R.S.A. Armistice Concert at 2YA

Relay From St. James Theatre on Armistice Night — Outstanding Symphony Orchestra Concert Last Week—"The Radio Players" Present Something New in Radio Plays Next Thursday.

WELLINGTON listeners should have nothing to complain of on Sunday next, for 2YA is relaying the Returned Soldiers' Association Armistice night concert from the St. James Theatre. and later presenting the third act of Wagner's "Parsifal," in a complete recorded version by three well-known German singers and the chorus and orchestra of the State Opera, Berlio, conducted by Dr. Karl Muck.

THE third act of this opera, the last of Wagner's works, contains some of his most beautiful music, including the famous "Good Friday Spell," and the "Processional of the Knights of the Holy Grail." The staging of the opera would seem to present almost in-credible difficulties, but, besides being critic, poet, conductor, and the com-poser who revolutionised grand opera, Wagner was an outstanding producer and stage-manager, who has exercised an influence in these matters on the theatre of our own time, and his productions of "Parsifal" at Bayreuth were one of the features which made that city a meeca for musicians all over the world.

MR. ANDERSEN TYRER, who composed and presented the first performance in the world of the "Concerto for Pianoforte and Orchestra in E Flat," on Thursday, at the Wellington Symphony Orchestra's concert in the Town Hall, was educated at the Royal Manchester College of Music, and Manchester University, where he studied pianoforte, violin, voice production, elocution and gesture. He was elected Honorary Fellow of the College (F.R.M.C.M.) in 1981. He made his debut in 1919, at Queen's Hall, with the Lendon Symphony Orchestra, and has appeared at all the important musical societies, including the Halle Con-certs, Royal Philharmonic, and Leeds Festival, as pianoforte soloist and com-

For some years, he has been closely connected with Trinity College as an examiner, both at Home and abroad. Mr. Tyrer also studied orchestration and conducting under Michel Balling, and composition under Frederick Delius.

This is a relay from the Town Hall of a lecture on Christian Science by Miss Margaret Murney Glenn, C.S.B., of Boston, Mass., a prominent Americau Christian Scientist. When M'ss Glenn was in Christchurch her lecture was

relayed by station 3YL, and many listeners found something to interest them in her remarks. Miss Glenn is a member of the Board of Lectureship of the Mother Church, the First Church of Christ Scientist in Boston.

"THE RADIO PLAYERS" need no introduction to Wellington listeners, for their excellent dramatic offerings over the air from time to time have gained for them a wide audience. On Thursday, November 15, this talented group is to present the dramatic incident, "The Invisible Wound," adanted from the story by Karoly Kisfaludi. A strong cast has been selected, and will, as usual, perform under the direction of Mr. L. J. Maule; this play is definitely out of the usual in radio plays, and should be well worth hear-

IT is some time since listeners heard Mr. Will Bishop on the air from 2YA, so it is good to see his name in the programme once again, on Saturday, November 17. Mr. Bishop's humorous numbers at the piano-all of which he writes himself—are known throughout New Zealand, and far be yond, for he has had several of his songs accepted by London publishers, On the same evening listeners will hear two excellent recorded items by Cicely Courteneidge, the famous English Courteneidge, the famous English comedienne—"The Girl in the Post Office," and "Two Minds Without a Single Thought"—which are probably the funniest records she has yet made. With these two, and also the well-known sketch by Mischa Motte, "A Suburban Tea Party," all scheduled between eight and nine o'clock, listeners can scarcely complain that there is not enough humour on the air that night.

WE do not hear much of Shakespeare on the air in New Zealand, so the theme programme to be presented from 2YA on Tuesday, November 13, should be very welcome to all listeners. This is "The Seven Ages of Man," the programme being taken directly from Shakespeare's famous lines, which will be spoken by Miss Doris Syme, with appropriate recordings interspersed.

ON Thursday and Friday of next week, November 15 and 16, listeners to 2YA will hear talks by the Rev. Fred. J. Searle, who has already spoken from the southern national stations. Mr Searle has for many years been a missionary in Papua, and he has many interesting stories to tell of native customs, and of strange experiences in New Guinea.
