COMMERCIAL.

MR. HENRY DRIVER, on behalf of the New Zealand Loan and Mercantile Agency Company, reports as follows for the week ending October 4, 1876:—

Wool.—By private telegram, dated London, 10th September, Liverpool sales went off at better prices, thus giving a more assured character to the recovered tone of the close of the last London sales. This information is very important to wool-growers—apparently of too much importance to be noticed by the public telegrams.

Sheepskins.—At our sales this afternoon, biddings were brisk, full prices being obtained. Green cross-breeds, 5s 1 to 5s; merinos, 3s 8d to 3s 11d; dry cross-breeds, 2s 3d to 4s 3d; merinos, 2s 4d to 3s 4d.

Hides.—Small supply, no alteration in prices. Wet-salted sold at 3 1/2d; green, 16s to 18s 9d.

Tallow.—None offered.

Grain.—Wheat is very firm, and scarce at 5s to 6s. Oats have come forward more freely, but readily picked up at 2s 2d to 2s 3 1/2d for good to heavy feed. Barley, prime malting, sells at 4s 6d, whilst ordinary descriptions, which were selling at 4s, are quite neglected. Good milling is saleable at 2s 9d.

MR. SKENE reports for the week ending October 4, as follows:—The demand for working people has very much improved, principally for country; but even town enquiry, for skilled labor and tradesmen, has at last begun. Far too many of our late arrivals are only suited for shop and office. It cannot be too clearly shown that it is folly so many should come to Otago. Female servants were never scarcer. Couples are not wanted much yet. Station people are now in season. The building and timber trades is slowly improving. Wages—Coupler, £65, £70, £75, and £80; shepherds, £60 and £65; day labor—bush, road, and rail, 7s, 8s, and 9s; boys, 6s to 10s; dairy people, 15s to 25s; female servants vary from 10s, 12s, 15s, 20s, and 30s per week; clerks and shopmen, 30s to 60s per week; carpenters, 10s to 13s per day.

MR. A. MERCER reports as follows for the week ending October 4, 1876, retail prices only:—Fresh butter, in prints, 1s 6d to 1s 8d; fresh butter, in lumps, 1s 4d; powdered and salt butter 1s 6d. The supply of fresh butter is getting very plentiful, and some of the grocers are salting down, and prices must fall. New season salt butter, 1s 4d, in keg. Cheese, of the best quality, 1s 2d; side and rolled bacon, 11d to 1s; Colonial hams, 1s 2d to 1s 3d; English hams, 1s 6d to 1s 7d; Eggs are still in good demand at 1s 3d.

MESSRS. M. and J. MERNAN, George Street, report the following as the latest quotations:—Flour—Large bags, £13; small do, £13 10s per ton. Oatmeal—£11 10s per ton. Pearl barley—£22 per ton. Bran—£5 15s per ton, including bags. Pollard—£6 10s per ton. Chaff—£4 per ton. Hay—£3 15s to £4 per ton. Potatoes—£3 10s to £4 per ton. Carrots—£2 10s per ton. Wheat—4s 6d to 4s 9d per bushel. Barley—2s 9d to 3s 6d per bushel. Oats—2s to 2s 2d per bushel. Cheese—9d to 10d per lb.

MR. J. VEZEY reports for the week ending October 4, 1876:—Retail: Roast beef, 6d to 8d per lb.; boiling do., 4d to 5d per lb.; stewing do., 4d to 6d per lb.; steak, 6d to 9d per lb.; mutton, 3d to 6d per lb.; veal, 4d to 8d per lb.; pork, 9d to 10d per lb.; lamb, 4s 6d and 5s per quarter.
