Wellington, September 11.—The Department of Industries and Commerce has received the following cable-gram from the High Commissioner, dated London, 9th inst.:—The mutton market is slightly weaker, with less demand, and prices are irregular. The average price to-day for Canterbury mutton is 4½d per lb, and North Island mutton 3½d per lb (light weights), and 3½d and 3½d per lb respectively for heavy weights. The high prices are restricting business. The lamb market has declined, as the season is too far advanced. The market is over-supplied with heavy carcasses of lamb. The average price to-day for New Zealand lamb, Canterbury brand, is 5½d per lb; for brands other than Canterbury, 5d per lb (light weights), and 4½d per lb respectively for heavy weights. The average price for hindquarters of New Zealand beef is 3½d per lb; fore-quarters, 2½d per lb. The butter market is quiet but steady. Buyers are not inclined to make forward purchases at present prices. Supplies will be moderate. Danish, 120s; Canadian, 109s; Australian, 112s, nominal. The cheese market is steady. Canadian, 56s per cwt. The hemp market is firm. The English wheat offerings are very large owing to the good crop, but the market is very quiet. New Zealand long-berried wheat, ex granary, per quarter of 496lb, 29s 6d; New Zealand short-berried wheat, on spot, per quarter of 496lb, ex granary, 28s 6d. Quotations are nominal. New Zealand oats, short Sparrowbills, ex granary, on spot, per quarter of 384lb, 21s 6d; New Zealand oats, Danish, ex granary, on spot, per quarter of 320lb, 16s 6d. The market is dull, and very little business is doing.

Good quality has some inquiry for shipment, and is saleable at £3 to £3 2s 6d, but medium and inferior, at £2 10s to £2 15s per ton (bags extra), are difficult to quit.

Straw.—The market is bare, and good oat straw worth about 35s to 40s; wheaten, 30s to 35s per ton (pressed).

Turnips.—Supplies have slackened, and best swedes are now worth 13s per ton (loose, ex truck).
