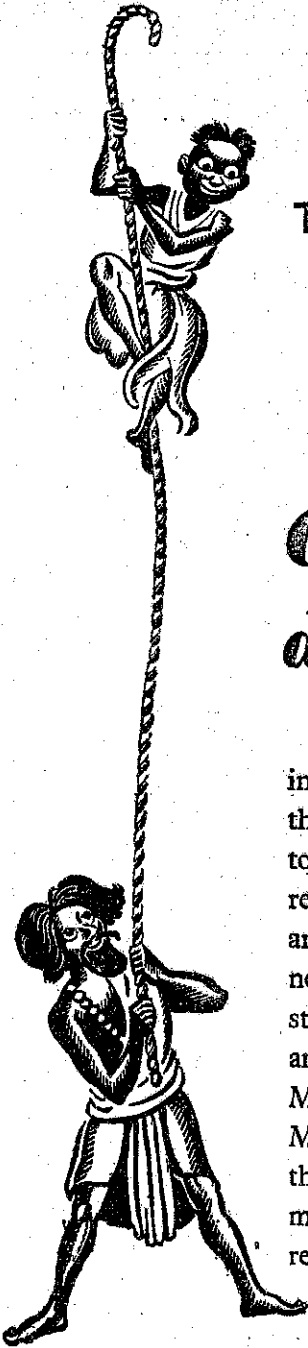




THE INDIAN ROPE TRICK
