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Cards for Christmas

IT is usual at Christmas to send out cards on which are inscribed greetings and good wishes. A few people make their own cards, putting into them careful work which is acknowledged a little shamefacedly by recipients who can send nothing of equal value in return. The general practice has become stereotyped, so that it is difficult to find cards which meet our individual requirements. If there is an attractive design or decoration, we may be fairly certain that the greetings are framed in words we would not use ourselves; and if the words are unpretentious, the setting is likely to be crude or artificial. Most horrible of all, to the plain-minded person, is the printing of third-rate verse on cards which otherwise are suitable. The truth seems to be that when greetings are mass produced they are aimed at the largest number of buyers, and these are thought to be people who find no incongruity in snow-covered landscapes, bells and mistletoe for a New Zealand Christmas.

When the season is at its height, however, the infection is not to be resisted. Cards are substitutes for the greetings we exchange in those last days before a holiday stillness comes over the cities. We know quite well that, when we wish our friends a happiness which is to flow from Christmas into the coming year, we are asking for the impossible. A year's happiness, if distilled in time, would be small enough in the most fortunate life. There are glowing hours, and sometimes we may have weeks of blessed calm; but happiness is like fine weather: it comes from a balance in nature which is changing and dissolving even as we enjoy it. The happy man is most likely to be busy about some task he finds useful and congenial, and in his private life he will be thinking more of others than of himself. Yet we long for happiness, even as in our collective life we ask that there shall be "on earth peace, good will towards men"—the traditional hope we know to be an aspiration rather than a wish which can have lasting fulfilment.

Nevertheless, it may be a little unfair, or even perverse, to question the taste of Christmas cards. If we cannot take the trouble to write down our own thoughts, either in letters or on cards, we must not expect commercial printers to do more than provide a rough substitute. It may still be asked, of course, why we should continue to follow a custom if we follow it half-heartedly. Many of us would have to confess that we forget to buy cards until we are reminded of them by the growing volume of Christmas mail. We then have to rush to the nearest shop and buy what we can, long after the cream has been skimmed from the market. The task comes upon us when we are busily winding up the year's work: we feel a little irritable, and are inclined to wish that the sending and receiving of cards would cease to be a Christmas custom.

It is a wise and necessary impulse which makes us pause at this time of the year and look beyond ourselves at other people and at the world before we turn aside to private joys. The ideals of mankind are not false because they cannot be attained. Hope disappears, not when ideals are shown to be beyond our reach, but when we decide that they are superfluous or unrealistic. We can renew our strength when once a year we turn away from the effort and enter a quieter rhythm in which the climate itself sometimes concurs. Perhaps we mean no more than that when we send out our cards with Christmas greetings. And in this country, where the beaches and green places are already intruding upon our thoughts, it is a wish that can be fulfilled.

FACTUAL AND CREATIVE WRITING

Sir,—This letter should really be sent to whomever compèred *Book Shop* (2YA, November 30).

I enjoyed the Christmas edition, Part One. M. K. Joseph's selection of current prose literature—I hope I am not biased by his choice of my novel among those for mention—I thought outstandingly good. A. D. Priestley handled other prose with more care than most of it deserved.

But I particularly enjoyed the irony of the commentator's footnote. It is a peculiarity of some New Zealanders who have moved into reviewing, "literary criticism," etc., to prefer the ostensibly factual to the creative, to exclaim over golfers' memoirs and books with titles such as *Penguin Rearing in the Cocos Islands* (factual stuff, you know—statistics enclosed) and *My Aunt Matilda's Love Life in Turkestan*. I don't know at what point in this century the compère of *Book Shop* began to watch novelists earn their temporary fame only to fade into oblivion. I think, however, that I could name three or four novelists active in any decade of the 20th Century whose works will survive long after writers of "adventure, games and travel" have lost their ephemeral market. Perhaps I am wrong, but it seems to me that Joyce Carey's *Mister Johnson* has greater possibilities of enduring than Pauline Betz's (have I the name correctly?) tennis reminiscences.

My apologies. I have become serious. And I agreed to regard the compère's footnote, in which he expressed his preference for books about tennis, golf and all that, as an ironical gesture directed at the uninitiated or illiterate. My congratulations to him.

ENGLISH CHURCH MUSIC

Sir,—With your permission I should like to amplify Mr. Tucker's comments (*Listener*, November 23). The 18th Century anthem alluded to (“I Have Surely Built Thee an House”) was sung at the Christchurch Cathedral Dedication Service on November 1, 1881, and at Dedication Anniversary Festivals subsequently. In recent years, however, it has been displaced by a particularly fine, although rather florid, anthem composed by Dr. Bairstow. Of similar interest is the Vaughan Williams Coronation *Te Deum*, broadcast recently by 3YC. This work was rehearsed by the Christchurch Cathedral Choir in 1938, when the late Maugham Barnett was Choirmaster. It

was his last effort at the organ at a Friday afternoon practice. He died on the following Sunday. It is of interest to recall a BBC Home News item (October 4) that a speaker at a Church Council meeting had criticised modern Cathedral music as tending to be theatrical. I could well imagine that the complainant regrets the abandonment of many compositions of the controversial 1860-1900 period, and possibly is unable to grasp the significance of the Tudor revival.

THE NATIONAL ORCHESTRA

Sir,—The fact that the National Orchestra did not attract full houses in Auckland should not occasion undue surprise. Such an experience is not peculiar to New Zealand. It was the end of an unusually packed year of music, the excellent programmes may have lacked the diversity that beckons crowds, students were preparing for examinations, and many people husbanding resources against the cost of holidays. Our genuine music-lovers are on the increase and will some day number sufficient to fill our concert halls.

Occasionally a more popular programme (which I do not advocate) and a strong dose of press propaganda help to swell the house to capacity, but these additional customers attend largely out of curiosity and because everybody's doing it, not for the intrinsic value of the music. As Honegger has written, “People no longer listen to music, they go to watch the performance of a famous conductor or pianist.” Stravinsky and Vaughan Williams have also written pertinently on this subject. It is comforting, therefore, to read that certain performances of our orchestra, judged in the calm atmosphere of recorded music, have recently elicited the warmest praise from distinguished musicians in England. My point is that it was both absurd and unjust of a press critic to have attributed the poor audiences in Auckland solely to the shortcomings of the orchestra and its conductor. Booking for the Auckland concerts was poorer than in several provincial towns. Is it reasonable to attempt to account for this by imagining the Auckland public saying in advance, “We are not booking this time because we know the orchestra is going to play badly?”

DECLINING FESTIVAL

Sir,—I read, with interest, a letter written by “N.Z. Scot” in reference to the Scots' custom of holding “Hogmanay.” He is correct in stating it has no reference to money. I lived in Dundee for eleven years and we used to celebrate this very old custom every New Year's Eve from midnight till the early hours of the morning, starting off

with a big fireworks display and every home had its front and back door wide open to welcome anyone who liked to call. Each house provided a marvellous supper, also kegs of draught beer for the younger men, whisky for the older generation, haggis, sandwiches, oat cakes, etc., and the young people would sing and dance and it was really to forget old injuries, imaginary or real, and start afresh the new year which finished up with a big regatta in the harbour. It is a big regret to me that these Hogmanays are passing into the mists of time as they were wonderful shows, with lavish hospitality. The coming generation will never see the like now.

Sir,—May I add my word to the story of Hogmanay? During the early 1900's I was a small girl in Edinburgh, and it was the custom in our family for my brother and myself to present ourselves at the front door just on the stroke of midnight on the last night of the year. We shouted out the old rhyme quoted in your article and hammered on the door. After a certain amount of byplay, when Father pretended to think we were beggars, Mother would take us in and give us “Currant Bun” (a Scots cake associated with New Year), and a drink of some sort of cordial to “hansel” the New Year. This was an old custom and appeared to be confined to members of the family and not first-footers. Hogmanay is actually New Year's Eve, that day is always called Hogmanay in Scotland. Hansel is a word connected with good luck and is used in many ways. A gift of a purse, for instance, usually has a small coin to “hansel” the purse—bring luck. I was delighted to see the old rhyme in print, it was like meeting an old friend. A SCOT (Auckland).

Sir,—A letter from “New Zealand Scot” gives the derivation of the word “Hogmanay” as from the Latin in *hoc anno*. For years I have lived under the misconception that the word derived from the French *Au gui menez*—“Lead to the mistletoe,” a cry used by the boys and girls of France when out on their guising expeditions on the last day of the year.

Since many Scottish words and customs can be traced to the old French through Scotland's alliance with France, I accepted this as the most probable origin of the name.

BROADCASTING STANDARDS

Sir,—The NZBS has 28 stations at its disposal, and the service received from such equipment is worse than poor. Constructive criticism is easy and has been forthcoming, but is neither welcome nor acted upon. The cost to the public of three farthings a day is dear, although only one-quarter that of a newspaper. Smugness and self-satisfaction are so evident that improvement is very unlikely.

IN THE STRAIT OF GEORGIA

Sir,—As a Vancouver man I was interested in “G. le F.Y.'s” well-written article (*Listener*, November 30) in which he described a trip on one of the Canadian Pacific Railway ferries between Vancouver and Victoria, on Vancouver Island.

Mr. Y. neglected to make a point of interest to New Zealanders who transport their cars on the inter-island ferries. The Canadian Pacific ships are all designed to accommodate passengers' cars below decks—you simply drive them into the ship through large doors in the hull, and drive them off again at the port of destination. The newest of these ferries, a 6000-ton vessel named *Princess of Nanaimo*, carries 1500 day passengers and between 130 and 150 cars. The *Nanaimo* has 22,500 square feet of parking space on two decks.

New Zealand inter-island steamers, however, load cars ponderously on deck with ship's gear, and they become salt-encrusted during the voyage. Further, comparatively few cars can be carried.

Admittedly, inter-island vessels have to be thoroughly seaworthy (the Straits of Georgia never get very rough), but this fact should not prevent at least the day-trip ships on the Pictou and Nelson runs being designed to accommodate passengers' cars below decks.

ANSWERS TO CORRESPONDENTS

Lover of Humour (Balclutha).—Arrangements are being made to broadcast a series of long BBC plays, including *Mr. Gills*, in the near future.

Hamiltonian.—(1) Transmission hours of X class stations are reviewed from time to time. Factors considered, in relation to listeners' needs, include costs, staffing, accommodation and power restrictions. Weekend hours of 2ZA Palmerston North, which was opened in 1938, have been virtually unaltered since 1947. (2) Comparisons wrongly based; for various reasons, the station's recently allotted list cannot at present be extended.

“Church First” (New Plymouth).—The Central Religious Advisory Committee's recommendation, which regulates the practice in this matter, is that, while all services for the sake of effectiveness should be limited to one hour, morning services are not cut off if they over-run that time, but evening services are strictly limited and cut off if they exceed 65 minutes. The station records show no example of such action for many months past; but there was one occasion (October 7) when the minister himself, having church notices and other church business to deal with at the end of the service, asked that the broadcast be terminated at the end of the last hymn and gave the technician his cue at that point. You refer to a “morning” service; this was an evening service; but it is the only occasion to which your complaint seems applicable.

A Holiday Frolic from the ZBs

THERE will be plenty of fun this Christmas for ZB listeners, but pride of place in the programmes has been kept for "You're Welcome," an hour-long variety show written, produced and recorded in Auckland.

OVER the past few years it has been the cheerful custom of the Commercial stations to liven up their Christmas Day broadcasts with the best home-grown entertainment. Last year they provided a pantomime, *Dick Whittington*, peopled with frolicking announcers, clowning scriptwriters, and an orchestra that did unaccountable things—and *Whittington* will be returning again this holiday season to some of the YZ stations.

But for Christmas, 1951—and for the sake of variety—the ZBs have turned their hand to a fast-moving Variety Show. *You're Welcome*, as this year's frolic has been called, will last for a full hour and will be heard from the four ZB stations and 2ZA at 9.0 p.m. on December 25.

Like *Dick Whittington*, it is an entirely New Zealand-made production; written by Arthur E. Jones, produced by William Austin, with music under the direction of Oswald Cheesman, and recorded in 1ZB's Radio Theatre. But though it is a local show, it will be surprising if listeners do not catch echoes of other and older radio favourites. One echo seems to come all the way from the dear old *ITMA* days, and you can take it from somewhere else in the script that the good example set for radio writers by Messrs. Muir and Norden has been followed to advantage. New Zealand radio, too, doesn't escape burlesquing—one of the interludes will be about *Meeting Places* and *Going People*—films and film-stars take a pummelling, and even Mr. Coward does not escape parody.

To give the funny men time to regain breath, and to provide the variety that

is the spice of a good show there will be Oswald Cheesman and his Orchestra, the George Hopkins Clarinet Quartet, the Duplicats, Pat McMinn, Stewart Harvey, and John Thomson and Nancy Harrie at the piano. The comedy team contains equally familiar names—Bill Austin, Fred Pollitt (who was the Dame in last year's pantomime), Valerie Spencer, Peter Gwynne, and Pat Smyth. *You're Welcome* should, in fact, make welcome and relaxing listening on Christmas Day.

CARTOONS AND PANTOMIMES

THOUGH the Variety Revue is the ZB set-piece for Christmas Day, the Commercial stations have planned programmes that should help to keep everyone happy from breakfast to bedtime. Carols and Christmas parties for young and old who are unlucky enough to be in hospital will be heard from all ZB stations and 2ZA in the forenoon or early afternoon, with a variety of other special features. When the Children's Hour comes round, each station will present one of the new BBC radio cartoons. The story of Sammy, the lonely (and lazy) grey squirrel who stored no nuts but managed to survive, will be told to young 4ZB and 2ZA listeners, while Wellington children will hear *The Operatic Cat*, which explains why all kittens are warned not to sing in tune. More for adolescents is *The Pied Piper* (from 3ZB). This is a version of the old German legend, with a happy ending in which little Hans is cured of his lameness and leads the other children home again. From 1ZB there will be the story of that little spiv, *The Ant Who Didn't Like Work*.

Grown-ups will have a turn again at 6.30 p.m. with the new *Christmas Carol*

(see opposite page), and this will be followed at 7.15 with *Cinderella*, a pantomime for the family. This will be a BBC show from all but 4ZB, where the station is producing its own show, from its own script, with its own players.

A special Christmas edition of *Take It From Here*—a must session for

grown-ups—follows the pantomime at the four ZB stations, and at 8.45 there's a quarter-hour with Murdoch and Horne, who exchange presents, go caroling and meet a number of people, all of whom turn out to be Maurice Denham. Then comes *You're Welcome*, and to close the day each station has a BBC drama. And so, at 10.30, to bed!

Davis Cup Tennis, Cricket and League Tests

ALTHOUGH Test cricket, the Melbourne Cup, and other big sporting events take place within range of New Zealand fairly frequently, international tennis is one of those things that comes near only once—or at most, twice—in a blue moon. The last Davis Cup match to take place in New Zealand was played at Christmas, 1920, and the last to take place in Australia, in 1946. This year, though, the finals will again be held in Australia, when the U.S. challenges the Australian squad, the present holders, on December 26, 27 and 28.

Arrangements have been made for the ZB stations and 2ZA to broadcast a preview of

the contest at 9.30 p.m. on December 24. On December 26, 27 and 28, at the same time, the same stations will broadcast recorded excerpts from commentaries by the Australian Ted Harris (whose portrait appears at left), taken direct from the courts, together with reviews of plays. This will be in addition to the usual link summaries and reviews noted on the programme pages. Station 2YA will broadcast excerpts from the ABC's Davis Cup commentaries throughout each day, and other YA and YZ stations will give progress reports. Results will be broadcast in the 7.0 p.m. Sports summaries.

The first Davis Cup contest was played in August of 1900, between England and the U.S., at Longwood. The United States won 3—0. Dwight F. Davis himself played in both singles and doubles, and made a considerable contribution to the American victory. From then on the Davis Cup contests were something established in tennis. The only years when there were no contests were 1901, when the U.S. held the cup unchallenged, 1910, when there was no team willing to challenge Australasia, and the war years 1915-18 and

1940-45. Each year that the contest has been held has seen a progressively increasing international interest in the game.

Although tennis will bulk larger than usual in holiday sports broadcasts (the N.Z. championships start at Wellington on January 5), it will face strong competition from racing, with holiday meetings all over the place (Cup Day at Ellerslie is December 27), and cricket. Australia will meet West Indies at Adelaide on December 22 for the Third Test, which on present form may well decide the rubber; the Fourth Test begins at Melbourne on December 31, and there will be Plunket Shield games throughout the holidays. Score-boards, highlights and summaries will be heard from National and Commercial stations on each day of play. There will be news of the Rugby League team's games against France at Paris and Bordeaux (December 24, 31), and the Springboks' match against England (January 6). Nor will the sporting minorities be forgotten. There will be results of the Dominion chess championships at Napier (beginning December 27), North and South Island croquet championships (January 3), and of the North v. South Island softball game (January 5).

THE GIFTS OF CHRISTMAS

THE people of the Commonwealth who so recently waited through anxious weeks for news of the health of the King will be a vast audience for his Christmas broadcast this year. As usual this will be preceded by a world-wide BBC programme, its subject *The Gifts of Christmas*. It is hoped to make links in this programme between a fighting man in Korea and his home in Britain; a mother in a Displaced Persons' camp in Germany and her children in Australia; the workers and citizens of Boys' Town, Modena, in Italy, and former prisoners of war who were given help when escaping and have in turn helped the settlement. There will be visits to a Red Cross blood transfusion unit in Nairobi, and to Jamaica, ravaged not so long ago by a hurricane. It is planned to bring in the voices of Korean children singing at a Christmas party behind the firing line, in the hope that they will touch the conscience of the listening world. And, of course, with the other members of the Commonwealth New Zealand will make its contribution.

Broadcast messages will be heard at Christmas from the Prime Minister (Mr. Holland) and the Leader of the Opposition (Mr. Nash), and on New Year's Eve listeners will have a message from the Governor-General, Lord Freyberg.

Christmas Day: Messages from the Prime Minister and the Leader of the Opposition (YA, YZ, ZB stations, 1XH, 2ZA, 12.30 p.m.).

Boxing Day: *The Gifts of Christmas* (2YA, 2.0 a.m.; YA and YZ stations, 9.4 a.m.).

The King's Broadcast (following *The Gifts of Christmas* broadcasts as above, and also from YA, YZ, ZB and X stations at 7.15 a.m., and YA and YZ stations at 12.30 and 6.45 p.m.).

New Year's Eve: The Governor-General's Message (YA, YZ, ZB and X stations, and 2ZA, 7.0 p.m.).

ETERNAL STORY

AN original nativity play, *Emmanuel*, in verse and poetic prose, is among the BBC's new programmes for Christmas, 1951. James Forsyth, its author, describes it as a humble attempt to present the drama of the Birth of Christ as fully and as vividly as he is able. While making no effort to give a "slant of interpretation" to the eternal story, Forsyth portrays Herod as a tragic, self-destroying figure. He sees the Child's fate in the hands of the people of Bethlehem; puts more wisdom into the words of the Shepherd with his new-born lamb than all the utterances of the Three Wise Men; and he gives a speaking part to Mary. The author has said that he would like to remove the hope or presumption that the play is a direct contribution to either an old-fashioned faith or a new-fangled scepticism. It is another account of a sacred story. And he hopes that it may present some meaning and hold some loveliness both for people who know and celebrate the happy time of Santa Claus, with all its festivities, and the Christmas of the Church's devotional celebration of the birth of its Saviour. Mervyn Johns is heard as the Shepherd, Peggy Bryan as Mary, John Laurie as Joseph, and Andrew Cruickshank as Herod. The Three Wise Men are played by Heron Carvic, Howieson

Culff and John Turnbull. The music, based upon oriental and antique themes, is composed and directed by Henry Boys, and Donald McWhinnie is producer.

SNAPDRAGON & PUDDING

THE BBC's London Forum organisers claim that their programmes contain the best brains and best talkers that can be found to discuss, informally, with wit and insight, problems of the day. New Zealand listeners are to have an opportunity of hearing what attitudes the brains and talkers, as represented by Sir Stuart Wilson, Compton Mackenzie and Professor C. E. M. Joad adopt towards the spirit of Christmas. Gilbert Harding is chairman. They will survey the season from the viewpoint of those who are no longer young (and who, incidentally, feel they can now spend Christmas as they wish and not in the way expected of them) and they go into it thoroughly. The spotlight is thrown on the traditional English Christmas—or is it the traditional Dickens Christmas?—and in a discussion on Christmas fare it becomes apparent that Compton Mackenzie is a purist in snapdragon while Wilson and Joad differ violently on the constituents of Christmas pudding.

THEATRE ROYAL

WHEN Hugh Ross Williamson's play, *Queen Elizabeth* was broadcast by the BBC early this year Stephen Williams wrote in the *Radio Times* that it was "to say the least, a gallant attempt at a full-length portrait of Elizabeth." Such a portrait can not have been easy to draw in a play which takes about an hour and a half to broadcast. Yet the author has brought out well the violently opposed sides of the queen's personality.

The play, which is to be broadcast in New Zealand on BBC transcriptions, deals with a single incident in Elizabeth's life—her projected marriage with the Duke of Anjou, when she was forty-five and he twenty years



younger. It was Elizabeth's last courtship, and the match was bitterly opposed by her people.

Dame Edith Evans, one of the most famous figures on the contemporary English stage, whom some listeners will have seen in films—*The Last Days of Dolwyn* was one of them—plays the title role in *Queen Elizabeth*, and the supporting cast includes Laidman Browne as Lord Burleigh, Hugh Burden as the Baron de St. Marc, and Reginald Beckwith as Anjou.

Happy and Glorious, another play in a group which the BBC has aptly called *Theatre Royal*, has been "built" from Laurence Housman's collection of little plays about Queen Victoria. For many years the censorship ban on the representation of living or recently dead royalty kept the plays off the public stage in Britain. When the ban was lifted in the thirties they had an instant success with their tenderly witty treatment of the life and reign of Victoria. In *Happy and Glorious* the emphasis is upon Prince Albert and his relationship with the Queen, showing his gradual development from the diffident young Prince, a foreigner in a none-too-cordial England, to the wise counsellor who worked himself to death in the service of his adopted country. The Prince is played by Anton Walbrook and Queen Victoria by Gwen Ffrangcon-Davies.

TRADITIONAL FESTIVAL

WHEN the world-famous *Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols*, held every year in King's College Chapel, Cambridge, was broadcast in the BBC Home Service last Christmas Eve (as has been the case for the last 21 years) a shortened form was recorded so that the choral part of the Service could be heard virtually in its entirety. The peculiarly moving quality of this traditional act of worship is due largely to the sheer beauty of the singing and the nature of the Festival itself; but also, partly, to the acoustics and associations of that Chapel. The Service includes the Processional Hymn—*Once in Royal David's City*; and old European carols such as *Ding, Dong, Ding*, from Sweden, and *Hail!*

Blessed Virgin Mary, from 17th Century Italy. Basil Gray describes the scene both outside and inside the Chapel.

HISTORICAL ROMANCE

OF all the books that Charles Dickens wrote, none is better suited to radio dramatisation than *A Tale of Two Cities*. In creating the character of Sidney Carton in this well-known story of the French Revolution (written in 1859) Dickens broke away from the fashion of the time, which was that a hero should be noble and utterly devoid of faults. He made a man full of error and therefore full of interest. The author himself, an ardent actor, longed to play the role of Carton, but it was not until long after his death in 1870 that a stage version of the book—*The Only Way*—brought fame as Carton to Sir John Martin-Harvey. At the end of last year one of Britain's leading playwrights, Terence Rattigan, and an actor of the front rank, John Gielgud, dramatised the story and it was broadcast in the BBC Home Service, with Eric Portman, well-known actor of stage and screen as Carton and Belle Chrystall as Lucie Manette. The producer was Cleland Finn.

PICK YOUR SCROOGE

DICKENS'S *Christmas Carol*, either read or dramatised, has become a tradition of Christmas listening. This year the tradition will be continued, though with what is probably a wider variety of Scrooges than ever before. Four different versions are to



be presented. The YA stations will broadcast a BBC version in which Scrooge is played by Alec Guinness, and there is a supporting cast of well-known BBC voices. Guinness will be heard in the same role in a Towers of London production, though this time the cast will include such J. Arthur Rank stars as John Mills, Googie Withers, Jean Simmons, Margaret Lockwood, Dirk Bogarde and Derek Bond. This version will come from the ZBs and two YZ stations. Listeners within reach of 1XH will be able to hear Lionel Barrymore's Scrooge, while those who are able to tune into 2XA will find Ronald Colman playing the same part. There should be a Scrooge, in fact, for every taste.

THE CHRISTMAS TRAMCAR

THE matter of a Christmas gift for their employees was one which caused the Tramway Company some concern. Free rides had been somewhat overdone, and the concession tickets that had been sold the year before had not been appreciated. After due deliberation, however, it was decided that the best plan would be to elevate the morale of the whole staff by applying a coat of paint to one of the company's tramcars.

Immediately, in the board room, contention was rife. Which vehicle should receive the honour? The board was equally divided between the preservation of the tramcar and the perpetuation of the paint. Deadlock was reached, and the matter referred to the manager. The manager, for policy reasons, referred it to the Superintendent, who, taking note of popular opinion, asked a motorman.

"Under the circumstances," the motorman said, idly twirling his driving handle, "there is no doubt that the wisest course would be a purely utilitarian one; that is, to apply the paint to the car most in need of it."

This point of view was accepted gratefully by the board, and a commission was promptly despatched to the tram barn to ascertain which of the vehicles was in most need of repair.

It was perhaps unfortunate that the company's first tramcar had not yet been removed for scrap. As it was, it was discovered in a corner, partly concealed by the scenery used in the Christmas pantomime. It was undoubtedly the tramcar most in need of paint. Reluctantly, the board agreed to its renovation.

YET, when the renovation was complete, the tramcar was the Company's finest possession. Its black wheels gleamed, its brass shone, its golden decorations and red and cream panelling dazzled the eye, and there could be no words adequate to describe the translucency of its varnish. Every motorman in the barn wished to drive it, but the board wisely made its choice by lot.

Everyone was overjoyed to hear that the lot had fallen to Llewellyn and Arthur. These two had been fast friends since Llewellyn had been given his first command. In fact, it was rumoured that Arthur had declined to advance his position, even though promotion had been offered, in order that their friendship might not be severed. Few, then, forbore to cheer as Llewellyn drove his proud charge out into the street, and Arthur, the tram having coasted neatly to a halt beyond the points,

drew down the trolley-pole once in smart salute.

Arthur and Llewellyn were most conscientious. At unoccupied moments during the day Arthur would move along the footboard with a square of chamois leather, cleaning and burnishing, and at the termini they took it in turn to lamp-black the wheels and sweep out the interior, carrying a portable broom for the purpose. Llewellyn, of course, exercised the greatest possible care in the traffic, frequently applying the brake, and occasionally admonishing tardy vehicles with chimes upon his bell.

BUT at times Llewellyn was careless. Under the summer sun the bright beauty of the vehicle in his command was like wine in his veins. One day, approaching an intersection, he neglected to give way to a vehicle approaching on his right. The motor skidded to a halt in front of the tramcar, and Llewellyn, shocked by visions of scarred paint, was forced to apply the ratchet brake.

"Where," asked the young man in the motor-car, "do you think you are going?"

"That is a question that might adequately be answered by a glance at our destination board," replied Llewellyn, coldly. "And, as for my thoughts upon the matter, they need be as little taken into account by you as they are by the Despatcher."

"My question was a rhetorical one," said the young man. "The true object of my enquiry was to ascertain whether or not you were cognisant of the right-hand rule."

"Our rule is the rule of fate," cried Arthur, swinging agilely along the footboard. "We tread but the path laid down before us."

"True," said Llewellyn, "Our profession, by its very nature, inclines us towards predestinarianism."

Yet, as the young man drove away, Llewellyn was troubled. "Arthur," he said, "is it really so? Are we moved only by the will of others, bound on an endless chain of arrivals and departures, without freedom?"

"What is freedom?" asked Arthur, gaily, "but to move within limits? If there were no limits, how could we know we were free?"

"That argument is suspect," said Llewellyn, putting the tram in motion. "It touches only upon the quintessence of the matter

and does not approach its practical application. We may be free to travel from place to place, but we are bound because our routes and destinations are always the same."

A YOUNG woman on the pavement indicated her desire to board the vehicle. Arthur studied her for a second. "Her shoes are clean," he said, "and her hands gloved. It would cause us no distress to allow her to travel with us. And yet, if we did so, might we not be binding her in a certain way, whereas if we allow her to walk, she will be free?"

"Alas," said Llewellyn, stopping the tram, "it does not lie within our freedom to make even that decision."

Arthur departed to show the young woman to a seat, and Llewellyn sank into a reverie, from which he was roused only by his friend's signal on the buzzer. When Arthur returned, Llewellyn said, as if in continuation, "Such considerations are trivial. If we wish to widen the bounds that encircle us, we must act positively."

"You have a suggestion?" Arthur asked.

"While you were absent," Llewellyn said, "I thought of the approaching season of Christmas, and of those whose existence on Christmas Day will be colourless and drab. It came to my mind that it might lie within our power to perform a small service for them, at the same time fulfilling for ourselves that thing we were speaking of."

Arthur stared at his friend, entranced.

"On the day I have mentioned," Llewellyn continued, "we shall be travelling this route again, transporting happy children and their parents from one place of festivity to another." LATE on Christmas Eve, residents in the streets between two of the city's termini were surprised to see two young men in uniform festooning strands of wire between telegraph poles. Many of the residents assumed the activity to be of an official nature, but there were one or two whose curiosity drove them to the point of enquiry. Among them was a Mr. Lysander, a gentleman connected with the manufacture of gas. Leaving his garden, he approached the young men.

"Could you inform me," he asked, "of the nature of your intentions here?"

"It is not a matter than can as yet be made public," said Llewellyn, "but I have no doubt that, should you station yourself at your window at the time of the arrival of the first tramcar tomorrow morning you will be enlightened."

Mr. Lysander thanked the young man, and turned back to impart the information to his neighbours.

As the sun ascended into the sky on Christmas morning, the residents of those streets where the young men had been gathered with their families at their front gates and windows. They stood, attentive, their eyes focused on the gleaming rails that came towards them over the brow of the hill.

Suddenly a stir passed through the multitude. A tramcar, the colours of

Instead of coming to a stop, the tram proceeded off the ends of the rails and continued slowly down the street, its trolley-pole connected with the improvised wires above, and its wheels cutting deep furrows in the asphalt. Led by Mr. Lysander, the assembled people cheered hilariously, Llewellyn's foot tapped a merry tune on the bell, and Arthur flourished his tickets from the rear.

"How exhilarating is their appreciation," said Llewellyn to himself. "I confess that I am almost intoxicated with pleasure."

He looked ahead, where, it seemed, thousands stood waiting for them. Their cries drowned the chiming of the bell, and some threw streamers and confetti of such hues that even Arthur's pad of tickets appeared pale. Llewellyn smiled as he thought of the streets lined with happy people that they would traverse before they came to the other terminus. Soon they would turn the corner and fresh multitudes would come into view.

Soon they would turn the corner! His breast filled with horror at the thought. They could not turn the corner! Speedily he applied the airbrake, and the tram subsided, hissing impotently into the asphalt.

For a moment the cheering ceased. In the lull Arthur called, "Llewellyn, Llewellyn, what has happened?" He came swinging swiftly down the footboard, the pennies jingling in his pouch.

"Arthur!" cried Llewellyn, "look, a corner. We must go back."

In an instant Arthur understood. He paled for a moment. Then, as the cheering broke out afresh, his natural good

humour prevailed. "Those before cry forward, and those behind cry back," he misquoted, jestingly.

But the tram would not go back. In spite of all Llewellyn's efforts it was adamant. Neither would it go forward. At last, Llewellyn cried, despairingly, "It is of no avail. Alas, Arthur, that our ambition should come to this."

"It is sad indeed," said Arthur, "but we must not lose hope. Perhaps the Despatcher, apprised of our planks, will send assistance to us."

"Perhaps," said Llewellyn, deep in gloom, "though I doubt the possibility. In fact, Arthur, I fear for our careers."

BUT all was well. The authorities were lenient. At a special board meeting called to discuss the matter, the chairman, Colonel Vern-Starnish, said: "In view of their intentions, I cannot find it in my heart to condemn these men. However, we cannot take the risk of further occurrences of this sort—we have already had a communication from the City Council on the matter of unauthorised power-lines—so I propose that the distracting tramcar concerned should be removed from the service and donated to a museum."

Immediately there were indignant cries of "Shame!" "Oh, cruel!" "What of the men?"

Colonel Vern-Starnish raised his hand. "For the men," he said, "for the men we can take only one step in mitigation. We can offer only the poor substitute of an Inspectorship."

And so it was. Arthur and Llewellyn now pass from tramcar to tramcar, chatting with motormen and exchanging light badinage with the passengers. Despite their position and their gay uniforms, they are still extremely popular. Yet, for all that, they find their happiest moments when, relieved of their duties, they can don their threadbare blue serge again and spend a quiet hour or two in the transport section of the museum.

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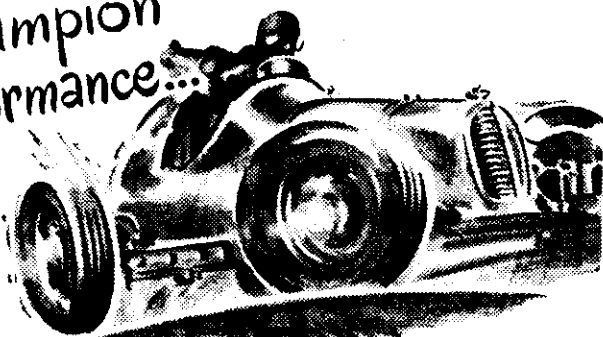
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Books

ARGUMENT of POETRY

NEW ZEALAND POETRY YEARBOOK,
Volume One, edited by Louis Johnson; A.
H. and A. W. Reed, Wellington; 10/6.

(Reviewed by M.H.H.)

NOTHING but approval can be given to the purpose of this collection, and in general to the way in which it has been carried out. Poets in New Zealand are very active; but they still have inadequate opportunities for publication, though they are doing much better than in the past; and a platform once a year should be an encouragement. Perhaps it was wise to give the first issue a solid weighting of established names. Nearly all the best-known poets are here (a notable absentee is A. R. D. Fairburn), and even the younger names are becoming familiar. It will be interesting to see in later issues what part the collection can play in the discovery of new talent.

Louis Johnson has announced his intention of setting aside space every year for a closer inspection of four or five poets. In this issue the task of critical appraisal is given to Erik Schwimmer. At the end of a brief discussion of W. H. Oliver's work he declares: "These are all developments which are new to New Zealand poetry." It is not clear what exactly are meant to be the new developments. The only hint of change in the section which precedes the statement is a comment on the treatment of locality. "Rather than specific references, one finds an effort to efface the special marks of landscape, ending up with synthesised images in the same way as painters like Woollaston." But is there anything new in this? Has Mr. Schwimmer never read the poetry of R. A. K. Mason?

"There is no doubt," Mr. Schwimmer goes on, "that the Curnow generation has done much to make such developments possible, but it should now be recognised that the period of preoccupation with the specific New Zealand experience is past." Since the "developments" have nowhere been stated clearly, it is impossible to discuss them. And the admonition in the second part of the sentence quoted need not be regarded as anything more than a personal opinion, unsupported by argument. It is an opinion which seems to come from a very limited conception of the functions of poetry. English poets have been preoccupied with "specific" English experience for a long time; and in spite of changes in method and taste, and the search for truth and beauty which has taken them from an early simplicity of diction to a complex use of suggestion and allusion, their Englishness remains an underlying unity. New Zealand is a young country; it is absurd to suggest that, because the landscapes of these islands have been faintly disclosed by a few poets, they are now sufficiently described and dwelt upon, and that the new poets may feel themselves free to think of something else.

Fortunately, there is evidence in this volume that younger poets have no intention of cutting themselves off from the land and the people. Their best work has a recognisable colouring. In Alastair Campbell's "The Rock Spring" and Ruth Dallas's "Man from the Hills"

the indications of locality are as clear as in the poems of Allen Curnow and Charles Brasch. Even W. H. Oliver, put forward as an exemplar of the new school, writes unmistakably of New Zealand. Why should he do otherwise? This is where he lives; and it is through the immediate and local that a poet expresses what is distant and universal.

New Zealand poets are now working in a wider range than formerly, but it is doubtful if—with the possible exception of Charles Spear, who indulges a cultivated taste—they are attempting anything new. In my opinion the most interesting poem in the whole collection is Allen Curnow's "The Changeling." And according to Mr. Schwimmer it would now be proper to deflate Mr. Curnow to an ancestral role. The simple truth, however, is that there are no recognisable "schools"; the connection between Allen Curnow and James Baxter, Charles Brasch and Hubert Witheford, is logical and clear—an extension of method and theme, by no means a rejection and a new beginning. Poems of ideas have been written for many years: the philosophical note was sounded by R. A. K. Mason, Allen Curnow, A. R. D. Fairburn, Arnold Wall, J. R. Hervey, Basil Dowling and Charles Brasch long before the horizons of poetry in this country opened upon the gaze of Mr. Schwimmer. If this critic is really a spokesman for younger groups, it is time someone mentioned the need of a little humility. The assumption that only a handful of young poets now have anything important to say, and that the main function of Curnow, Glover and the rest has been to prepare the way for them, is sheer arrogance.

It is a pity that in this first number of the Yearbook the voice of a coterie (and a sterile one at that) should be heard. Mr. Johnson explains in his introduction: "Real criticism cannot exist if editors choose only those points of view they favour, and here the aim will be simply to provide a place for discussion." The sentiments are admirable, but it is difficult to see what discussion can take place in a volume which comes out once a year. And if it be said that the discussion will be elsewhere, the answer must be that critical essays printed in the Yearbook are on permanent record, and that they cannot fail to colour readers' impressions of the volume as a whole. The impression taken from Volume One is rather different from what it should be in a collection of poems intended to be widely representative.

THE FAR SOUTH

WILD LIFE IN THE SUBANTARCTIC, by
J. H. Sorensen; Whitcombe and Tombs;
12/6.

MANY Listener readers will know much of the material in Mr. Sorensen's book, for most of it appeared as articles in this journal in 1946. Those who read them then will be glad to have them in book form, with some additional material, including comment on recent newspaper articles about Campbell Island tragedies and a very useful background chapter describing the subantarctic islands and giving a brief account of their discovery. Those who haven't read them before (whether specially interested in wild life or not) will find in them all the appeal of the

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(comparatively) far south. Many will be surprised to know that there is colour, sound and movement that suggest the tropics on some of these islands.

Before Mr. Sorensen and others visited the area, when the islands were occupied as a wartime safety measure, most visits by scientific parties were very short: so that in a total of five years which Mr. Sorensen spent on Campbell Island, with visits to other islands, he was able to do much valuable work. This book, Dr. R. A. Falla says in a foreword, is the first good account of the birds and mammals of New Zealand's subantarctic.

Mr. Sorensen has the naturalist's enthusiasm for his subject (he describes himself, for instance, as "particularly fortunate" in being "permitted" to spend more than one term on Campbell Island), and he presents his material in a very interesting, non-specialist way. The book is illustrated with several maps and some excellent photographs.

THE FACE OF THE EARTH

THE EARTH'S CRUST, by L. Dudley Stamp; Harrap.

A DELIGHT in the beauties of the natural landscape is enhanced by an understanding of the processes which have produced it. Writers of books on the earth's face have frequently been leaders in the use of illustrations, and this book makes a fresh approach with a series of coloured plates of topographical models by T. Bayley. It would be difficult to praise too highly either these delightful models or the excellence of the work of the blockmaker and printer; to study them is a lasting pleasure. Unfortunately, the letterpress is in a different category. It is an astonishing record of illogical arrangement, of misused terms ("peneplane" of marine erosion), of wrong definitions (e.g., eustatic sea-level change), of poor line drawings (glaciated valley), of misprints (depth of Gutenberg discontinuity 700 instead of 1700 miles in text and figure), and of just sheer mistakes ("the principal causes of earthquakes are underground movements of molten or semi-molten material"). The model maker has made a mistake in painting the model of river terraces in showing the older gravels lying on the younger. This is described in the text as "deliberate," which, of course, it is not, and as corrected on a later page, which again it

is not. The errors in the text, however, will matter little to a generation used to "looking at the pictures," for they are well worth looking at. —D.M.

IVY AND JANE

DARKNESS AND DAY, by I. Compton Burnett; Victor Gollancz. English price 10.6.

VOLUME THE THIRD, by Jane Austen; Oxford University Press. English price 8/6.

THE familiar Compton Burnett ingredients will be found in her latest novel, but worn with a difference. The skeleton in the cupboard (suspected involuntary incest) is successfully shooed away, instead of being brought out and given a permanent place of honour at the head of the table. The children—only two of them—instead of being an oppressed majority, are rather horrid and oppress their governess. Old Sir Ransom Chace talks of his age rather tiresomely; but where is the domestic tyrant, sucking everybody's life blood? A milder, more mellow spirit informs the epigrams which, as usual, volley back and forth interminably while we gasp for breath. The cloud of darkness which usually broods over Compton Burnett human nature is here at last dispersed.

This third volume of Jane Austen's juvenilia presents us with a grotesque short piece, *Evelyn*, in which people rush around giving each other, at first acquaintance, anything from a square meal to a house complete with heiress, and marrying or dying of broken hearts in a manner rather unfamiliar to Jane Austen devotees. The second longer unfinished fragment, *Catharine*, makes up for this nonsense. It is much more firmly constructed, and the encounters of Camilla and Catharine are a delicious forecast of the six great novels. But perhaps its publication was primarily an act of piety.

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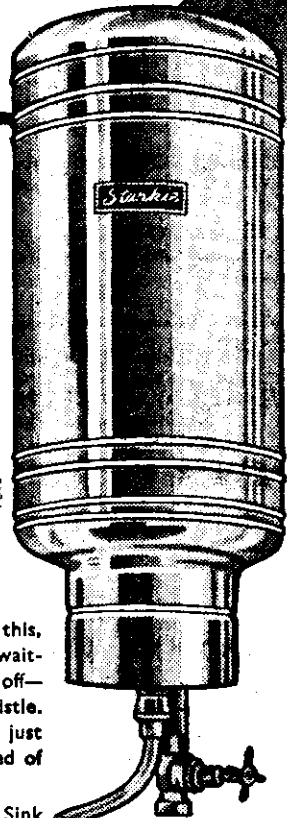
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RADIO REVIEW

WHEN is a radio play not a radio play? When, I should say, it is a concealed documentary. Not that I have any objection to documentaries, but I like to know when I am going to listen to one. V. T. Brauer's *Windows for the Blind* (NZBS) had a splendid subject in the life-story of Louis Braille, and, since it was well done, the feature made a remarkable man who had only been a name to me into a living personality. But the author had fallen between the two stools of play and documentary. The piece was not dramatic enough for the one and did not have quite enough background for the other. Perhaps we need a new word for this kind of thing—a "biomumentary" or a "docudrama," maybe, but not, please, a "play," as advertised.

Owen Jensen's Talks

NOT only has 1YC been giving us especially varied and interesting music lately, but I have been aware of a greater degree of integration in the programming. For some time, the miscellaneous character of 1YC music has made me sigh for what seemed more imaginative planning at Southern stations. However, now the Auckland station is giving us music significantly grouped, and providing evenings more like well-organised symphony concerts than like "listen to my record" sessions. One of the best evenings in the new dispensation is that introduced by Owen Jensen with his new *Talking About Music* series on Tuesday nights. We can always rely on Mr. Jensen never to be stodgy or pedestrian in his choice of illustrations. Recently, Delius's *Paris: The Song of a Great City*, the lovely *Chats d'Auvergne*, and Gershwin's *An American in Paris* were unexpectedly but logically grouped, after a lively preface in which Mr. Jensen was able to reveal to us seldom-considered aspects of Delius and Gershwin. More evenings like this, and 1YC's music will be as consistently listenable as its talks.

Not Glorious Within

THOUGH the NZBS session on William Blake recently broadcast from 3YC will serve as a good introduction to the poet's work I was more critical of it than of the excellent one on Shakespeare the Sonneteer, also prepared by Professor Musgrove. In dealing with Blake chiefly as an anti-cleric, his concern with the social evils of his day, and his unceasing effort to free the springs of energy from evil, were scarcely mentioned. Indeed, attention was so exclusively directed towards Blake's anti-clerical sentiments that the beautiful poem beginning "I saw a chapel all of gold," was coupled with one in which an angel—presumably of providence—had marked success in seducing a "lithe lady." While this poem does show Blake's opposition to organised religion, the first is a description of lust differing from Shakespeare's 129th Sonnet in that it describes the action from within. In this poem the chapel is not the church but womanly beauty, the many people mourning

signify the longing desires of the lover, and Blake's turning into a sty the self-disgust which overtook him. Neither the script nor the reading seemed likely to convey the full and true meaning of the poem.

The Sound of the Sea

SOME speakers talk about the poetry of earlier times, others manifestly enter into it as does "Lee Fore Brace" in his 3YC series on Pacific Navigators. Whether on Francis Drake or on the early maps of the Pacific he has that resounding conviction peculiar to some Scottish voices, a kind of staccato ripple that surges over the consonants like waves breaking over a rocky coast.



But this force in its turn springs from an epic conviction and sentiment concerning the old cartographers and navigators which convinces us while it lasts. As "Lee Fore Brace" speaks old ghosts stir from their hiding, phantom ships are driven over frantic seas and Drake impatiently paces the quarter deck. Mind you, I've mentioned the word "epic" because in the epic approach, as MacNiece has observed apropos of his play *Christopher Columbus*, the analyses of motive, the strict scrutiny of ethical values has little relevance alongside the sheer courage, faith and sense of wonder which since Homeric times has led men out beyond the bounds of prudence.

Quix for Hix

I DID appreciate the straightforwardness of the NZBS programme *Knight of the Doleful Countenance*, which struck a blow against cultism straight away by eschewing the more literary Don Keeotee in favour of the stoutly anglicised Don Quixote. A minor point perhaps, but in my case it meant that this account of Cervantes and his knight could graft itself without effort on to those scraps of knowledge left in my mind from school and story-book days. Exposition and quotation were nicely balanced in the programme; he had sizeable chunks of both and none of the cross-cutting from narrative to drama which leaves the listener bewitched by technique at the expense of comprehension. Barry Cookson's reading of the commentary was firm without being heavy-handed, and Frederick Farley's very distinctive voice (far too distinctive, I always feel, in the *At Close of Day* programmes) sharpened up the satiric edge of the quotations in a manner most diverting.

Idle Thought

TWIDDLING my radio knob idly from Aunt Daisy to a Home Science talk to perhaps Helen Cox's *Fun With Food*, I am impressed by the modern housewife's limitless opportunities for culinary education. Why, then, do we continue to earn censure from overseas visitors and from that bane of wives, the husband with overseas experience? Are we in fact any better at housewifery than our mothers and mothers-in-law before us? Or is radio, educationally speaking, an overrated medium—do we listen to talks on food as we listen to the morning serial, to escape from the perplexities of our everyday

Mixture as Before

A TALK from 4YC entitled "The Royal Family," by A. L. Rowse, proved to be an astonishing production in several ways. The speaker, being an historian of some repute, might have been expected to give us something, if not new, at least showing some sign of unusual scholarship. Instead, his talk was the essence of the ordinary—the sort of patriotic journalism that one finds fairly frequently in the pages of a woman's magazine. This was surprising; still more surprising, and disappointing, was the fact that it was chosen for YC listeners who are entitled to expect, I feel, that a talk on such a subject will deal with it with less superficiality.

New Angle

PROFESSOR G. A. F. Knight's talks on the Old Testament provide an interesting variation of the religious broadcast, being expository rather than hortatory, and having, in consequence, a wider appeal. Professor Knight is, to my mind, one of our more attractive broadcasters, always lucid, never dull or superficial, and his understanding of Hebrew thought and the relation of the Old Testament to the Gospels must bring illumination even to the unrepentant layman. This series, with that of Enrica Garnier on the Synoptic Gospels, remains in my mind as the most impressive religious broadcasts of the year, and suggest that this is a form which might be developed with advantage.

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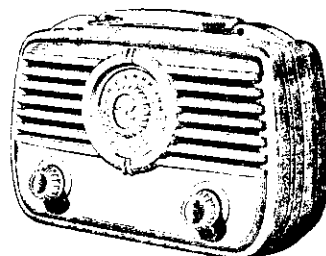
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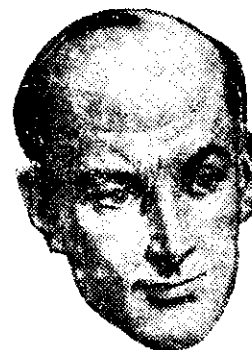
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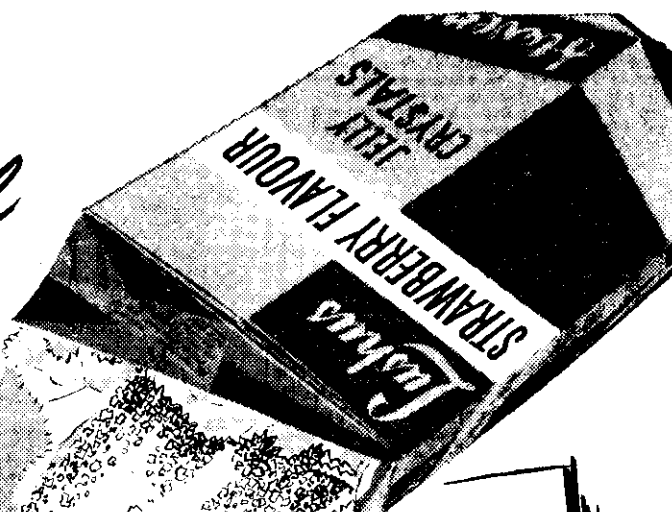
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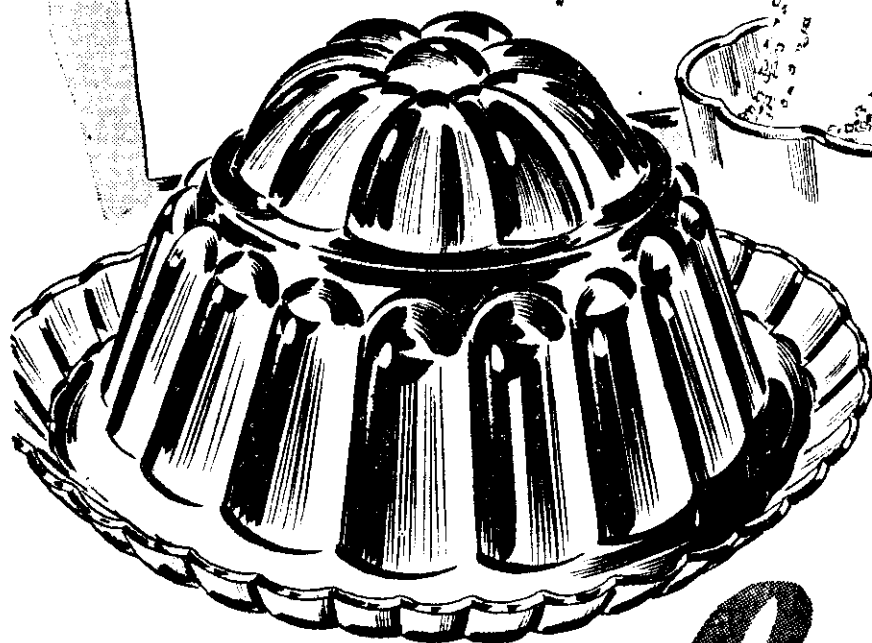


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The First Mr Cheyney

UNEASY TERMS

(Pathe)

ACCORDING to the advertisements *Uneasy Terms* is the first Peter Cheyney story to be filmed. If this is typical Cheyney it would cast no shadow over my film-going future to know that it was to be the last. Not being familiar with this particular masterpiece, I wasn't at all sure when the film opened whether Slim Callaghan (Michael Rennie) was the villain or the hero; and, though I hadn't any doubt about what the film had tried to say, I wasn't much more sure at the end. Poor girl, I thought, as Barbara Allardye (Moirra Lister), her conversation already showing the influence of associating with this cheap private detective, was carried off by him—poor girl!

Cheap is a word I very much dislike using about people. It suggests a lack of sympathy—a failure to understand—which I'm inclined to regard as the worst crime in the calendar. But I think it can be used of this creation of the late Mr. Cheyney. What makes *Uneasy Terms* so thoroughly objectionable is its attempt to make a film hero out of a character who has a complete lack of respect for other people. After Callaghan's shocking rudeness to several women who cross his path, one would have been surprised not to find him sooner or later in a fight where the boot seems to be the main weapon and the stomach the favoured target—a fight which would be a more disgusting piece of cinema if it were not so absurdly overdone. One feels rather sorry that Inspector Gringall, the only really likeable character in the film, doesn't (as he has threatened to) run this bright boy in for tampering with evidence.

This is a bad film, and I've gone to the trouble of saying at such length why I found it so because it's bad in a vicious, anti-social way.

TRAVELLER'S JOY

(Rank-Gainsborough)

TRAVELLER'S JOY has been adapted from a very successful London play by Arthur Macrae—and looks very much like it. A good part of it, set in hotel rooms, was probably little different on the stage; the smart dialogue goes over in the way we expect of a West End success.

The topical plot is built round the financial difficulties of English business folk abroad without enough foreign currency to pay their way—the "new British paupers," as one character calls them. The principal victims for the purposes of the story are Mrs. Pelham (Googie Withers) and her former husband (John McCallum), who meet in Stockholm and find they have a mutual interest in keeping the jailer at bay when they are unable to pay their hotel bills. Imprisonment for this crime is, one gathers, the not unusual fate of the very best English people in Sweden.

The story becomes quite involved as it proceeds. An increasing number of characters come and go very rapidly—or else linger to let their presence cause hilarious complications. There is some good fun when Pelham unexpectedly find himself playing waiter to his

former wife while her latest Swedish currency prospect is doing a heavy line with her. This and other amusing situations (especially towards the end of the film), and dialogue which at its best is very entertaining, helped me to pass a wet Saturday afternoon agreeably enough, and I think they would probably do the same for a good many others.

BEECH FORESTERS

(N.Z. Forest Service—National Film Unit)

I CAN appreciate some of the difficulties of the Forest Service and the National Film Unit in tackling *Beech Foresters*. It cannot be easy to make a film long enough to say anything worthwhile on a subject like this without tending towards monotony in the photography. This is not a very long film, and I'm not sure that all of the difficulties have been overcome. I found the treatment in some cases a little sketchy, though as it happens I know something about the subject, and it's possible that the average filmgoer would not be as interested in detail as I was prepared to be. On the other hand, I don't think *Beech Foresters* could be called monotonous. The camera has been used with imagination in the forest and has found enough related aspects of the subject outside to give variety. This is an interesting film which every New Zealander, as a New Zealander, should find worth seeing.

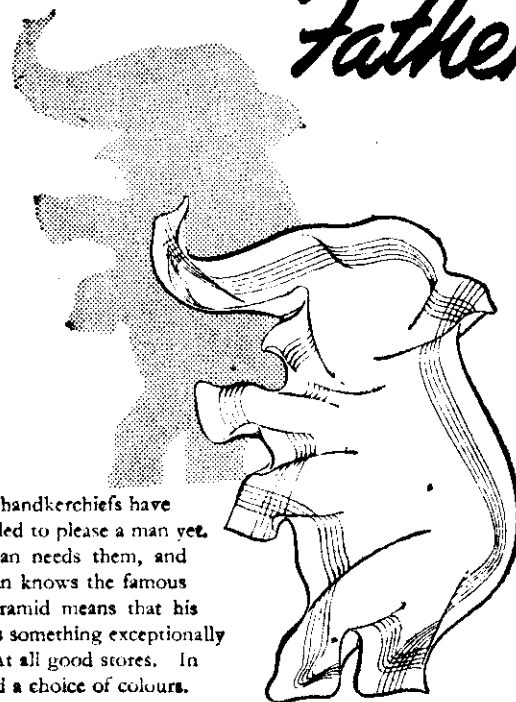

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MAN'S DOMINION

by "SUNDOWNER"

I WOULD like to think that Eric Parker, editor of the Lonsdale Library, and for more than 20 years editor of the *Field*, did something useful when he suggested that one way of getting rid of spring traps would be to sit up all night in a district where traps are regularly used and describe precisely what has been heard. Here is a passage from an interview with him in the *Countryman*:

How are we to get public opinion so strong on the subject of the gin that even the farmers of the West Country, where rabbits do most harm, must give way? I have sometimes thought—indeed, were I younger, I would try the experiment myself—that if a writer could spend a night on a Devonshire farm where gins were set regularly and describe in print what he heard from dusk to dawn, the gin would be ended by law tomorrow.

Since Parker is now 81 he is free of the suspicion young men have of old men who engage in recruiting campaigns in war time. But I can't help feeling that he is a sentimentalist and not a realist. Every farmer who uses traps knows what goes on from dusk to dawn, and although sentiment is a stronger weapon in Britain than it is in New Zealand, it is not often strong enough to conquer self-interest. In any case, it is the farmers themselves who have to be turned against trapping to make it disappear, and this means that they have to find a better weapon or have it found for them. In the meantime, no writer will describe accurately what trapping means, in the *Field* or anywhere else, first because no writer can, and in the second place because a writer who could and did would be denounced by two readers in three for trading in and gloating over cruelty.

I HOPE it will not be supposed that I do not sympathise with Eric Parker's desire to let the public know what trapping means in animal agony. I know worse things about trapping than Parker does or is capable of imagining; but I have never seen mountains moved by faith without reinforcement by reason and self-interest. I go all the way with Parker as a sentimentalist, and a good deal further, since I could never write, edit, encourage, or enjoy some of the strange stuff he has passed through his hands for the *Field* and the Lonsdale Library; but I am not sure that I go as far as Professor James Ritchie, of the Natural History Department of the University of Edinburgh, who questions man's right to dominion over wild animals. Again I quote from an interview in the *Countryman*:

The legal relationship between man and animals is a curious one, for it would appear that in law man has an absolute dominion over the animals which he owns, and

has the same absolute dominion over wild animals as he has over domestic animals—subject to restrictions imposed on him by the law of trespass, game laws, wild birds protection laws, and the like. This is a point of view very different from that of the naturalist, who regards wild animals as having rights of their own, and indeed some prior claim over man to the territory which they occupy.

I mean that I can't go as far as that realistically. I support it all emotionally, but can't honestly say that I wish the killing of wild animals were legal murder, disturbing them legal trespass. I do wish that inflicting unnecessary pain on them could be regarded, always and everywhere, as legal cruelty, punishable in the same way as cruelty to human beings; but if the law is to go further than that, what we call civilisation will crumble in the hands of its protectors. These are deep and dangerous questions which no man can answer in the language of mercy and justice. They can be answered in the language of survival, and most easily in the language of religion. But I can think of no other answers—I mean, of course, just, logical, and humane answers—that would keep the human race alive for three generations.

ELSIE'S interest in her calf lasted 60 hours. It would, of course, revive again if the two were brought together; but hearing it occasionally, and I suppose smelling it, were not sufficient to keep her disturbed after two and a half days of isolation. The calf was never more than half a chain from her by one line of approach and a little over a chain by another. But she could not see it. Most of the time, too, a strong wind blew from her to the calf and never from the calf to her. Finally Andy has (for a calf) a high-pitched and (to human ears) a poor carrying voice.

I was, however, surprised that the separation was accomplished so easily

VIVACIOUS GISELE

WHO is Gisele? Several times each week a singer with a vivacious personality, an unusual voice and the ability to interpret songs all the way from the saddest ballad to the gayest rhythm tune is heard on the coast to coast network of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation. This is Gisele—and she is now to be heard by New Zealand listeners in a series of seven CBC programmes.



Gisele's ambition was to be a concert violinist, and she plays well on this instrument. But one day someone heard her singing to entertain a group of friends, an audition was suggested, and it wasn't long before she was one of the Canadian radio's best-known voices.

Gisele shows her versatility in the very first programme New Zealanders will hear, which starts with an old favourite, "Those Little White Lies," and includes "Just a Dream Apart," from *Gentlemen Prefer Blondes*, "C'est Si Bon," a little French number that combines the qualities of the popular song and the folk song, the famous Scottish marching tune, "Bonny Dundee," and "Cherry Stones," a number based on the old game we used to play—"She loves me, she loves me not..." As in all her programmes Gisele plays her own accompaniments.

Songs by Gisele, which will be heard from all YA and YZ stations, will start from 2YA at 8.13 p.m. on Saturday, December 29.

Canadian composers and artists will be featured in another series of Canadian Broadcasting Corporation programmes which YC and YZ stations will broad-

cast during the next few months. These begin with Healey Willan's Symphony No. 2 played by the CBC Toronto Symphony Orchestra conducted by Geoffrey Waddington, a programme of six prize-winning songs from the CBC 1950 Song Contest presented by the CBC Toronto Orchestra and choir, with the soprano Elizabeth Benson Guy, and works of Godfrey Rideout, Jean Vallier, Harry Somers, John Weinzwieg and Oscar Morawetz played by the Toronto Symphony Orchestra conducted by Sir Ernest MacMillan. In five programmes by Canadian artists listeners will

hear players of string instruments and the piano, including the Parlow String Quartet. Station 2YC will play the first of these programmes at 9.0 p.m. on Friday, January 4.

If You're Irish...

THERE'S the flavour of peat about *Come Into the Parlour*, a programme of nearly non-stop light music which was first broadcast from the Belfast studios of the BBC. Though written for, about, or by the Irish, it should appeal to most people who like light music, and especially to those whose toes must tap when a jig is played. In *Come Into the Parlour* David Curry conducts the augmented BBC Northern Ireland Light Orchestra, and among the singers regularly heard are Rita Williams and George Beggs.

Come Into the Parlour will be heard from a number of stations over the holidays: 1YA, 8.35 p.m. Boxing Day, 4.0 p.m. Sunday, January 6; 2YA, 11.0 a.m., Christmas Day and New Year's Day; 3YA, 7.25 p.m., Boxing Day; 4YA, 8.30 p.m., Thursday, January 3; 2XN, 10.0 p.m., Friday, January 4; and from 2XG and 3XC, at times still to be announced.

and her normal life restored so quickly. Last year I let her keep the calf for a day and a night and then hide it, which she did so successfully that I had to call on Mac to help me to find it. But before I looked for the calf I removed Elsie herself, and then carried the calf to a hide-out over a hundred yards away to which she had no access. Although it bellowed in panic when I hoisted it on to my shoulders, the wind was then howling through the trees at gale force, and I don't think Elsie heard anything else. For two or three days she looked anxiously at intervals in the direction in which the calf had first been hidden, and grazed as close to the spot as the fences would allow her to go; but she made no further fuss by day, and if she called in the night I did not hear her.

I conclude that she is not as strongly maternal as some cows, or is so completely domesticated that it is easier to divert and distract her. Or perhaps we have done to the cows of New Zealand what Hudson said had been done to the cows of England—robbed them of their voices by taking away the necessity to use them.

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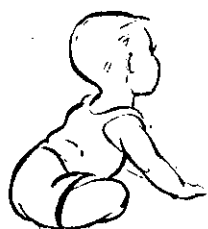
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Nell Stirling

SOMETIMES a radio actor remains merely a voice to the audiences, sometimes some of the sincerity behind the voice comes through, establishing an almost personal link. Listeners throughout New Zealand will learn with regret that well-known radio actress Nell Stirling collapsed and died at her home in Vaucluse, Sydney, on November 10. At thirty-eight she was one of the best-known radio voices in Australia and New Zealand, and the controlling force behind the George Edwards Players. She was heard in a great variety of productions, from the classics of Dickens and Dumas to the evergreen *Dad and Dave*, in which she played the part of Mabel. She was at home in character parts of every description, excelling in dialect, and frequently played several roles in the one production—she had seven different parts, for example, in *Bleak House*.

Most of those who heard the George Edwards productions of Georgette Heyer stories will remember her portrayal of Léonie, Duchess of Avon, in

NEWS of the death of Nell Stirling, whose voice was as familiar to thousands of New Zealanders as that of the next-door neighbour, reached us just as our last issue went to press. This brief appreciation is contributed by NANCY BRUCE.

These Old Shades, and her stammering little Countess Horatia in *The Convenient Marriage*. She had the ability to get inside a character and bring it vividly to life simply through the medium of her voice.

Nell Stirling early determined to have a stage career, and at sixteen produced her own act at Sydney's Tivoli Theatre, later joining the Jim Gerald Revue Company. When she was eighteen, George Edwards, with his eyes on the radio field, was auditioning girls in a search for a partner. Forty-first to be heard, Nell was his selection, and they began work together almost immediately.

In those days of radio acting there were no recordings, and actors were on call from early morning until late evening, playing all shows "live." In 1933-34 Nell Stirling played in 44 quarter-hour episodes weekly. Later on, recordings made it possible to work to less trying schedules, and to send the shows over

more and larger networks, including those in New Zealand.

In 1934 she became Mrs. George Edwards, and by that time the Company had built up a wide reputation, numbering in its casts many top-ranking Australian players and such New Zealand names as Warren Barry, Hilda Scurr and Lloyd Berrell. In 1947 that first marriage was dissolved (she later became Mrs. A. G. Atwill), but at the time of her death she was Chairman of Directors of the George Edwards Players Pty. Ltd., and the moving spirit behind what has grown into one of the biggest production units in Australia. She leaves two daughters, ten-year-old Carolyn Georgia Edwards, and a baby, Helen, who is not quite two. To many New Zealanders who knew her only as a voice, and to those in her own country who knew the warmly sincere person behind it, her passing at such an early age leaves a blank that will never be completely filled.

One Man's Pleasure

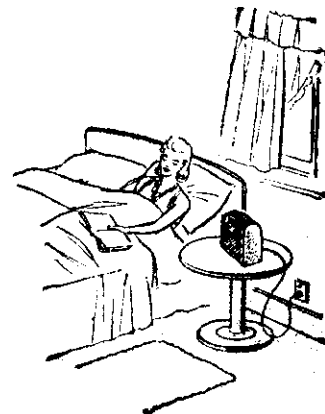
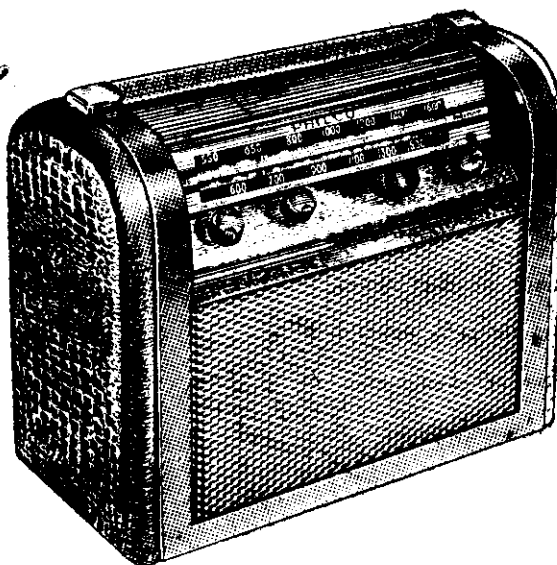

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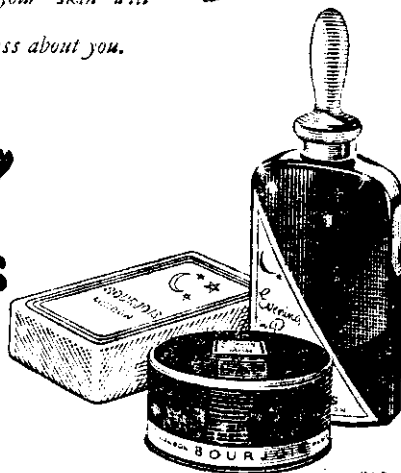

LEFT-OVERS—IF ANY!

AS lamb, poultry and ham are
all expensive, people will
probably buy just the right
amount to make one hot and one
cold meal; and I don't think there
will be any left-overs this year. Do
you remember the old story of the
small boy watching the big boy eating
an apple, and saying, "May I have the
core?" The reply was, "There ain't
going to be no core!" That idea will
apply, I think. However, there may be
ends of ham and tongue; and even quite
small scraps of poultry may be used in
croquettes or fritters.

Sandwiches

There are very often left-over sand-
wiches. These may be just toasted under
the grill with an extra spread of but-
ter on both sides, turning them once.
Or melt a little butter in a pan and
toast the filled sandwiches in it, on both
sides, until brown. Or, best of all, make
them into French toasted sandwiches,
by dipping them into batter and then
frying in a hot pan with butter. A cheap
and easy batter is made by just beating
1 egg a little and stirring in 1-3rd cup
milk and ¼ teaspoon salt. If you want
to make the whole affair substantial,
make a better batter by putting 4 oz.
flour into a basin and dropping in an
egg-yolk, whole. Beat a little, then add
a little tepid water to make a smooth
batter. Leave 10 minutes. Then add the
egg-white beaten stiff with a little salt
added. These are really good.

Left-over Cake

This can be sliced, a custard poured
over it, and baked. Often just crumbs
of cakes are left, and make really nice
puddings like this. A delightful way
with stale sponge or madeira cake is
to cut it into squares and arrange them,
spread with jam, in a pudding dish,
pour a good custard sauce over, and chill
for about 3 hours. Sprinkle with chopped
nuts or toasted almonds before serving.

Barbecued Left-over

This is just cooked lamb cut into thin
slices and heated in a barbecue sauce.
It makes a change from the usual
creamed left-over, which is simply heat-
ing in a good white sauce flavoured with
grated onion. For the barbecue sauce
lightly cook in a little hot fat, in a pan,
¾ cup each of minced onion and diced
celery, stirring carefully. Add 1 small
teaspoon dry mustard, 2 tablespoons
brown sugar, 1½ teaspoons salt, and stir
in. Then add 3 tablespoons vinegar, 1½
cups tomato juice, ½ cup water. Sim-
mer until thickened. And finally drop in
2 cups of the lamb, cut into thin slivers.
Serve surrounded by cooked rice, peas,
or green beans.

Croquettes

This is a good way of using up lamb,
chicken, beef, veal or ham. Have a cup-
ful of rich thick white sauce; add a
teaspoon each of minced parsley and
onion, ½ teaspoon of lemon juice, and
2 cups of the minced left-over. Salt

and pepper as desired. Chill well—several
hours or overnight. When meal-
time comes, divide out the chilled cro-
quette mixture into portions—this quan-
tity makes 8 nice sized ones. It is very
soft to handle but makes good croquettes.
Spoon out each portion, and shape into
cylinders or balls. Break an egg into a
plate and add a tablespoon of water;
mix with a fork till blended. On another
plate have sifted dried breadcrumbs.
Roll the croquettes first in breadcrumbs,
then in the egg, then in crumbs again.
Make sure they are thoroughly coated
so that they don't get fat-soaked when
frying. Leave them to chill a little while,
then fry in inch-deep fat until golden,
turning occasionally. Do a few at a
time. Remove with slotted spoon, drain
on paper, and keep hot in oven while
you cook the rest.

Ham Loaf

Two cups minced cooked ham, 1 cup
breadcrumbs, ½ cup milk, 1 cup cold
water, 1 sliced onion, 1 teaspoon salt,
2 eggs, 2 teaspoons dry mustard, ¼ tea-
spoon pepper, 1 teaspoon butter. Mix
together well. Mould into a loaf, bake in
moderate oven (350 degrees), about 1
hour. Sprinkle top with brown sugar, and
stud with a few whole cloves before
baking.

Hot Devilled Ham

Combine 1 cup finely minced cooked
ham with 1 dessertspoon (or more if
liked) of mustard made with milk, a
level teaspoon of sugar, and 1 teaspoon
Worcester sauce. Spread on toast. Very
nice topped with poached egg.

Ham and Asparagus Rolls

Use tinned or fresh cooked asparagus.
Grill thin slices of cooked ham lightly
on both sides. On each slice of ham
place several stalks of asparagus. Then
roll up the ham slices. If liked, serve
on each roll of ham and asparagus a
generous amount of thin rich cheese
sauce. Cheese Sauce: In the top of a
double boiler melt ¼ lb. processed
cheese. Gradually add 1-3rd cup of milk,
stirring all the time till smooth.

Cottage Pie

Have 4-5 cups meat hash and vege-
tables moistened with gravy or stock,
in piedish. Make pancake batter: Beat
1 egg slightly, add ½ cup milk and 1
tablespoon melted butter, mix well. Add
this to ¾ cup sifted flour, ¼ teaspoon
baking powder, and pinch of salt. Beat
till smooth. Pour over hash. Bake in hot
oven about 25 minutes. Serve hot.

Egg and Ham Tartlets

Chop 4 oz. cooked ham very finely and
mix with 2 oz. white breadcrumbs. Add
salt and pepper, and moisten with ½ gill
milk until smooth stiff paste obtained.
Butter well 4 small patty tins or odd
saucers and coat with a few white bread-
crumbs. Then add to each some of the
prepared ham. Break an egg carefully
on to each tin or saucer, sprinkle with
more breadcrumbs, add tiny bits of but-
ter on top. Cook in moderate oven till
eggs are set. Serve very hot.
