## GENERAL Increase of Insanity

A Blue Book was published in September containing a special report on the alleged increase of insanity in Ireland, the inspectors of lunatics summary of which states that the census statistics for a number of decades past show that while the population of Ireland has continued to decrease the number of registered insane has largely increased, and this has given rise to the widespread belief that an actual increase of occurring insanity has taken place in Ireland. Whether or not this belief is well founded it is impossible to state positively, as available statistics do not afford that precise information on which a definite conclusion can be based. Without venturing to affirm that there has been no increase of occurring insanity, notwithstanding the great numerical increase, we can only conclude that the very great increase which has taken place in the ratio of insanity to the population is largely due to the accumulation which is taking place in public asylums. The emigration of strong and healthy members of the community, amongst whom if they had remained at bome the ratio of insanity would have their asylums. The emigration of strong and healthy members of the community, amongst whom if they had remained at home the ratio of insanity would have been very small, not alone increases the ratio of insane left behind to the general population, but also lowers the general standard of mental and bodily health by climinating many of the members of the community best fitted to survive and propagate the race.

#### Teachers' Grievances.

Speaking at a largely attended meeting of National teachers in Ballaghaderin, Mr. John Dilton, M.P., said he had strong reasons for confidently believing that the present Government would without delay apply a remedy to the grievances of National teachers. He urged, however, that vigorous agitation should be started, and meetings like that held all over the country. Father Bernard Vaughan, S.J., on the new General of the Jesuit Order:— Father Wernz is perhaps better acquainted with the Society as a whole than any other man in it. Mr. Daniel O'Day, business associate of Mr. Rocke-feller, whose death is announced from Paris, was born in Ireland sixty-two years ago, and went to the United States in infancy. In 1865 he went to the Pennsylvania oil regions, and became connected with the oil transportation business there, constructing in 1873-76, the pipe lines which were afterwards consolidated with the United Pipe Line system. This was afterwards consolidated with other systems in the National Transit Company, of which Mr. O'Day became a vice-president. He was also president of the North-Western Ohio Natural Gas Company and of the People's Bank of Buffalo. His body will be-conveyed to the United States for burial.

The Pall Mall Gazette says: Most Rev. Dr. Walsh, Archbishop of Dublin, who has escaped from shipwreck on the Zuyder Zee, betrayed one side of his versatile character the moment he got safely on shore. He is a skilled photographer, and carried his camera with him, whereby he was enabled to take a snapshot of the wreck. Dr. Walsh has found time, amidst a strenuous performance of spiritual duties, to master more than the mysteries of the camera, he is an expert shorthand writer; he has written a grammar of Gregorian music; he has toured the Continent on his bicycle, and far from regarding the motor-car as an invention of the devil, he was one of its early patrons, and rode in one to witness the Gordon-Bennett Cup Race, which was run partly in his own archdiocese. Sir Thomas Crattan Esmonde, Bart, M.P., calebrated his forty-fourth birthday on September 20. The indefatigable whip of the Irish Party is a great grandson of Henry Grattan. He might have been Lord Esmonde, Baron of Limerick, says the Evening Standard. Sir Lawrence Esmonde obtained large grants of confiscated land in Ircland in the reign of James I, and was created Lord Esmonde. During a military expedition into Connaught he married a fair daughter of O'Flaherty. The bride was a Catholic, the bridegroom a Protestant. A son was born to them, but Lady Esmonde, fearing that the boy was to be brought up a Protestant; fled with him into hiding. Her husband then took action and repudiated his marriage as being between a Protestant and a Catholic, and married again. He had no further issue, and on his death-bed he left his estates to his only son. The peerage could not descend, but the son was made a baronet.

Lord Gerard, whose marriage to Miss Gosselin at the Brompton Oratory the other day made a brilliant interlude in the dull season, is the grandson of the first peer. Sir Robert Gerard, who was called to the Upper House in 1876, was the only Catholic commoner raised to the Peerage by Lord Beaconsfield. The late Lord Derby is reported to have said that he did not think it likely that the third baronet in the realm would accept of a nineteenth-century barony. Mr. Gladstone's creations of Catholic, peers during the preceding Administration were numerous. Besides giving Lord Ripon his marquisate, he recommended Lords Actor, Howard de Glossop, and Emly for their respective honors. In the first years of Queen Victoria's accession there was a remarkable revivat of ancient peerages claimed by Catholics. The baronies of Camovs, Braye, Beaumont, and Vaux of Harrowden were recalled into existence. The aggregate number of years in which these four titles were in abeyance amounted to 1175. Up to George III: no abeyance, save one, had been terminated which had lasted for more than thirty years. thirty years.
