Oats.—Consignments have been light during the week, and prices remain firm. Quotations: Choice seed, 2s to 2s 3d; good do, 1s 10d to 2s; prime milling, 1s 8½d to 1s 9d; good to best feed, 1s 8d to 1s 8½d; good to best feed, 1s 8d to 1s 8½d.

Wheat.—The milling demand has slackened, and second quality milling can only be sold as fowl wheat. Quotations: Seed lines, 3s 3d to 3s 6d; Prime milling, 3s 2d to 3s 2½d; medium do and best whole fowl wheat, 2s 11d to 3s; broken and damaged, 2s 6d to 2s 9d per bushel.

Potatoes.—Are in short supply, and prices show an advance of about 30s. Derwents, none forward; white sorts, £9 10s to £9 15s per ton.

Chaff.—Prime samples are in good demand, and are readily disposed of, but medium has not the same attention. Choice oatens sheaf £3 7s 6d to £3 10s; good to prime, £3 to £3 5s; medium, £2 12s 6d to £2 17s 6d; light and inferior, £2 5s to £2 10s per ton.

Messrs. Donald Reid and Co. (Limited) report:—

We held our weekly auction sale of grain and produce at our stores on Monday, when we submitted a representative catalogue to a good attendance of buyers, who competed well for the various lots on offer. Values ruled as under:—

Oats.—The quantity of oats coming forward during the past week has scarcely been sufficient to fill local requirements, and consequently very little shipping has been done. Values remain firm at about late rates, but very little business is passing. There is good demand for prime seed, while suitable milling lines also meet with ready sale. Quotations: Choice seed, 2s to 2s 3d; good do, 1s 10d to 2s; prime milling, 1s 8½d to 1s 9d; good to best feed, 1s 8d to 1s 8½d; inferior to medium, 1s 5d to 1s 7d per bushel (sacks extra).

Wheat.—The demand for prime milling wheat has slackened considerably, and it is difficult to make sales at prices lately ruling. There is no sale for second quality wheat as milling, and this can only be disposed of as fowl wheat. Quotations: Seed lines, 3s 3d to 3s 6d; prime milling, 3s 2d to 3s 2½d; medium milling and best whole fowl wheat, 2s 11d to 3s; broken and damaged, 2s 6d to 2s 9d per bushel (sacks extra).

Potatoes.—At Monday's sales potatoes were in very short supply, and those on offer sold at prices which show an advance of about 30s per ton. There were no Derwents forward, while white potatoes sold at £9 10s to £9 15s per ton (sacks in), according to quality.

Chaff.—Prime oatens sheaf has been in steady demand during the past week, and all consignments have been readily cleared on arrival. Medium quality is not inquired for, and is slow of sale at late quotations. Quotations: Choice oatens sheaf, £3 7s 6d to £3 10s; good to prime, £3 to £3 5s; medium, £2 12s 6d to £2 17s 6d; light and inferior, £2 5s to £2 10s per ton (bags extra).

WOOL.

Rabbitskins.—We offered a large catalogue at our sale on Tuesday to the usual buyers, competition being good and prices well maintained. Winters (mixed) brought up to 19½d, winter does 20½d, and blacks 34d.

Sheepskins.—We submitted a large catalogue on Tuesday to a full attendance of buyers, and prices were again very high, being quite up to last week's. We recommend consignments at present, and are confident that returns would give great satisfaction.

Hides.—We submitted a catalogue of 287 at our sale on Thursday last, and had a satisfactory sale, prices being a shade better than those ruling at the previous sale. We obtained up to 6½d for ox, and up to 4½d for cow hides.

Tallow and Fat.—There is no change to report in this market, all coming forward being readily disposed of at the following prices: Best rendered tallow, 18s to 20s per cwt.; medium to good, 15s to 17s 6d per cwt.; inferior tallow, 12s to 13s 6d per cwt.; best caul fat, 14s to 15s; rough fat, 12s to 14s per cwt.

DUNEDIN HORSE SALEYARDS.

Messrs. Wright, Stephenson, and Co., report as follows:—

There was only a moderate number of horses forward for Saturday's sale. The supply of sound, fresh young horses, both draught and light, falls far short of the demand, and good sorts of both kinds meet a ready sale at quotations. The following include a few of our transactions on Saturday: Bay gelding, four years, at £48; grey gelding, six years, at £43; bay gelding, seven years, at £40; bay gelding, seven years, at £36; bay spring-cart mare, at £26; chestnut buggy mare, at £24; and several aged and inferior light harness sorts at up to £15. We quote: Superior young draft geldings at from £50 to £55; extra good, do, (prize horses), £56 to £65; superior young draught mares, £60 to £75; medium draught mares and geldings, £30 to £45; aged do, £17 to £30; up-standing carriage horses, £25 to £35; well-matched carriage pairs, £80 to £100; strong spring-van horses, £30 to £35; milk-cart and butchers' order-cart horses, £20 to £28; light hacks, £10 to £18; extra good hacks, £20 to £30; weedy and aged hacks and harness horses, £5 to £8.

Fat Cattle.—162 head yarded, only two pens of these being good prime quality, the majority consisting of light to good bullocks, with a pen or two of good heifers. Prices were more than equal to those ruling last week. Best bullocks, £9 10s to £10 5s; medium to good, £8 to £9; light, £5 10s to £7 15s; best cows and heifers, £6 15s to £8; medium to good, £5 5s to £6 10s; light, £4 5s to £5.

Sheep.—Of the 1568 penned the most were good to prime wethers, only two or three pens of ewes being forward. Prices were fully equal to late rates. Extra prime wethers sold up to 29s; prime, 24s to 26s; medium to good, 22s 6d to 23s 6d; light, 20s to 21s 9d; best ewes, 20s to 21s 9d; others, 17s to 19s.

Pigs.—117 yarded, about half of which were suckers and slips, the balance being porkers, with a few pens of baconers. Prices for all sorts, with the exception of bacon pigs which were easier, were fully equal to last week's rates. Suckers, 8s to 13s; slips, 14s to 18s; stores, 19s to 23s; porkers, 21s to 30s; light baconers, 33s to 36s; heavy do, 38s to 43s; choppers, up to 50s.
