NEW ZEALAND: GENERAL

The Admiralty declines to listen to the strong representations that Lyttelton is the best port of departure for the Antarctic relief expedition.

The Agricultural Department has been advised of an outbreak of anthrax on Mr. Campbell's farm at Kaupokonui, in the Taranaki district. Three cows have cuccumbed to the disease. It is understood that imported bones were used to manure the paddocks in which the animals had been grazing.

We have to thank the secretary of the Fremantle Catholic Institute for a copy of the syllabus for the current year. The Institute has a library of over 400 volumes by popular authors. The receipts for the half year ended June 30 were over £90, which shows that there is a goodly roll of members.

An English company has decided to start trawling operations on a large scale in New Zealand waters. The company's representative, who arrived from London by the Gothic, states that its operations will embrace the whole of the deep-sea fishing areas off the New Zealand coast. It is proposed to employ 10 trawlers, and these will be built in the Colony if shipbuilders will undertake to produce hoats in accordance with Grimsby specifications.

At St. Francis's ('hurch, Thames, on Sunday evening (September 6) during Vespers a life-size statue of the Sacred Heart was solemnly and impressively unveiled and blessed by the Right Rev. Mgr. O'Reilly, in the presence of a large congregation. The statue, a beautiful work, imported from Sydney, was kindly presented by Mrs S. McDonnell, in memory of her late husband, Mr. Edward McDonnell, so well and favorably known to the residents of the Thames and surrounding districts.

The authorities propose to proceed immediately with the rebuilding of the Stoke Orphanage, day labor being employed, as the tenders received were considered excessive. The bricks for the purpose will be made on the ground, as the property has an excellent bed of clay particularly suited for the purpose. This item alone will necessarily result in a great saving, and it is expected the total cost of the building will not exceed the estimate of the architect. The Catholics of Nelson, with their energetic and popular pastor, the Rev. George Mahony, who has just been gazetted legal manager of the orphanage, are actively engaged in making preparations for holding a monster bazaar in aid of the building fund. This will take place in February and will be accompanied by an art union. The Rev. Father Mahony and his committee earnestly trust that the Catholics of other districts will generously contribute articles for the bazaar and prizes for the art union. Such donations will be gratefully and thankfully received.

A large coalfield has been located in the Nelson province, near Motupipi, and towards the Tata Islands. Prospecting has been going on there for some time past, and there is now some certainty as to the extent and prospects of the field. From Motupipi coal was traced from the sea inland, and it was also found at Gohara Beach and Limestone Bay. The area of the field is about 1610 acres, and there are two seams, one 4ft 6in and the other 5ft. The former seam should yield 7260 tons to the acre, and the latter 8066 tons. The total estimated quantity is 34,675,906 tons, and at the rate of 400 tons a day it will take about 246 years to work out the field. The coal is described as a good household coal, and is said to be similar to Kaitangata. It is believed the coal could be delivered at people's doors in Wellington at 18s a ton.
