PRODUCE.

London, December 30.—A healthy holiday tone per-vades the European wheat market. The liberal offers of Argentine and Indian stocks are depressing values, and there is consequently a poor demand. Cargoes of Australian (January-February shipment) were sold at 32/1½, and the same figure was offered for off-the-coast cargoes. Bliztands having resulted in unfavorable crop reports, the American market has a stiffening tendency. Australian and New Zealand wheats on the spot are nominally unchanged.

Flour in London is unchanged, but the Glasgow market is recovering at 26/3 to 26/9.
Raibbits are in poor demand.
Hutter is quiet and weaker, owing to large arrivals.
Choicest Victorian fetches from 96/6 to 98/-; New South Wales, 94/- to 96/-, and a few lots 98/. South Australian and Queensland, 92/- to 94/-; New Zealand, 500/-

Cheese is in strong demand. Canadian realises 54/-; New Zealand, 51/- to 52/.

The butter agents generally are favourable to the Government grading Victorian butter on similar lines to those adopted by New Zealand, which are satisfactory.

LIVE STOCK

The Addington Market was of a holiday character, both entries and attendance being small, the entries comprised 4312 sheep, 252 cattle, and 153 pigs.

Fat Cattle.—Eighty-eight head were yarded. The demand was very languid, and the sale was very irregular at an average range of prices considerably lower than has been recently current, a large proportion being withdrawn. Prime beef sold at the rate of 22/6 and clows and secondary, 19/- to 20/- per 1001b. Per head steers made £7 to £8/17/6; heifers, £5/12/6 to £7/12/6; cows, £5 to £6/17/6.

Fat Calves.—The entry was of good quality. Prices rangel from 14/- to 40/-.

Store Cattle.—The entry was small, and there was no change in value. Sales were made at the following prices:—Yearlings, 26/-; 15 to 18 months, 39/6 to 53/-; two-year heifers, £3/10/- to £4/3/6; three-year steers, passed at £6/8/-; dry cows, 36/- to £4.

Dairy cows.—There was a small entry and husiness was unimportant.

Fat Sheep.—Business was extremely dull, and the small entry was not fully cleared at the lower prices which were current. Wethers were easier, while ordinary ewes suffered a further decline of 1/- to 2/-. Prime wethers sold at 21/- to 22/6; others, from 18/-; prime ewes, 18/- to 19/-; and aged, from 16/-.

Fat Lambs.—The supply was small, but included a good proportion of prime quality. Prices were very irregular, but on the average 1/6 lower than last week. The best pens sold at 17/- to 20/-; others, 13/6 to 16/6.

Store Sheep.—A fair entry of store sheep came forward. The sale was rather irregular, but on the whole previous values were maintained. The principal sales were of two-thoth wethers—a small line at 19/6, 94 at 18/5, 82 at 17/9, 72 at 17/4, and 267 at 16/9; two and four-tooth wethers—295 at 17/8; halfbred and crossbred ewes, at 19/- to 19/9; 241 ewes with lambs, at 11/6, all counted; a small line of lambs at 12/9.

Pigs.—A small entry averaged previous rates—namely, 4d to 44d for baconers, and 4½ to 44d for porkers.
