The attendance was very large, including a number of Maoris; indeed, the funeral was one of the largest seen at Otaki. 'The remains were taken to the Catholic cemetery by ten stalwart young natives of the Ngatiraukawa tribe, who wore mats and had a band of greenery, round their heads, in token of their mourning. The concluding service was conducted at the graveside. The whole ceremony was a most impressive one, and those present were greatly moved, showing the love and respect towards the departed Sister, who was a great favorite with all. The deceased had resided at Otaki on two different occasions, for a period of some seven years in all, during which time she was greatly beloved.
