
Dunedin is very proud of the amount raised for charity by the Community Sings this year, the sum of £660 having been given—nearly double the total achieved last year. Under the energetic leadership of Mr. H. P. Desmoulin and Mr. J. F. Himbuilg, with Mr. Alf. Pettit at the piano, the sings have proved extremely popular. The final sing for the season was held in the Dimedin Town Hall on Monday, November 12.

DURING the season 24 sings were held, and the enthusiasm shown throughout showed a marked improvement of the previous year with an increase in revenue. This year the sings were held in the Strand Theatre by courtesy of Fuller-Hayward Theatres. Big Brother Bill conducted two big sings during the children's vacation, these being held in the Town Hall, and at each session the place was packed, it being estimated that at least 9000 attended. Mr. Desmoulin has been leading most of the sings during the season, and he received a flattering reception from the audience. It is very gratifying to know that £660 was collected this year; out of this £37 was collected for one of the sings for the Children's Christmas Cheer Fund, the balance to go to the Mayor's Unemployment Fund. This shows a big increase on the total for last year, which was £397. Community singing has certainly taken on immensely in Dunedin this year. of which Dunedin is proud is that the money thus raised was all given voluntarily as no raffles of any description were carried out, and this speaks
