John Charles Thomas, a well-known American baritone, is 2ZA's "Morning Star" at 9.30 today.

The music of the serenade is a changeless thing which will live to be enjoyed forever, if not from a balcony, then certainly in the privacy of your own home. At 4.0 4ZB presents 15 minutes of "Serenades."

Edvard Grieg wrote some magnifi-cent orchestral works characterised by instrumental colour, delicacy of tex-ture and rich nationalistic melody. However, it is maintained by many critics today that Grieg was essentially a miniaturist. He certainly wrote many lovely, short and melodic pieces, some of which may be heard at 4.30, when 1ZB spends "A Half Hour with Grieg."
