The Late Rev. John Ryan

The obsequies of the late Rev. John Ryan took place at Queenstown (Lake Wakatipu) on last Friday. The esteem in which the deceased was held by his fellow-priests was evidenced by the large number of the clergy that assembled, at great personal inconvenience, to pay him the last tribute of affection and respect. Despite the remoteness of Queenstown, and the special difficulties that many experienced in returning to their missions for Sunday, fourteen priests were present at the obsequies. One of them (Monsignor Mackay) had to travel a single-journey distance of 345 miles in order to reach Queenstown; and another (Father O'Dea) had an all-night drive over the wild and dangerous road between Omakau and the Lake, arriving just in time for the Requiem.

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At the solemn Requiem Mass the Right Rev. Mgr. Mackay was celebrant; Very Rev. Mgr. O'Leary deacon; Very Rev. Pen Burks subdeacon; Very Rev. P. O'Donnell master of ceremonies; and Very Rev. P. O'Neil and Rev. H. W. Cleary cantors. There were also present: Rev. P. Murphy (Riverton), Rev. P. G. M. Hunt (Cromwell), Rev. P. O'Dea (Omakau), Itev. MR. WILLIAM HEFFERNAN, GREYMOUTH.

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We record with sincere regret the death of Mr. William Heffernan, senr., Greymouth, which took place on September 26, at the age of 68 years. The deceased, who was greatly respected and esteemed by a large circle of friends, was one of the earliest residents of Greymouth. The late Mr. Heffernan was a native of Ireland, and came out to Victoria in 1862. After spending about seven years on the Victorian goldfields he came to New Zealand in 1869, and since then resided on the West Coast, experiencing all the vicissitudes of a gold miner's life. He was always noted for being a staunch and practical Catholic, and was ever to the fore in promoting the interests of the Church in Greymouth. He was one of the founders of the local branch of the Hibernian Society thirty-five years ago, and occupied the position of president for several terms, always taking an enthusiastic interest in the Society's progress. The funeral, which took place on September 28, was largely attended, mourners being present from nearly every centre on the West Coast. The Very Rev. Deam Carew officiated both at the church and the graveside, and the members of the Hibernian Society in regalia took part in the funeral procession. The deceased leaves a family of seven sons and three daughters to mourn the loss of a kind and affectionate father. Four of the sons are members of the St. Columba Catholic Club and one of them is the secretary of that Society.—

It is with deep regret (writes our Westport correspondent) that I have to record the death of Mr. James Ryan, senr., which occurred at Westport on September 5, after a long illness, borne with true Christian fortitude. The late Mr. Ryan, who had reached the age of seventy-four years, was one of the few remaining pioneers of the Lyell district, having arrived from Australia in the early sixties. After spending some time at mining, Mr. Ryan commenced storekeeping, a business in which he was engaged for over forty years. A most charitable man, of the highest integrity, Mr. Ryan was much esteemed by all who came in contact with him in his private and business capacity. Besides being a director of the Alpine mine, the deceased gentleman was deputy-coroner for the Lyell district, and a Justice of the Peace. Always a most exemplary Catholic and a generous benefactor of the Church, his death is deeply deplored by his correligionists. As he lived, so he died, for his death was truly a happy and a holy one. Fortified by the rites of Holy Church, and in the presence of his wife and family (some of the members having come from Oamaru and Christchurch), he passed peacefully away to his reward. During the last illness he received all the consolations of religion from the Ven. Archpriest Walshe and the Rev. Father Bergin, the Sisters of Mercy also being in constant attendance. A widow and family of three sons and three daughters are left to mourn their loss, and the deepest sympathy has been extended to them in their sad bereavement. The Rev. Father Marnane, of Christchurch, is a nephew, and the Rev. Father Kerley, of Timaru, a grand-nephew of the late Mr Ryan. The funeral took place on Saturday, September 8, and the large number of mourners testified to the high esteem in which the deceased was held. The Rev. Father Bergin officiated at the grave-side.—R.I.P.
