

## Building Notes.

#### AUCKLAND.

It is proposed to build a new Theological College for the training of Methodist theological students, and for local preachers and Sunday School teachers. A site is being purchased of sufficient size to include a hostel in addition to the College.

Authority to raise £5,000 on debentures, in addition to the £20,000 already raised by this means, has been granted the Auckland Hospital Board. This money is to be devoted to the Board's general building programme. Referring to this matter recently, the chairman of the Board, Mr. W. Wallace, said there was a great deal of money offering just now for hospital purposes. The amount already raised, he said, was for work previously completed, and which had been paid for by overdraft, and also for the erection of the Waiuku Cottage Hospital, for which tenders were to be invited at an early date. This hospital, said Mr. Wallace, was to be used chiefly for maternity cases and for minor cases of accident and sickness. So far as the building programme of the Board was concerned, Mr. Wallace said the most important work was the extension of the Nurses' Home. He had previously emphasised the fact that without adequate accommodation for the nursing staff further accommodation for patients would be useless. In the near future the Board would be able to get money for this purpose, and then the building programme would be gone on without delay.

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
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
