THE passenger vessel now being built in Scotland for Tasmanian Steamers Pty's, Melbourne-Launceston service, is to be fitted with Australian-made wireless equipment. This will consist of an A.W.A. 500-watt interrupted continuous wave valve wireless telegraph transmitter to work on the waveband between 600 and 800 metres, a special valve marine receiver, also an emergency equipment and an automatic alarm signal apparatus which is set for reception of distress calls whenever the operator goes off duty. A Gigantoforte loudspeaker system is also provided in conjunction with a broadcast receiver, microphone and phonograph, so that musical programmes and announcements can be heard in various parts of the ship, according to requirements.
