Saturday, January 8. The Oswald Cheesman Sextet provides the orchestral backing and in each of David's four programmes he introduces a guest artist. First comes George Hopkins, clarinetist, then Mary Negus, Hazel Millar and Doreen Harvey, vocalists.

South Pacific's company produced another recitalist in the contralto Virginia Paris, who played the character role of Bloody Mary in the show. Off-stage she proved to be a fine lieder and ballad singer, possessing a rich, mellow voice which she used with great artistry. "SATURDAY Night," according to a once-popular song, "is the loneliest night of the week." But listeners who tune to the YA stations at 7.30 p.m. on Saturday, January 1, will have pleasant company in Pauline Ashby. She is to present a programme, *Songs of Maoriland*, with the Capital Quartet. In it she sings "Te Ei a Hau," "Tama-i," "Nou Mai Ra" and "Mehe Manu Rere." Pauline Ashby's interest in Maori songs dates from the time when she learned Maori singing from the late Kingi Tahiti at Wellington's Ngati Poneke Club. She is also a keen student of the language and found that her Maori numbers were very popular with Maori servicemen, and many others besides, when she sang them on her two visits to Korea with concert parties. Pauline, who comes from Petone, has had a long association with the NZBS in Wellington. She has broadcast as resident vocalist with a dance orchestra from the Majestic Cabaret and given many studio recitals of popular vocal numbers. Local musical productions like *The Desert Song* have also had the assistance of Pauline's contralto voice.

SONGS OF MAORILAND

DR. WILLIAM WITHERING, who distilled the drug digitalis from foxgloves and demonstrated its use as a cure for dropsy, lived and worked in an age of witches and quacks. He was not the first man to use herbs for medicine, but he was the first to use them in a scientific way; and he wrote the first scientific treatise written in English on the treatment of disease.

STORY OF DIGITALIS When Dr. Withering died in 1791 he was buried in Edgbaston Old Church, Birmingham, and a carved foxglove still adorns the black marble tablet which marks his grave. Foxgloves, the "dead men's bells" of legend, also provide the title for a half-hour BBC programme about Dr. Withering which is to go the rounds of National stations of the NZBS. *Dead Men's Bells* will be broadcast from 3YC on Saturday, January 1, at 10.25 p.m., and from 2YA at 9.30 a.m. on Sunday, January 9.

DESCENDING from the more rarified airs of opera while they were here earlier in the year, members of the Australian National Opera recorded eleven programmes of lighter ballads and folk

songs for the NZBS. These are being broadcast by YA and YZ stations, beginning from 4YA on Thursday, January 6, at 8.10 p.m. Those taking part in the series *Singers of the Australian National Opera* are the sopranos Tais Taras, Gladys Mawson and Betty Prentice; the tenor Leslie Adams; the baritone Geoffrey Chard; and the bass-baritones Alan Light and Douglas Parnell.

Tais Taras's first programme consists of five unfamiliar Ukrainian folk songs, and her second of songs by Russian composers, including Glinka, Rimsky-Korsakov, Dargomizsky, and Tchaikovsky. Tais Taras is a Ukrainian by birth. She studied under celebrated teachers in Kiev, and gave concert performances in the Ukraine, Russia and Germany. Leslie Adams, who begins the series, gives a recital of popular tenor solos by Edward German, Massenet and Lehar. He was already known to New Zealanders through his tour with the Italian Opera Company a few years ago. Geoffrey Chard played the ebullient Figaro in the National Opera's presentation of *Barber of Seville* with immense success. He has recently been touring New Zealand with Ronald Dowd, giving recitals of excerpts from opera. Betty Prentice will be remembered for her sparkling interpretations of comedy roles—the vivacious Rosina in *The Barber of Seville*, and her Blonda and Musetta in *Il Seraglio* and *La Bohème* respectively. Her coloratura style is heard to advantage in a group of "bird songs," among them Del' Acqua's "The Swallow" and "The Russian Nightingale," by Liebling.

WHEN *Call Me Madam* toured New Zealand, its gallant, grey-haired hero, Cosmo Constantine, was played by René Paul. Coming from Switzerland originally, René spent considerable time in South Africa and later became an American citizen.

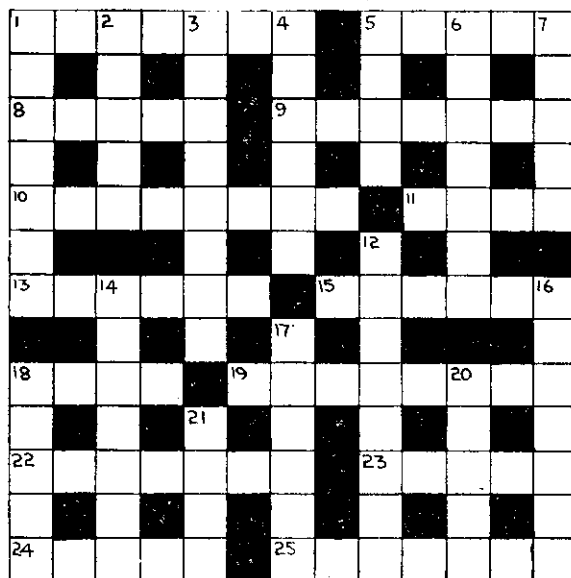

SUMMER HOLIDAYS

YOUR summer holiday time is just ahead. You've planned and saved, and you are going to make the most of it. Well, good luck to you! The manual worker manages his holidays better than his clerical counterpart or those caught up in the business world. He is seasoned to sunshine, conditioned to physical exertion, and does not subject the body to unaccustomed strains in his holiday making. The folk I'm thinking of—typists, clerks, shop people, business executives, maybe counting pennies, maybe well-to-do—are inclined to pack into one holiday all the things they should have been doing in more leisurely spread over the months. The end result of this general overdoing of things is not recuperation but exhaustion.

For people under stress in their daily life holidays are important. You don't have to be a business tycoon to encounter strain in daily living. Anybody shouldering responsibility, anybody having to think and plan, will be under stress unless there are periodic times for letting up and letting leisure mitigate anxiety and strain. The longer summer holiday should be part of this recuperative pattern, not a week or two in which to pack everything possible. The first requisite is to take that summer break,

the second is to use it wisely. Those foolish folk who carry on indefinitely, with no annual relief from stress and anxiety, will end up with duodenal ulcers, serious goitre troubles, or raised blood pressure. Authorities the world over are now agreeing that a period of unrelieved strain and anxiety can cause such diseases.

If this be true, the relief of stress must be deliberately planned. Holiday time plays no small part in preventing stress. When a tulip is brought from the other side of the world, planted here and deprived of its seasonal rest, it doesn't do any good the first year with us. We also can't perform well continuously. Whether a manual or an intellectual worker, labour must be followed by leisure. For both, the summer holiday is the one great chance to relax in leisure. The spell then does what it is meant to do, recreates one for the year ahead.

If you appreciate the significance of the word "recreation," your holiday will be wisely guided towards the re-creation of yourself, physically and mentally, from the energy-sapping influences of the past year. This calls for a complete change from work. It doesn't matter what you do, so long as it is a change. Chase the sunshine and fresh air if you are an inside worker. Play the game you want to play. But don't do these things till you are a sunburnt wreck and tired out! If the year round you work manually in the open air, spend your holiday inside if you want to, pottering about at hobbies or mending things, reading or just loafing, or going for a quiet swim or a bit of fishing if the outdoor calls. The annual holiday is a chance for father to look after the children, get to know them, and give mother a spell from her continuous overseeing. It's the great opportunity to do anything that you feel like doing and couldn't get round to doing during the year.

In case I've not made myself clear, see how a health objective in holiday time can be overdone and deplete our stores of energy! To have the sunlight play on the skin in restful relaxation makes for health, but only if in moderation. To get sunburnt spoils everything. Sunburn is an inflammatory process, the redness being followed by pain or tenderness on movement or from the pressure of clothes, blisters, flaking off of skin and final brownness. Moderation, giving the skin only what it can take without feeling hot and getting that warning blush, slowly and lightly tans. To go through first or deeper degree burns to get a heavy tan quickly drains body reserves and ends up with a skin so deeply tanned that some of its beneficial power of absorbing sunlight is lost. A health objective mismanaged!

Stress is the bane of modern life. Let your annual holiday be devoted to its prevention through a mixture of leisure and the pleasurable doing of the things that satisfy you and that you want to do—but—no overdoing of anything, your whole objective being re-creation for the year ahead.

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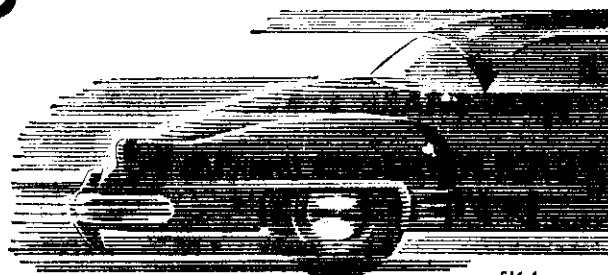
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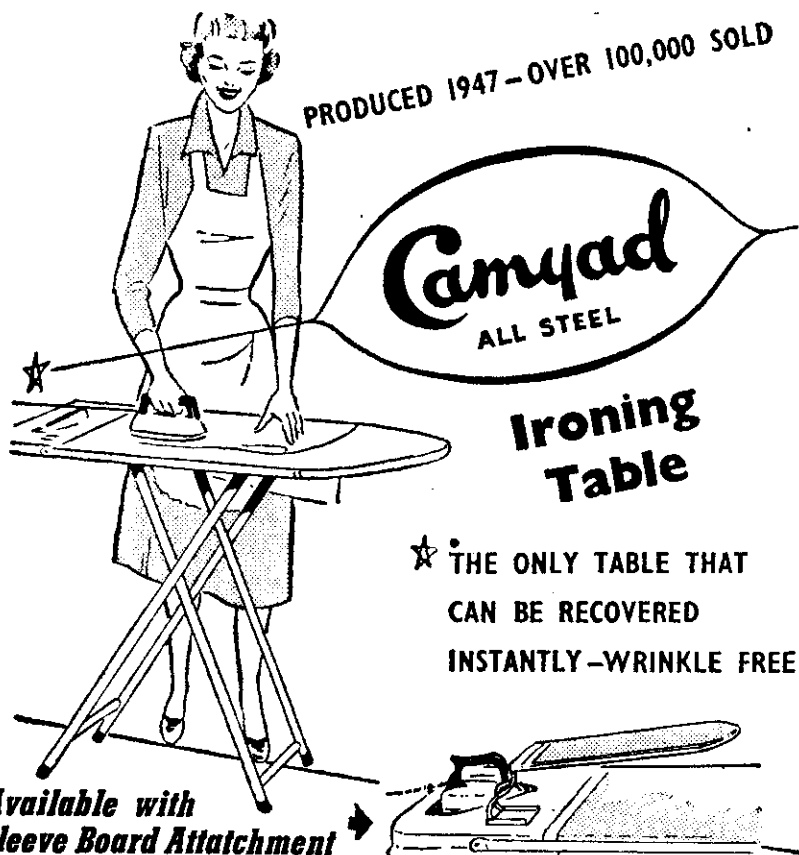
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Cherries and Gooseberries

CHERRIES, more expensive than gooseberries, are more of a luxury. Both make good pies—cherries by themselves, with a squeeze of lemon, and gooseberries, either by themselves or with apples to soften the flavour. The gooseberry recipes for jams, marmalade, sauces, pickles and chutney will stretch over into next issue, and here we will concentrate on cherries.

Cherry Pie

Half fill piedish with cherries, put layer sugar, sprinkling lemon juice, then fill dish with cherries. Add a little water and put pie-funnel or tiny cup in middle to hold up crust as fruit softens. Damp edge of dish, line with pastry strips, dampen these and fit top crust (flaky or short), decorate and bake in pre-heated oven—not too fast—about the middle, so that cherries and pastry both cook.

Another Cherry Pie

Make a syrup by boiling together sugar and water (2 cups water to 1 cup sugar) for 5 mins. Add squeeze lemon, pinch salt, and cherries. Gently simmer for minute or two, to soften. Take out with perforated spoon, and fill piedish. Thicken syrup slightly with cornflour, and pour enough over cherries to half-fill dish. There should be more fruit than juice. When cool, cover with short or flaky pastry and bake as usual. Red currants mixed with cherries make a lovely pie.

Cherry Liqueur

Allow 3 lb. sugar to every 3 lb. cherries. Remove stalks, wash, drain well. Place layer cherries, layer sugar, and so on, in earthenware jar. Cover and stand in sunny place 3 or 4 weeks. Strain off juice, add about 1/4 pint rum or brandy. Pour into bottles. Should be fairly good liqueur.

Cherry Rolls

Use 1 1/2 cups flour, 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder, 2 cups cooked red cherries, seeded and drained, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons butter, about 1/2 cup milk. Sift flour, baking powder and salt into basin. Cut in butter. Add milk gradually till soft dough formed. Roll 1/4 in. thick on floured board. Cover with cherries, sprinkle with sugar and dot with small pieces butter. Moisten edges, roll into long roll, and press edges together. Cut into 1 1/2 in. slices. Place in greased baking pan and pour cherry sauce over. Bake in hot oven about 30 min., basting often. Serve with sauce poured round, and whipped cream.

Cherry Sauce: 1 cup sugar, 1 tablespoon flour, 1 cup cherry juice (in which cherries were cooked), 1 cup water, 1 tablespoon butter. Combine sugar and flour, add fruit juice and water. Cook and stir until smooth and thick. Add butter.

Cherry Roll (Different)

Two cups flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 4 tablespoons butter, 1/2 cup milk, sugar to taste, ripe sugared stoned cherries. Cut butter into flour, baking powder and salt. Mix slowly with milk, roll out about 1 in. thick. Put cherries over dough, and roll up. Cook about 20 minutes in hot oven. Serve with cream.

Gooseberry Marmalade (Requested)

Green gooseberries (3 lb.), 2 lemons, 5 small breakfast cups water, 6 lb. sugar. Shred lemons as for marmalade. Cover

with 2 cups boiling water, leave all night. Next day, boil up with gooseberries and the other 3 cups cold water for an hour. Add warmed sugar, stir till dissolved. Bring to boil, and boil hard for not more than 10 minutes. Delicious. Green in colour. Test for setting.

Cherry Jam

Stone 4 lb. cherries carefully, saving juice. Bring to boil 4 lb. sugar and 3 teacups water. Boil 10 minutes, add cherries and juice 1 lemon, boil 30 minutes, or until it will set when tested. Bottle.

Cherry and Red Currant Jam

To every 4 lb. cherries, allow 1 pint red currant juice (to make, boil red currants with little water till soft and

SPECIAL NEW YEAR CAKE (New Lynn)

Eight ounces butter, 3 table-spoons orange marmalade, 4 eggs, 10 oz. plain flour, 1 dessertspoon cocoa, 1/2 teaspoon baking soda, 1/4 lb. mixed peel (finely shredded), 4 oz ground almonds (if liked), 8 oz. brown sugar, 1 teaspoon each vanilla, almond essence, 2 teaspoons mixed spice, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 3 lb. mixed fruit (cherries, raisins, sultanas, dates, figs, etc.), 4 tablespoons sherry or strong black coffee (or some of each). Prepare 8 in. deep cake tin with at least 3 or 4 thicknesses brown paper on bottom and sides, then waxed or greaseproof paper. Cream butter and sugar. Beat in marmalade and essences, and eggs, one at a time, until mixture smooth. Stir in sifted flour (with usual amount cornflour mixed in), spice, cocoa, salt and baking soda. Add prepared fruit, peel, and ground almonds. Lastly stir in liquid. Turn into prepared tin, smoothing down evenly. Place in slow oven, and bake very slowly covering for first half of cooking time with two thicknesses paper. Takes about 3 1/2 to 4 1/2 hours at 300 degrees to cook. Weighs 4 1/2 to 5 1/2 lb.

marshy, then strain as for jelly). Simmer until cherries soft, then add pound for pound of sugar. Stir till sugar dissolves, then boil till sets when tested. Bottle when it cools a little.

Baked Spiced Cherries

Three parts fill casserole with cherries, sprinkle sugar to taste, put in 3 or 4 slices lemon and cinnamon flavouring. Stick cinnamon is best, if available. Cover with water, bake moderate oven, covered, till cherries tender. Uncover last 5 minutes.

Cherry Sauce

Looks (and tastes) good on ice cream, creamy rice pudding or steamed pudding. Cook cherries in syrup (one part sugar, 2 parts water). Drain syrup, put in saucepan with thin slices lemon, and simmer, uncovered, about 5 mins. Combine 1 tablespoon cornflour with 1 teaspoon powdered cinnamon, mix to paste with cold water; stir into syrup and boil till thickened. Remove lemon slices and add cherries. Take from heat and add 1/4 cup sherry if desired.



Children's Favourites

PETER PAN, like its central character, seems never to grow old. Whenever it is revived or brought out in a new medium it enjoys great popularity, so there is sure to be a huge listening audience for the BBC radio version of the old favourite which will be heard soon in the 2YA *Children's Session*. Wellington children will, as it happens, hear it first from 2YC on Saturday, January 8, after which 2YA takes over. The programmes will be heard later in *Children's Sessions* from other stations. Although much of the play's attraction is generally considered to be visual, this adaptation shows how successfully radio can appeal to the listener's imagination without in any way losing the spirit of the original work.

The radio version of *Peter Pan* includes all the scenes—even the lagoon setting often omitted from stage versions because of production difficulties. The part of Peter is played by Mar-



garet Leighton, and Alastair Sim is Captain Hook. Linking the story is a narration taken from Sir James Barrie's own stage directions, and the music, by James Cook, is from the original 1904 London production.

Peter Pan is not the only old children's favourite to be heard over the holiday season, for *The Water Babies* will start in *Children's Sessions* from 3YA on Tuesday, December 28, and from 1YA on Saturday, January 1. Like many famous children's books, *The Water Babies* was written for one particular child. Grenville Kingsley was still a baby when his father was reminded by his other three children—for whom he had already written *The Heroes*—that he had promised to write a story for their youngest brother. Charles Kingsley went at once to his study, locked the door, and returned in half an hour with the story of little Tom—the first chapter of *The Water Babies*. Stripped of its sermonising, the story is a charming fairy tale.

In the BBC version Tom is played by Scot Finch.

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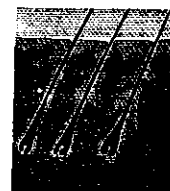

SHRINK FIT

At an engineering works in the Midlands, a 2,000 ton hydraulic forging press had to be overhauled because of wear. The firm decided that a good way of effecting repairs would be to "shrink fit" new parts in place of worn ones. A metal part to be fitted by this process is deliberately made a precise amount too large. When extreme cold is applied the part shrinks and can be fitted into another. The metal expands as the temperature rises to normal and a very tight fit is thus ensured.

The firm therefore consulted I.C.I. Billingham Division who make "Drikold"—a solid refrigerant which, with a temperature of minus 110°F., is a convenient means of producing extreme cold. The main part of the problem was to shrink a hollow steel cylinder weighing 7 tons and fit it into the body of the press. The firm made the necessary preparations and provided lifting tackle, whilst an I.C.I. man supervised the shrinking. This was done by closing the cylinder at one end and filling it with 80 gallons of methylated spirit and 1,400 lb. of "Drikold". Five and a half hours later, at a temperature of minus 95°F., the cylinder had contracted by 30 thousandths of an inch. It was then hoisted into position. This completed one of the biggest shrink fitting jobs ever undertaken.
