The pioneer short-wave station in Canada was CJRX, Winnipeg, which was opened in 1928. CJRX and its sister station, CJRO, are now basic stations of the C.R.C. There are 12 licensed short-wave stations in Canada. Not all of these are on the air at present, but the list is:—

There are eight television stations licensed in Canada to operate on 2050 or 2800 kilocycles. VE9EC, Montreal, has been one of the pioneers in this branch of radio.

Radio in Japan

THE election of membership in the International Amateur Radio Union of the Japanese Amateur Radio League, has been announced. The Japanese body has been the organised representative of amateur radio in that country for the past five years. The I.A.R.U., amateur societies of 25 nations, has been in existence for nearly 10 years. It is recognised at international radio conferences as the spokesman of organised amateur radio, representing 60,000 licensed amateur radio stations in all parts of the world. The countries represented in the union are the United States, in which the headquarters are maintained at the offices of the American Radio Relay League, Italy, Canada, Czechoslovakia, Germany, Denmark, Irish Free State, Colombia, Mexico, Netherlands, Netherlands Indies, New Zealand, Norway, Poland, Great Britain, Portugal, Belgium, France, South Africa, Finland, Sweden, Spain, Switzerland, and Australia.
