Radio Sets for Unemployed Camps

Five Camps in Otago Now Equipped With Radio by Toc H Members-Dunedin Listeners Praised Goodwill Programme - Longer Hours For Popular B Station.

TIVE of the unemployment relief camps in Otago are now equipped with wireless receiving sets provided by Toc H. As a result of its movement to secure funds for the purchasing of battery-operated sets for the camps. Toc H collected the sum of £170, with which it has obtained eleven receivers, some of which are already installed at the Conical Hills camp, the Kingston camp, the Eglington Valley camp, the Hollyford camp, and the Makarora camp. It is hoped to have the remainder flited up at the camps at Blair Taieri. Oturehua, Lauder, Omakau, Poolburn, and Pebbly Hills as soon as possible. From reports, it is gathered that the men at the various camps which now have their own radio sets, are highly pleased, and greatly appreciate the link with other parts. The Toc H members are hopeful that the nearest garages will service and charge the bat-teries without cost, so that the funds the inovement has for this purpose may be out to another use.

NEW ZEALAND was certainly on the air on the occasion of the recent good-will broadcast from the four main centres, and although the programme was designed primarily for the benefit of other countries, undoubtedly it was listened to with interest in the minion itself. As evidence that Dunedin listeners were intensely proud of the messages that were broadcast, especially the flattering references to their own city, the good-will broadcast was the main topic of conversation on the morrow, little or no adverse criticism being voiced within hearing of the public ear. Listeners could but be impressed once again with the tremendous possibilities offered by radio as a means of international communication.

STATION 4ZM has commenced working on a new and lengthier schedule. This is good news for those who regularly listen to the broadcasts of this popular little station, the programmes of which have for some time past been of the lighter order, calculated to appeal to the general taste.

"AIDA" is the next Grand Opera scheduled for presentation 4YA. This opera in four acts by Verdi is to be broadcast on November 18. Verdi is regarded as Italy's greatest composer of opera, and "Aida" was produced at La Scala under the direction of the composer on April 7, 1872. It was composed at the request of the Khedive of Egypt for his new house in Cairo, but the production was delayed for a year on account of the Franco-Prussian War in 1870, the intricate scenery and gorgeous costumes being in beleaguered Paris.


